



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INSIDE TAKING THE PLUNGE

Escape artist will risk death in upcoming underwater stunt at Aquarium

Go for the penguins and walruses. Stay for the daring underwater escape act.

Magician Thomas Solomon promises to break free from multiple sets of handcuffs — in less than three minutes — while submerged inside an underwater tank at the New York Aquarium next week in the latest stunt to bring more visitors to the aging Coney Island attraction as it undergoes a lengthy, \$100 million overhaul.

Solomon crowed that he'll dive into the 40-degree swimming poolsized tank, wearing only a bathing suit and manacled by five sets of NYPD-regulation cuffs — administered by the Finest themselves — in a daring bid to escape unscathed.

"I'm an expert at opening handcuffs underwater [without a key]," the daredevil bragged. "I'm very confident I can do this.'

The act is child's play, according to the Wisconsin-born escapologist who has performed similar feats in the Hudson River and Atlantic Ocean, once even bolting free from a titanium bank safe while underwater — a trick that landed him on the History Channel and British

Experts say Solomon's Houdini act is no joke.

"This is deadly serious," said Adam "Real Man" Rinn, the dean of Conev's Sideshow School, where he teaches classes on sword-swallowing, fire-eating and glass-walking. "If he runs out of breath [before escaping] he's done."

Solomon remains undaunted about showing off a gig he's perfected for more than 20 years, earning his chops on the Chicago nightclub circuit, where he performed basic magic tricks before becoming obsessed with escape acts. The illusionist wouldn't give up any tricks of the trade, but promised he won't disappoint.

"People are going to see some-

thing they've never seen before," he warned.

Organizers said the stunt will promote Coney Island USA's summer-long season of magic, which kicks off with a variety show at the Sideshows by the Seashore theater on March 24.

The 55-year-old, city-run aquarium is also adding two new shark tanks as part of the rehab, expected

to be completed in 2015.

Aquarium Director John Dohlin supported Solomon's cool caper.

"The exploits of Thomas Solomon will no doubt add a touch of drama to the New York Aquarium," he said.

This isn't the first time the Aquarium has grabbed headlines with wacky attempts to increase its attendance.

Last summer the museum held a naming contest for an Amazonian electric eel, and drew attention for adopting an 18-pound, 75-year-old

Judge wants to redistrict Turner out of Brooklyn

A federal court judge wants to boot Rep. Bob Turner out of Brooklyn and expand Rep. Michael Grimm's Bay Ridge district into Sheepshead Bay and Homecrest, according to a new congressional redistricting maps released this week — plans that butcher the GOP's hopes of splitting southern Brooklyn between the two Republican legislators.

U.S. Magistrate Roanne Mann redrew the lines proposed by the GOP-run state Senate and the Democrat-controlled Assembly this week after political watchdogs claimed that the new district maps were too partisan.

If they're approved, not only will Grimm expand further into southern Brooklyn, but Rep. Ed Towns's district would stretch from Canarsie into Bergen Beach, Mill Basin and Marine Park — areas that Turner currently represents. Towns's district will also extend into Coney Island, according to the maps.

Turner's district will actually disappear, political insiders say.

But Turner isn't very con-

"I am prepared to run in whatever district I reside in once the final lines are adopted," Turner, who took disgraced Rep. Anthony



Weiner's seat last year, said in a statement. "This is just another step in the process."

The state Senate and the Assembly's district lines were quite different when they were released last week: The GOP wants to give Reps. Grimm (R-Bay Ridge) and Turner (R-Sheepshead Bay) a lot more of southern Brooklyn. Assemblymembers wanted to get rid of Weiner's district entirely, and get rid of Turner along with it.

Both state houses had until midnight on Wednesday to submit their recommendations to a federal judge tasked with creating new congressional district lines.

With congressional primaries being moved up to June 26, and with the Assembly and the state Senate failing to work out a compromise, a coalition of voters and political watchdog groups sued Albany in federal court, claiming that the partisan politics being played at the state capitol was violating voters' civil rights.

A three-judge panel will take those recommendations and hammer out new congressional lines by March 20.

Assembly, state Senate and congressional lines are redrawn every 10 years so the districts jive with population shifts outlined in the census. But critics say politicians use the redistricting process to make sure that the political party currently in power stays in power.

This is not the first time the state Senate and the Assembly quibbled over district lines. In January, the two legislative bodies put out completely different state district maps. In the Senate map, Republican leaders erased disgraced state Sen. Carl Kruger's district — even though Councilman Lew Fidler (D-Marine Park) and Republican attorney David Storobin are embroiled in a heated campaign for the seat.

Cat hoarder puts most up for adoption

Animal rights group helping Barbara Berger find homes for 35 of her 45 felines

An animal rescuer is coming to the aid of 45 kitties being hoarded in a cramped Brighton Beach apartment, but the dogooder says the felines' owner insists she keep 10 of her furry friends.

Josie Marrero of the Brooklyn Rescue Umbrella, an animal rescue team, says she wants to help wean Barbara Berger off a cat addiction that could get her — and her colony of kitties — evicted from a one-bedroom home on Coney Island Avenue.

"We're working on her," said Marrero, who first read about the cat lover's plight on BrooklynDaily.com. "As she begins to trust us, she might give us more cats."

But for now, the cat lover says she can't let go of her favorites.

"It would be very traumatizing to lose them," said Berger.

That puts the 51-year-old cat lady at odds with her landlord, who says she has to whittle down her cat menagerie to two if she wants to stat in her \$153-a-month apartment.

To save her home, Berger agreed to let Marrero screen most of her cats at a clinic

and move the healthy ones to the Petco store on 86th Street at Stillwell Avenue, where 12 of the cats will be put up for adoption this week.

The Long Island-based North Shore Animal League has also agreed to take in seven of Berger's cats.

Petco manager Jeff Ar-

tis said anyone who passes the company's background check will be eligible to adopt one of the animals.

"We're glad to help," Ar-

Berger moved into her city-subsidized apartment with 15 cats in 2007, but said that number ballooned as she took in strays off the street and accepted kittens from neighbors and friends.

