City chops Boardwalk planks

It's official: the Boardwalk is going to get a concrete makeover.

The city's Public Design Commission unanimously approved the Parks Department's plan to replace a section of the Boardwalk with concrete and recycled plastic lumber on Monday — outraging Coney Island residents and preservationists who fear that the controversial project will ruin the historic beachfront walkway's look and feel and pave the way toward turning the rest of the iconic 79-year-old promenade into an ordinary sidewalk.

"This is a sad day for Coney Island when concrete is made a part of our Boardwalk," said Rob Burstein, the president of the Coney-Brighton Boardwalk Alliance.

The commission's 6–0 vote gives the Parks Department permission to tear out the wooden Boardwalk between Coney Island Avenue and Brighton 15th Street, and install a 12-foot wide concrete lane that can support emergency vehicles. A 19-foot pathway built out of recycled plastic boards will be put on either side of the concrete path to accommodate foot traffic, according to the city plan.

But the Public Design Commission's approval hinges on the Parks Department consideration Continued on Page 16

Fishermen: Blackfish nix hurts business

Sheepshead Bay's recreational fishing fleet is reeling from a state edict that shortened the little-known, but quite lucrative, blackfish fishing season — a business-killing measure that many now claim was based on faulty fish statistics.

The state Department of Environmental Conservation shortened the 2012 blackfish fishing season — which usually runs from October until April — for recreational casters by 70 days, forcing it to end in January. The agency also increased the minimum size limit of the catch by 2 inches, so that many of the blackfish that were hooked had to be returned to the sea.

PINCHED PUP FOUND

Stolen Yorkie is back at pet shop after a cloak-and-dagger style drop off

A valuable Yorkshire Terrier swiped from a Flatbush Avenue pet shop last month was returned safe and sound last Thursday after employees received a series of cryptic messages leading them to the 10-week-old puppy — a cuddly little pooch Puppy Paradise owner David Dietz has named "Brooklyn."

"He's a Brooklyn-based dog now," an overjoyed Deitz said after finding the small dog cowering in a box at the Floridian Diner, right where the woman who cared for the \$1,400 Yorkie for the past three weeks said he would be. "He has the experience of being dog-napped in Flatbush, so I think we'll go with Brooklyn."

Brooklyn is back where he belongs, but it wasn't easy, as the search for the prized pup morphed into a hostage drama and ended in a bizarre treasure hunt.

The two teens who were videotaped taking the dog on Feb. 16 were arrested last week, but Brooklyn was never found.

No one knew where Brooklyn was — or even if he was alive — until March 7, when pet shop employee Mary Weinstein received the first of two covert phone calls.

The woman on the other end of the line, who refused to identify herself, said she had the stolen puppy and would call back the next day with the dog's location.

Store employees got the second call shortly after noon on Thursday.

"I don't want any trouble," the mystery caller told Dietz. "If you want the dog,

go to E. 87th Street and Farragut Road."

"Who are you?" Dietz demanded — but the caller had already hung up.

Dietz, with this reporter in tow, raced over to Canarsie, where he found a note tacked to a tree. In the note, the caller explained that "a boy" had given her the puppy, which she left at

the Floridian Diner — a few blocks from his store.

"This is fantastic," said Dietz upon finding the note. "I can't believe this is really happening."

Dietz sped back to Flatbush Avenue, where diner employees had already found the puppy inside a cardboard box left atop the restaurant's Claw vending machine.





"I have two Yorkies myself," said restaurant owner Steve Zaharakas, who found the Yorkie. "The dog was shaking, a little scared."

Diner employees said they saw Brooklyn's mysterious caretaker: a woman in her late 20s wearing a headband and a black jacket came into the store around noon, put the box on top of the vending machine, and made a call on a nearby pay phone.

"She was looking back and forth, trying to see if anybody was watching her and she mumbled into the

phone," said the diner's hostess. Barbara Arniotis. "Then she sprinted out of the restaurant. She was really running."

Dietz said Brooklyn appeared to be healthy, but took the puppy to the vet for a full checkup. Yorkshire Terriers need to be fed six times a day. Without the proper diet, a young Yorkie can develop hyperglycemia, sickness, infection, and liver and kidney failure, Dietz said.