Her landlord, Herald Realty Group, threatened to evict her in December but hammered out a deal in housing court last month that would let her keep her apartment if she ditches 43 of the felines by mid-March.

Herald Realty Group declined to comment on Berger's case.

City: Synagogue didn't get proper permits

A Manhattan Beach synagogue's noisy, industrial-sized heating and air conditioning unit that has kept two neighboring Holocaust survivors up at night for more than four years was installed without the proper permits — but the city isn't demanding that the ear-splitting unit be ripped out of the offending house of worship.

The Department of Buildings confirmed this week that they issued a violation against Congregation Shaarey Torah for installing the unit without filing the necessary permits with the city first. The violation was issued after inspectors were barred from entering the West End Avenue shul on six other occasions, preventing them from confirming complaints that stretch back to 2009.

The January inspection was no different: the only way city officials were able to confirm that an air conditioning unit had been installed at the temple was to go onto the roof of a neighboring home belonging to Isaac and Rosa Blum — two octogenarians who have been complaining about the device for years — so they can get a glimpse of the air conditioning system.

Yet, so far, the city isn't demanding that it be removed. Instead, members of Councilman Michael Nelson's staff are working with both the synagogue and the Blums to find some kind of resolution a compromise that may allow the synagogue to keep their illegal air conditioning unit.

The city could handle the problem several ways, but Deborah Weiss, chief of staff for Councilman Nelson (D-Manhattan Beach) said the only action the city could take was "try to mediate the dispute."


Weiss said that congregants have agreed to either replace the existing air conditioner with a smaller, quieter model, or to install noise dampening insulation.

"Statutorily, this is illegal," Weiss said. "If nothing [to alleviate the problem] happens, the Blums would have the option of going to court."

But Isaac Blum, 89, said that he and his wife are used to Congregation Shaarey Torah making false promises.

"It is nothing new, what [the synagogue is] proposing," explained Blum, who said the synagogue's air-conditioning system sounds like a "diesel en-

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Murrow chess masters take the crown

Midwood squad wins its 15th state championship during nail-biter in Saratoga Springs

They don't call them "The Kings of New York" for nothing.

Edward R. Murrow's teenage chess wizards snatched up a lastminute victory at the state championships in Saratoga Springs this weekend — the latest triumph for a team that not only has 15 state championships and seven national titles under its board, but has become the subject of a book and an upcoming movie.

Their latest gambit earned the stellar squad a trophy, a chance to travel to Albany to meet Gov. Cuomo, plus more bragging rights.

But the win wasn't easy, said coach Eliot Weiss, who created the team in 1981 and has led his students to ten straight state victories between 2000 and 2009.

"The last two games of the tournament, my players were overwhelmed," he said. "They were playing against master-level players and they're only at the expert level!"

Last weekend's victory played

out like a Rocky movie: Murrow's strategy masters suffered a twoyear funk in 2010 and 2011, but clawed their way back to the top this weekend — and were treated like rock stars when they showed up at the Avenue L school on Monday morning.

"People were coming up to us, greeting us and cheering us," said Markel Brown, a senior savoring his second state championship

The team's uncanny success inspired a book "The Kings of

New York," by sportswriter Michael Weinreb.


A movie based on the book is reportedly in the works, but Weiss says the strategy behind his team's many victories is a simple

"If you just play blindly you're gonna make the same mistakes; history will repeat itself," said Weiss. "We play a lot and we analyze our games to see what our mistakes are. That's the only way you improve."

The squad, whose members include players hailing from South America, the Caribbean, and Europe, will employ some powerful mind games at the April nationals in Minneapolis, promised Weiss, who is currently raising money to fund the trip.

"If you win in chess you're winning more than a game," he said. "You're winning your opponent's mind. It can be quite crushing."

Brooklyn-born jihadist sentenced to 27 years

A federal judge sentenced a Sheepshead Bay man convicted of conspiring to kill U.S. soldiers overseas to 27 years behind bars on March 2 — despite the James Madison High School dropout's claims that he never meant to harm anyone.

"I admit that I may have had certain radical thoughts and opinions, but I never decided to kill anyone," 24-year-old Betim Kaziu told Brooklyn federal Judge John Gleeson before his sentencing. "I wish I never went down this path. I regret a lot of the things I did in the past and I just want to go home."

Judge Gleeson didn't honor Kaziu's request, claiming that the homegrown terrorist sympathizer hadn't learned his lesson in the 29 months that he's been incarcerated.


"You grew up in Brooklyn and you decided to murder your own country's soldiers," Gleeson said. "As a 19-year-old kid you failed miserably in high school and you got swept up in jihad. I doubt your capacity to commit terrorism has been diminished."

Kaziu, who friends say grew up on E. 17th Street near Avenue X, was found guilty of planning to kill American troops, then traveling onward to Pakistan, where he planned to join al-Qaeda.

Federal prosecutors said Kaziu was very close to his objective: he had already recorded a martyrdom video, which is common for suicide bombers and terrorists who did not plan to come back from a mission.

On the video, Kaziu said that he was would soon depart for jannah — a paradise reserved for martyrs.

Kaziu was arrested in Kosovo in 2009 before he could hurt anyone, but federal prosecutors proved at trial that



terrorists had recruited him in his own Brooklyn bedroom — over the Internet.

Some of the most damning evidence in the two-week trial came from Sulejmah Hadzovic, Kaziu's childhood friend who was also brainwashed by Internet speeches by Anwar al-Awlaki and propaganda videos produced by al-Qaeda and al-Shabaab, but never went as far as Kaziu.

During his testimony, Hadzovic said that he and Kaziu went to the same high school. They spent countless hours playing video games and talking about TV shows, but gravitated toward radical Islam after they both dropped out of school.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Seth DuCharme claimed that Kaziu traveled to Cairo to join a terrorist cell and had

hoped to die a martyr for "the cause of Islam" by fighting U.S. troops in Afghanistan and Iraq.

Hadzovic went to Egypt with Kaziu, but had a change of heart, renounced jihadism and eventually became a government witness.

DuCharme said that while in Cairo, Kaziu tried to acquire automatic weapons and join a Somali terrorist group, but ultimately ended up in Kosovo, where he plotted to kill American soldiers stationed there.

Saved by surveillance tape


Charges have been dropped against a Sheepshead Bay MTA employee who was accused of attacking a police officer in his driveway — until a surveillance tape showed that he did no such thing.

Police arrested John Hockenjos, 55, on Feb. 5 for driving at high speed into his driveway — where a group of undercover cops were responding to a call at his neighbor's — forcing one of the cops to "jump out of the way," the Daily News reported.

But Police Officer Diego Palacios's allegations carried little weight after Hockenjos and his attorney produced surveillance footage taken from the driveway security camera.

Brooklyn District Attorney Charles Hynes moved to have the charges dropped on March 1 after the surveillance tape was verified.

"I was very worried," Hockenjos told the Daily News after the charges were dropped. "These were very serious charges against me. I was facing seven years in prison."

G train extension could be cut

The reopening of a longshuttered entrance at the Fourth Avenue-Ninth Street station promises Park Slopers greater subway access — but it also marks the beginning of the end of an extension of the G train that provides a crucial transit link between North and Brownstone Brooklyns.

Commuters will no longer need to cross six busy lanes of traffic to hop the train after the Metropolitan Transportation Authority wrapped up a station facelift last Thursday, ticking off another part of the agency's massive renovation of the F train line between the Carroll Street and the Fourth Avenue-Ninth Street stations.

Yet with every bit of progress in the agency's \$257.5 million rehabilitation of the so-called Culver Viaduct, the G train extension — which two and a half years ago brought service to the Fourth Avenue-Ninth Street, Seventh Avenue, Prospect Park-15th Street, Fort Hamilton Parkway and Church Avenue stations inches closer to its last stop.

The agency lengthened the G train's route when it started work at the line's terminus at Smith-Ninth Street, connecting the borough from Greenpoint to Kensington with one-seat service fitting of the nickname "The Brooklyn Lo-

But the MTA is only obligated to keep the train running at those stations until the project is finished next winter.

MTA Spokesman Charles Seaton told The Brooklyn Paper that "a decision hasn't been made" about whether the agency would keep the G train running at those five stations come next fall, declining to comment further until reviewing a feasibility

The agency initially said it would make the G train extension permanent, but later backtracked amid budgetary woes.

MTA brass and politicians cheered the \$3.6 million entrance revamp, which Councilman Brad Lander (D-Park Slope) called "historic" and Borough President Markowitz - who contributed \$2 million to the project — described as an example of "government doing good things."

But many straphangers said the addition of the staircase is no consolation if the MTA plans to eliminate the G train extension.

"It's a pain," said Matt Flammer, a Fort Greene resident who commutes to Park Slope.

"It means you have to wake up half an hour earlier. And that makes you that much more grumpy in the morning."

Thankfully for commuters along the G line, transit insiders say there's still hope for the train.

Gene Russianoff, spokesman for the transportation advocacy group the Straphangers Campaign, said the city will likely consider how much use the G train gets at those five stations before deciding whether to make the temporary service permanent.

"I can tell you from private meetings with [city officials], they've been impressed by the amount of ridership at those locations," Russianoff said. "I'd like to see it continue."

will hurt the veteran lawmaker's chances in an election where he's enjoyed front-runner status since announcing his candidacy.

"Getting sidelined can disrupt a campaign," said Mike Geller, who heads the Highway Democratic Club. "This is not a slam dunk for Fidler by any means. It's going to be close."

Fidler was still hospitalized by Monday evening and declined to speak to us when we paid him a visit. A source said he'd be out of the hospital in a few days.

hospitalization caused Fidler to miss a debate in Manhattan Beach last week where Storobin an attorney and vice president of the Kings County Republican Party — was given a chance to touch on everything from gay marriage to school vouchers for 90 uninterrupted minutes.

A second debate at the

Flatbush Park Jewish Center on Avenue U in Mill Basin scheduled for March 1 was canceled.

Yet Fidler insists that he will be making up for lost time.

"I can't wait for the opportunity to discuss my record and vision for the future," Fidler said in a statement.

But he'll have to move fast to stymie the growing support for Storobin — especially among the more conservative Orthodox Jewish and Russian voters in the Democratic but heavily right-leaning district, which stretches from Mill Basin to Brighton Beach.

In recent weeks Storobin has picked up key endorsements from prominent Jewish leaders, one of whom even wrote a letter warning his followers that voting for Fidler would break the Torah's commandments because the councilman supports same-sex marriage.

Storobin is counting on the wave of Jewish support that helped Republican

newcomer Bob Turner beat Democratic Assemblyman David Weprin (D-Queens) in a special election in 2010 to replace former Democrat Rep. Anthony Weiner, who resigned in a cyber-sexting scandal.

Turner's surprise win emRepublicans vowed to spend up to \$500,000 on Storobin's bid for Kruger's seat - and help push Southern Brooklyn farther to the right. That support evaporated after GOP leaders announced plans to eliminate Kruger's district.

"We're in great shape heading into the last two weeks," Storobin said. "I feel very confident."

Political analysts said Storobin has reason to be optimistic, since Fidler has all-but disappeared from the public eye.

"Fidler's illness didn't choose the best time to attack him," said political analyst Hank Sheinkopf. "The more you get out there campaigning [the better it is] and he can't campaign right now."



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


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PS 255 'Math Night' draws big numbers

IN COLD CASH

Capote mansion sells for \$12 million

Truman Capote has another best seller.

The Brooklyn Heights mansion where the legendary author wrote "Breakfast at Tiffany's" sold for \$12 million — making it the most expensive house to change hands in the borough's history.

Nearly two years after Sotheby's listed the stately yellow manse on Willow Street, a buyer snatched up the home and two moving trucks from Yonkers were parked in front on Monday night.

Despite the home's literary trappings, the buyers say they aren't the kinds of literary luminaries and art-world scenesters who frequented Capote's lavish Brooklyn Heights parties.

"Trust me, we're not celebrities," said the new owner, who declined to reveal her last name to protect her two young children. "We're just a boring family."

"It's a magical house and we just fell in love with it," she said.

Broker Karen Heyman, whose other clients include Jennifer Aniston and Heights dweller and "The Office" actress Amy Ryan, declined to comment on the sale.

But when Heyman listed the home for \$18

million in 2010, she told This paper the manse was "like living in a country estate in Brooklyn — with a lot more history."

The 11-bedroom residence has 11 fireplaces, seven and a half baths, a gated driveway, two eat-in kitchens, a back porch and a mural copied from the John F. Kennedy White House.

The home inspired Capote's "A House on the Heights" and its oft-quoted opening line, "I live in Brooklyn. By choice."

The author rented the ground floor from Broadway producer Oliver Smith as he wrote his best-known books including "In Cold Blood" from between 1955 and 1965. Smith later designed the set for the theatrical version of "Breakfast at Tiffany's."

Decades later, Nicholas Callaway, publisher of Madonna's children's books, moved in with his family.

Neighbors say they are glad to see some new life in the old house.

"I've never been inside, but it looks like the kind of place we'd all like to live in," said Charley Grant, who grew up across the street. "This is the kind of property that makes Brooklyn Heights special."

Brooklyn Heights is no stranger to pricey property. The borough's second most-expen-

sive home, on Columbia Heights, sold for \$11-million in late January.

And Capote's castle isn't the only literary lair — Norman Mailer's nautical-themed abode on Columbia Heights recently hit the market along with his myriad books, a 1960s jukebox and other treasures.

But the fate of that lofty \$2.5-million apartment remains unclear as the hedge fund manager who bought is suing to be released from his contract due to possible building code violations.

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Brain trauma film a profile in bravery

Expect to laugh and cry at this documentary

It's every family's nightmare: a healthy, active, joke-cracking youngster suffers a sudden traumatic brain injury, forcing him and his loved ones to redefine happiness as their lives are changed forever.

In 1995, Susan and Isaac Michalowski of Sheepshead Bay were doting parents raising two energetic sons when their eldest, Eric, a 19-vear-old jock who wanted to study sports medicine in college, was hit by a van, leaving him in a coma and then — after multiple surgeries — confined to a wheelchair.

Eric's heroic journey to breathe, talk, move, recognize his family, and laugh once more is profiled in Kavery Kaul's inspirational and critically acclaimed indie documentary, "Back Walking Forward." It explores the injury's aftermath, and spotlights the unconditional love and support of his parents, and younger brother Jeffrey, who provide Eric with round-the-clock care. It was presented to rave reviews at last year's Sprout Film Festival, among other national and international venues, and is set to enrapture new viewers at the Brooklyn Museum for National Brain Injury Awareness Month on March 18.

"Back Walking Forward" puts a human face on a major global public health crisis, but its potency lies in Kaul's masterful portrayal of an ordinary family dealing with extraordinary issues, using love, devotion and humor as therapeutic tools.

"After Eric's brain injury, I was broken-hearted, I didn't know if he was going to live or die, but there was no time for despairing, I needed to take care of his needs," says Susan Michalowski, a vivacious teacher whose words tumble out like a waterfall.

Today, Eric, now 35, eats by himself, walks with assistance, and holds conver-

sations — gains which have surpassed the expectations of his therapists and doctors who once thought he would have the functioning skills of an infant, if he survived at all. The miracle man is also horseplaying again, to the delight of his family.

"The other day I was washing his face and he tells me with that impish grin of his, 'Oh go wash your own face!'," giggled Susan.

Kaul, who met the Michalowskis through Eric's neurosurgeon, Dr. Kathryn Ko, shares touching glimpses of their daily routine, from trips to the rehab center and the grocery store, to family outings capped by jolly banter at their breakfast table. The award-winning filmmaker, whose movies challenge assumptions, bridge worlds and shatter barriers, came away humbled.

'Susan and Isaac never lost a chance to crack a joke, and I don't think it's by chance that Eric teases us in so many scenes of the documentary — it runs in the family," says Kaul.

Their lack of self-pity is impressive.

'This is the hand we were dealt — play it the best you can and don't fold," says Isaac Michalowski, an electrical engineer and a former scoutmaster who now volunteers for the U.S.O.

He is seen joined at the

hip with his son as they frolic in an adult acquacise class at Kingsborough Community College.

Expect to cry—and laugh — as Eric triumphs with a wit and maturity defying his injury: "I am Eric #2. I used to be Eric #1. He died in a car accident," he declares in one segment. In another, he states, "I can't think. No brain." In yet another, he vows, "I WILL walk!"

The cheeky communiques indicate his progress.

"Tell Eric he has an attitude and he wants to know about his longitude!" says Susan who adds that her son, now without any neurological filters, is quick to speak his mind - sometimes leaving her rolling her eyes. "If he sees a bald man, he'll say, 'Hi, baldy'!"

The Kodak moments are provided by the movie star, himself, such as when he lip-syncs to Louis Prima's version of "Just a Gigolo," proving that even a traumatic brain injury is no match for the human spirit.

Enterprise will send a van to take me to the rental office at no charge. There is, however, a sales tax, licensing tax, recovery tax, title tax, and facility tax. The total cost for this \$30 automobile rental is now \$65.74, more than double the advertised price.

If any branch of our government is searching for transparency and truth in advertising, start here.

The New York Times tells us that the income of the wealthiest one percent of the nation, the so-called "one-percenters" — ranges from \$380,000 a year to Warren Buffet's billions. Criminal suspects in Malaysia are detained indefinitely without charge or trial, tortured in detention, and rearrested upon court-ordered release, says Human Rights Watch in its 2011 World Report. "Malaysia was like a prison for me," says a 31-year-old woman who migrated from Cambodia to support her disabled brother and elderly parents, but returned home after suffering regular beatings and being denied food.

her to take me to my agent, she locked me inside a room and didn't give me any food for a week."

Josh Rubin

Valley, NY, on Nov. 1 more than 100 miles from where Rubin's body was discovered. The two men, who appear to be in their late teens or early 20s, were captured on surveillance cameras as they made multiple purchases at several stores in the mall, investigators claim.

Rubin went missing from his apartment in Kensington on the night of Oct. 31 — the day before the first rent payment on his new Newkirk Avenue cafe, Whisk, was due.

His body was found off the side of a Pennsylvania road the next morning. In the intervening hours, he had been shot and set on fire. Authorities say that Rubin may have been moonlighting as a drug dealer before he disappeared.

The small 36-member S. Whitehall township police department has been investigating the case largely on its own, since Rubin's body was found in its jurisdiction, although it's still unclear where Rubin was killed.

The surveillance footage is the first break detectives have had in months — vet Pennsylvania authorities insist the investigation has never been at a standstill.

"I wouldn't say there's any log jam," said Debbie Garlicki, a spokeswoman for the Lehigh County District Attorney's office, which is assisting the S. Whitehall police. "It's been an active investigation the whole time. [Now] we're asking for the public's

Rubin detectives snub federal help

The investigation into Josh Rubin's grisly murder spans across two states and multiple police jurisdictions, but a small 36-member police force in Pennsylvania is handling the case largely on its own — and has snubbed critical FBI assistance that could help them capture the beloved cafe owner's killer.

The federal law enforcement agency asked to join the investigation into Rubin's disappearance and murder, but detectives from the S. Whitehall Township have yet to take the feds up on its offer, an FBI spokeswoman confirmed last week.

But the FBI would be a boon to the case: it has many resources the S. Whitehall Township doesn't, and its authority isn't limited by state lines, so it can investigate in all the jurisdictions the case has snaked through: Kensington, where Rubin disappeared on Oct. 31; S. Whitehall Township, where he was found shot and burned the next morning; and Orange County, NY, where police say two men used Rubin's credit cards less than

12 hours after his body was found on the side of a road.

The NYPD would not say if it was involved in a cross-state investigation but the authorities in Pennsylvania said the NYPD was assisting them.

"The homicide task force here is working with the NYPD," said Debbie Garlicki, a spokeswoman from the Lehigh County District Attorney's office. "They've been very cooperative."

Experts say determining where the homicide occurred is integral to the in-

"Once you figured out where the guy was murdered, then a whole lot of options open up," said Dennis Kenney, a professor at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice. "But it could be that somebody was smart enough to realize that by spreading it around multiple jurisdictions nobody was going to pick up on it."

That appeared to be the case for Rubin's killer: investigators didn't realize that the body in Pennsylvania was the cafe owner until two months after Rubin disappeared.

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SHOULD CHARTERS RULE OUR SCHOOLS?



Success Charter Network, one of Mayor Bloomberg's favorite charter school operators, hopes to expand rapidly in Brooklyn in the coming months. The charter's founder, former Councilwoman Eva Moskowitz, argues that her schools can improve the quality of primary education in neighborhoods with struggling public schools. But many parents say Success schools — and other charters — will undermine public schools in their neighborhoods and lessen parental influence over education citywide. We asked two major players in the controversy to chime in.

My charters will be models of excellence

s a mother raising three young children in the city, I know how hard it is to find great public schools. That's why I've dedicated my life to creating schools that I'd want for my own children—ones that are well-rounded, rigorous and diverse so that students can have the crosscultural experiences they'll find in the real world.

Success Academy Cobble Hill and Success Academy Williamsburg, which will

open this fall, are those kinds of schools. Located within two of Brooklyn's most racially and socioeconomically diverse school districts, I'm hoping these schools become models of integration and excellence.

That is the driving factor behind opening in these neighborhoods, despite a well-organized campaign to spread misinformation about our motives. Luckily, parents are smarter than that and have done their homework, attended information sessions and school tours so they can make informed decisions. Both Cobble Hill and Williamsburg already have more applications than we have seats available. What's more encouraging is that those applications come from across their districts.

In Williamsburg, applicants are from the South Side, the North Side and everywhere in between. They are African-American, Latino and white. More than 30 percent of potential students are English Language

Learners, which we're thrilled about given the district's large Latino community

Faced with a choice of sending their kids to struggling or overcrowded district schools; paying an astonishing \$40,000 for private school; or moving out of town, Brooklyn parents are sending a loud and clear message that those options won't cut it. What they want is simple: a good public school for their kids.

Success Academy students are achieving at very high levels. Last year, 86 percent of Success Academy Harlem 1 fourth graders and 91 percent of fifth graders rated proficient in English Language Arts. 100 percent of fourth graders and 98 percent of fifth graders scored proficient in math. By comparison, just 44 percent of students citywide achieved proficiency in English and 57 percent scored proficient in math.

In the next five weeks, we expect many more in-district parents to learn about our schools and apply for more slots than are available, necessitating a lottery. We wish we could provide seats to everyone who wants one, but instead, strongly support efforts to improve existing schools and create new ones so that every child has access to a great education.

s I toss my twelfth glossy Success Academy Charter School brochure in the recycling, I wonder what would happen if the millions Success Academy spent rabidly pursuing my family were spent on our local schools.

Success Academy wants to bring me "choice," a trojan horse that masks their true intentions; to systematically dismantle public schools and profit from the "New Market Tax Credits" hedge funders

get from investing in charter schools. Just as WalMart (a big funder of charters) destroys local shops, corporate charters destroy local schools. That's not a choice I want.

I did my due diligence before deciding where to enroll my children. I looked at teacher and student attrition, peeled back marketing rhetoric, and unpacked language describing pedagogy and curriculum. I've been on so many school tours that my head spins, and I haven't seen a single corporaterun charter school that merits the money and attention being lavished on it. I chose my local school.

Supporters of Success Academy will accuse me of being a union lackey. I'm not. They will say that I'm a supporter of the status quo. Far from it. I have lived in this district for many years and watched our local schools improve through diversity. I believe equity comes through public education, not segregated and privatized charter schools.

For the first time, our local schools are attracting families who would have otherwise enrolled in the progressive East Village schools. And we're doing it without a million dollar marketing budget. Our district parents wisely recognize that test scores don't tell the real story of learning. We choose less testing, not high test scores.

Our district has "choice" covered. Like French? Come to PS 110. Spanish? PS 84's

dual language program. Super small class sizes? The Nest Program at PS 84 is starting in the fall. Parents can get in on the ground floor of the new, progressive Brooklyn Arbor School. PS 132's community service was honored by the White House. PS 31 is considered one of best in the city. There's room for children at all of these schools, including three other charters and another Success Academy.

Our parents bring their entrepreneurial spirit into our schools, starting music programs, building green roofs, and creating robotic teams.

Our schools represent the winning combination of strong leadership, diversity in the classrooms, meaningful curriculum, parent engagement, and committed teachers. And we don't need a lottery to attend them.

Jews traditionally dress up and bake special hamentashen cookies





Jaguars 3 is Sunset Park's latest not-so-family restaurant

alk about one-stop shopping!

Brooklynites can satiate more than just a hunger for a bowl of spaghetti at Jaguars 3 — the multilevel, jungle-themed, Italian restaurant-slash-Vegas-style nightclub-slash-bikini bar that finally emerged in a cloud of dance-floor smoke on 47th Street near Second Avenue in

It's been a full year since we first reported on Vincent Faraci's leopard-printed extravaganza — so were more than a little excited to finally receive an invite to the grand opening party. Appletinis! Aerialists! Dancing ladies! Meatballs! Life-sized stuffed zebras! Does it get any better?

Well welcome to the jungle, baby — trumpeting elephants and growling lions herald your passage as you ascend from the thatched and bambooed foyer to the massive, illuminated lounge and bar. Just try not to get cute when you order your drink (no bathtub gin cocktails or small-batch elderflower

infusions here); the bartendress met our request for a signature tipple with a befuddled stare, then offered us a Cosmo or Sex on the Beach. And what about white wines?

"We have Pinot Grigio. Also, Pinot Grigio." Fair enough.

If you want to create a base for your booze, dinner is served until 3 am on a raised platform overlooking the dance floor. Although wildly expensive (appetizers range from \$11-15, pastas from \$18.50-\$45, and entrees \$21-\$65) most of it is probably better than it needs to be. Accomplished chef Rocco Di Lullo (formerly of Hotel Cipriani in Venice), displays a particularly deft hand with fish — our table raved over the perfectly cooked calamari (both fried and braised with eggplant), baked clams, and sea bass in tomato sauce.

Of course, anything tastes better when the Soprano's Paulie Walnuts and Big Ang from Mob Wives are at the next table

"It's like being an extra in a '70s mafia movie, but in

the best way possible," observed a dinner companion. "I've never felt more like I lived in Brooklyn until now."

Once you've danced and dined, gather your dollar bills and a dirty martini and head to the cabaret (ie: thong-clad babes getting athletic on poles). Feeling a little frisky yourself? The well-appointed bathrooms contain much of what you'll need to continue the party at home —from blow pops to perfumes to mesh halter body stockings. You know, just in case you need a spare.

So perhaps Jaguars 3 isn't destined to become your regular watering hole — or maybe it is, big baller — but whenever your pleasure runs to old-school Italian meals and no frills cocktails, or if your ready to rock a fresh blow-out and kneehigh boots and hit the dance floor with the girls, or maybe just angling to get a half-nekkid look at them, well, you'd be hard pressed to find anywhere better in Brooklyn.



Red 'Haring'!

he people's artist of New York is coming

The early works of New York's quintessential street scrawler Keith Haring is coming to the Brooklyn Museum on March 16 in a multimedia testimony and tribute to an artist whose rise to stardom defied tradition.

"Haring went directly to his audience," said Julia Gruen, executive director of the Keith Haring Foundation. "Rather than being promoted, presented and sort of nurtured by a particular gallery, connoisseur or collector who might

have introduced this young artist. Instead Keith just leaped over that stage and went directly to the people of New York City."



Haring's work is famously unconstrained by the exclusivity of the traditional, gallery venue, and his use of simple, cartoonish style to illustrate themes of birth, death, sex, war and AIDS, is arresting, and struck a chord with a city polarized by excess and poverty, a wild nightlife scene, rising crime rates and the AIDS epidemic.

"He really embraced the culture of New York, the graffiti and the night life, the city was his medium," said Tricia Bloom, curator of the Haring exhibit. "He wanted to intervene with the public experience in ways that hadn't happened before."

The exhibition — the first large-scale showing of Haring's work in NYC since the Whitney Museum's exhibit in 1997 — will cover the artist's earliest work from 1978-1982, and features 155 works on paper, seven experimental films, and more than 150 archival objects, among them rarely seen sketchbooks, journals, exhibition flyers, posters, subway drawings, and documentary photographs.

"Something that sets this show apart is the curator took the chance to narrow the focus on Haring," said Gruen. "By trying to cover an artist's entire career you lose something. By taking that more narrow focus you learn so much and that's what we hope for this Haring show."

Invisible Dog's visual exhibition: Art gallery opens a new season

Three Brooklyn artists are capturing more than 365 moments in time using artists in astronaut suits, a gargantuan sculpture based on the messiah, and Victorian beauties topped with intestines.

The Invisible Dog, a Bergen Street gallery, will launch its spring season on Saturday with delightful depictions of past and present, while also opening the gallery's 30 artist stu-

dios to the public — the only chance to glimpse the private rooms this year.

"Each and every one of us grows and evolves according to his or her own tempo," said Lucien Zayan, director of the Bergen Street gallery. "People should come here with time to spend, to explore the different perspectives."

The trio of exhibitions feature R. Justin

Stewart's "Distorting (a messiah project, 13C)," a giant web of rope and plastic synpases that beckons visitors to step inside: commercial illustrator Daniel Horowitz's "365," a collection of drawings created every day over the course of a year; and

photographer Malcolm Brown's 32 quirky, moody, and true portraits of the artists-in-residence at the Invisible Dog.

Stewart's sculpture takes up the entire first floor with two

years' worth of data on the Jewish concept of the messiah in the 13th Century. Users can scan bar codes for snippets on a phalanx of subjects including suffering, resurrection and the end times.

Horowitz will show off his analog experiment of 365 whimsical drawings of televisions with tongues and a gorilla head on a gowned belle, and Brown's

32 quirky and moody portraits reveal the artists of the gallery in their natural environment.

The photographs include include a dreamy sculptor being grasped by clay hands, a welder balancing in an astronaut uniform of padded blankets, and jewelry maker pressing a gilded mustache under his nose.

"It's a diverse body of work that's part fiction but mostly a snapshot of the personalities here," Brown said. "One of the toughest things a photographer can do is distill someone down to one pho-

Big flavor in a 'Petit' package

Quaint eatery is revamping Bay Ridge's restaurant row

reat things come in small pack-

Petit Oven in Bay Ridge is cozy, to say the least. A tight cluster of two- and four-top tables barely seats 30, with minimal wiggle room. A refined menu of classic French dishes is brief it needs to be, considering there's usually only one person working all the burners.

That would be chef/owner Katarzyna "Kat" Ploszaj, whose shock of whiteblonde hair is easily identifiable from ing oysters, rolling fresh pasta, reducing buerre blanc, slow baking salmon, sear-

ing free-range chicken, and dishing up wedges of her famous bread pudding with salted caramel.

It's a game-changer for Bay Ridge's Restaurant Row, which, despite being a long-time contender in Italian, Middle Eastern, and classic American cuisine was a bit behind on local and seasonal when Petit Oven opened four and a half years ago.

"I've lived in Bay Ridge for over 14 years, so I knew, when I finally opened my own restaurant, I wanted it to be here," Ploszaj

"I was classically trained at the French Culinary Institute, I grew up on a farm in Poland, knowing where my food came from — I remember my grandfather butchering a whole pig to make

kielbasa," she continued.

"Although no one was doing this kind of food at the time in Bay Ridge - local, seasonal, changing the menu every day, I trusted that people in this neighborhood cared about where their food was coming

At Petit Oven, customers can count on DeBragga and D'artagnan meats, Amish chickens, Finger Lakes Farms dairy, and greenmarket vegetables - Ploszaj even has Swiss Chard and other goodies grown for her at the Narrows Botanical Gardens on Shore Road.

And although it's difficult to predict what permutations those ingredients might take on Petit Oven's ever-evolving

menu (flash-smoked duck breast, roasted marrow bones and sweet potato gnocchi one week might become billi bi, coq au vin, and fettuccini with forest mushrooms the next), a growing number of regulars lie in wait for particular dishes — placing calls to Ploszaj for a hint of when they might again make the menu.

"I have a very big pork belly following," laughs Ploszaj. "I have people contacting me about it from Staten Island. Especially our play on pork and beans - slow braised pork belly brined for 48 hours, Asian-influenced bean cassoulet, and some nice local sautéed kale."

This Bed-Stuy custom cheesecake maker puts booze in the batter

ow you can have your liquor and eat it too. One Clinton Hill man is a construction contractor by day and cheesecake baker at night, whipping up alcohol-infused creations he calls "Sexual Chocolate," "Rum Raisin" and "Luck of the Irish."

Custom cabinetry is great, but what this father of six really loves is baking booze.

"In New York City, you have to have a job, a career and some hustle," said Yusuf Suluki, who's shilling custommade treats through his home catering company, 3 Fish 5 Loaf. "I can't help it. I love to bridge genres."

Suluki entered the underground cheesecake frontier a few years ago, naming his company in honor of a favorite Bible story — when Jesus fed 5,000 hungry men with just five loaves of bread and two fish.

With one more fish to his name, he's not turning water into wine, but liqueurs into cheesecake.

Each sweet serving has about a shot of Baileys or Captain Morgan fused with a hazelnut-, caramel-, and even mint-flavored bases.

Suluki is currently testing a Hennessey and a "Sex on the Beach" concoction in his super secret home kitchen, and says that people can make requests based on their favorite cocktails — within reason.

"It's an art form," he said. "You can't just pour liquor in it and whip it up. You don't want the alcohol to overpower the content of the cake."

Fort Greene resident Cynthia Dennard discovered Suluki's cakes after he did some work on her brownstone, and had a "Coquito" cake in tow.

"I thought, 'What, you put on a cape at night and make cheesecake?" she said. "It was so unusual, but delicious."

Suluki also serves fruit-filled and diabetic-friendly cheesy sweets, with three-by-four-inch samples starting

■ ot that you should revert to a can of Heinz if that pork belly is a Petit Oven no-show — this recipe is easy enough to make in your own little kitchen at home.

INGREDIENTS: For the Pork belly

Pork belly 1 cup sugar 1 cup salt

2 tblsp. whole peppercorns

DIRECTIONS:

Score the fat side of the pork belly. Rub in the

sugar, salt, and peppercorns, and refrigerate for 24 hours.

Rinse the pork belly and pat dry. Season with a little salt, sugar and ground black pepper.

Put in a baking dish with 1/2 inch of water. Bake at 300 degrees for three hours, or until

the meat pulls away easily with a fork. Add more water if necessary. Raise the temperature to 375, and bake until

the pork belly is a deep golden brown.

INGREDIENTS: For the Bean Cassoulet

1 bag dried white beans (soak overnight In water)

1 carrot

1 small onion 2 celery ribs

1 can of whole tomatoes

3 bay leaves Salt/pepper

1 stalk of celery, finely diced 1 shallot, finely diced

1 jalapeno, finely diced

1 tsp. sesame oil 2 tblsp. soy sauce 1 tsp. Nam Pla (fish sauce)

Cook the beans and vegetables in water until tender. Do not salt until the end. Combine with the beans right before serving.

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

The Boys and Girls Kangaroos jumped all over South Shore High School on March 4, beating them 63-51 at the Public School Athletic League Class AA boys basketball quarterfinals at St. John's University - thanks mostly to the efforts of hoops phenom Leroy "Truck" Fludd.

Each contest had a common denominator: Fludd was at his best, coach Ruth Lovelace said.

"He's that guy who's been on the two championship teams, he's been in a lot of big games," Lovelace explained. "He knows what it takes. He relishes the chal-


When the team met at Boys and Girls High early on Sunday morning, Lovelace asked Fludd if he was prepared for the contest.

But Fludd just laughed. "I was born ready," he said.

Fludd scored nine of Boys High's first 12 points and finished with a gamehigh 20 as the Brooklyn school returned to the final four for the seventh time in nine vears.

"I had to send a message to the other team — it's the playoffs," Fludd, a senior. said. "They wanted to try to stop me, but they couldn't."

His right-handed baseline slam gave the Kangaroos an early 10-point lead,

an advantage they would never surrender. They led 29-20 at halftime and South Shore (19-9), bedeviled by turnover woes and 15 missed free throws, never got closer than six the rest of the way.

Fludd has a relatively quiet second half offensively, but teammates such as Bryce Jones (12 points), Rashad Andrews (10 points) and Courtney Solomon emerged on the offensive end and Shakur Pinder played a major role defending the Vikings' forwards inside in helping the Kangaroos hold South Shore to one of its lowest scoring

outputs of the year.

"Since I've been the coach, that's been the catalyst to our success," Lovelace said. "We're gonna do great defensively. I think our defense bothered them today."

It also helped that South Shore kept shooting itself in the foot. It never could get a run together. When the Vikings got within 34-28 midway through the third quarter, Terrence Samuel (eight points) committed a turnover and Shamiek Sheppard (six points) missed everything on a jump shot.

After a Tyrone Johnson

basket, South Shore only trailed 52-45 with less than three minutes to go, but Fludd hit two free-throws and the Kangaroos made 11 of their final 12 attempts at the charity stripe.

The South Shore Vikings entered the year led by the highly recruited duo of Samuel and Sheppard, yet their season ended once again to Boys and Girls (22–6).

Only this time, they didn't blow the lead. South Shore never had one.

"We just needed to play better," South Shore coach Mike Beckles said. "We had opportunities to play, we just didn't take advantage of them."

While South Shore goes home, Boys High has its sights set on a third straight city championship. But to get back to the Garden, the Kangaroos will have to get by their fierce rivals at Lincoln High School.

"It doesn't matter who's in our way," Lovelace said. "As the No. 2 seed, we've had to pay the toughest bracket. Maybe it will be good for

They won two of three matchups from the Railsplitters, though star sophomore Isaiah Whitehead missed the last meeting in the Brooklyn borough playoffs and sustained an ankle injury late in the third quarter of the middle meeting with Lincoln ahead by seven points. Boys High rallied for an overtime win without him.

Thomas Jefferson High School trounced Wadleigh High on Sunday, defeating the Tigers at the Public School Athletic League Class AA quarterfinals, 56–46.

Wadleigh was right there with Thomas Jefferson late in the first half — within three points midway through the third quarter — and fans in the stands at the Carnesecca Arena were sensing that the eighth-seeded Tigers could upset the top-seeded Orange Wave.

But that's when Thomas Jefferson's Thaddeus Hall snapped his wrists a few times, hitting one three-pointer longer than the next. The crowd remained loud — but it was all in support of Hall. A few minutes later, the Public School Athletic League Class AA quarterfinal was no longer in doubt.

Hall scored 11 of his gamehigh 25 points in a quarterclosing 17–7 run and Jefferson cruised to an 80-61 rout of Wadleigh on Sunday night.

"That's what Thaddeus has done since he's come back," Jefferson coach Lawrence "Bud" Pollard said.

The flashy 6-foot-5 Hall's eye-popping performance has indeed become typical since he returned from a back injury in early January. The Orange Wave (24–6) have lost just once—against national powerhouse St. Anthony of Jersey City—in those contests with Hall often bludgeoning the opponent.

"I don't feel like anyone can stop me," said Hall, who grabbed seven rebounds and picked up a scholarship offer from St. John's after the impressive display in front of head man Steve Lavin.

Until recently, most of his baskets have come from inside the three-point arc. He's begun to find his stroke after noticing on film he was fading away on his jump shot rather than going straight up. Hall sank six three-pointers in last Wednesday's second-round victory over Robeson and hit four more on Sunday.

"I think I have more confidence than anybody playing basketball right now," he said. "When you have confidence, that's when shots fall."

While Hall's effort has become commonplace, Jalen Evans's performance was a pleasant surprise. The reserve guard

scored 17 points and added three assists. He helped further the rout by knifing into the lane as Wadleigh paid extra attention to Hall and Jaquan "Son Son" Lynch, who had 14 points and five assists.

"I thought [Evans] was the MVP today," Pollard said. "He changed the tempo of the game. He got to the basket and he made plays."

Basil Harley led Wadleigh (23–7) with 25 points and Louis Costen had 10.

It was particularly satisfying for Evans, a senior whose father, Ken Evans, nearly came to blows with Pollard during the loss to St. Anthony on Feb. 15. Evans's pop took umbrage with Pollard over the coach's treatment of his son, and the two nearly come to blows.

"I put that behind me, I want to win a championship," Evans said about the near fisticuffs. "This could be my last game, it's the playoffs, I want to go out the right way."

Pollard said he hasn't spoken with Ken Evans, a childhood friend, since the incident. He wasn't in attendance on Sunday, but if he was, Pollard joked: "Instead of a slug, I would give him a hug."

After getting over the initial shock, Evans used his father's argument as motivation. He put in more hours in the gym and

Talk about changing one's stars!

The Aviators ended their final week of regular season play with one loss and three huge wins — including two back-to-back victories against the Federal Hockey League's top-ranked team, the hated New Jersey Outlaws — and A's coach Rob Miller couldn't be happier.



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

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