If Brooklyn is given a clean bill of health, Dietz, who once claimed his business could fold if he didn't recover and sell Brooklyn, says he wants to find a good family for the adventurous pooch — at no charge.

"We don't want to look like we were only interested in finding the dog to make a profit," Dietz explained. "All we care about is making a good home for this dog and finding the right owner."





New political club vows to fight Brooklyn GOP and the status quo

Who says Southern Brooklyn's political clubs are run by stodgy old

A young, saber-rattling woman has formed her own Democratic group to stop the GOP from coming into Southern Brooklyn after realizing that the current Democrats in charge are having trouble keeping the Republican wave at bay.

Jennifer Thorpe-Moscon, a Gravesend resident who interns for Borough President Markowitz, put together her Southern Brooklyn Democrats last year, after Rep. Bob Turner (R-Sheepshead Bay) scored an upset victory to replace Democratic Rep. Anthony Weiner, who resigned amid a sexting scandal.

"It saddens me to think that we lost Weiner's seat," Thorpe-Moscon said. "It was a disgrace."

Yet, the rookie gladiator still has an important hurdle to overcome finding a meeting spot for her threemonth-old, 50-member club she hopes will become a fiery debating ground for liberal-minded political wonks to chew over issues relating to gay rights, education reform and healthcare.

"We need a new generation of motivated progressive leaders to step up," she said.

But she's not the first to challenge Brooklyn's current Democratic establishment, which is currently run by Assemblyman Vito Lopez (D-Bushwick).

The New Kings Democrats, a group that formed around the 2008 presidential election, has bared its teeth at Lopez from time to time, as has the Bay Ridge Democrats, which was established in 2010.

Justin Brannan, the president of the Bay Ridge Democrats, believes that Thorpe-Moscon is breaking new political ground by focusing on Coney Island and Sheepshead Bay.

"No one has really ever organized in that area on a grassroots level," explained Brannan, who is also an aide to Councilman Vincent Gentile (D-Bay Ridge). "It'll be a good signal for Democrats to get more involved."

Thorpe-Moscon says she wants to run home-grown candidates against Republicans looking to expand their Bay Ridge base, where the GOP clout includes Golden, Assemblywoman Nicole Malliotakis (R-Bay Ridge) and

Rep. Michael Grimm (R-Bay Ridge). She also wants to target — and get rid of — less progressive Democrats who haven't whipped up enough excitement among younger party members.

But while she claims her group is pretty left of liberal, it's endorsements tell another story: it has backed middle of the road Democratic Councilman Lew Fidler in next week's special election against Republican attorney David Storobin for disgraced ex-pol Carl Kruger's senate seat, although there were no other Democratic candidates to choose from. The group also vowed to support Andrew Gounardes, an Eagle Scout, in his uphill climb to unseat veteran state Sen. Marty Golden (R-Bay Ridge).

And experienced Southern Brooklyn leaders say Thorpe-Moscon has her work cut out for her down the line.

"It's wonderful that people are getting involved in politics," said District Leader Michael Geller (D-Sheepshead Bay), a member of the Kings Highway Democratic Club. "But they'll learn it's difficult to start a [political] organization from scratch.'

City: Waterfront park won't have access to Sheepshead Bay

Boaters say the inlet would be perfect for a small public dock

The city wants to turn a vacant Sheepshead Bay lot near the Belt Parkway on-ramp into a park with sweeping waterfront views — but doesn't want park-goers to enjoy the water.

Residents said the weedstrewn lot at the foot of Brigham Street that the Parks Department has tapped for a \$4-million makeover would be a perfect place for a public boat ramp where seafarers could launch their canoes, kayaks and other small skiffs, but the city is denying those requests, claiming that waterfront access is not part of the plan.

Critics say the park would be teeming with budding boaters and water recreation activities if the city opened its mind — and opened the waterfront to the public.

"A boat ramp makes sense. Why not open [the bay] up to more residents?" asked Steve Barrison, president of the Bay Improvement Group. "It would give the average person, not just high-end people, access to the waterfront."

The property — which is slightly larger than a football field — is jointly owned by the Parks Department and Department of Environmental Protection, which controls the section that abuts the water.

City environmental officials said residents will be barred from the strip of land at the water's edge, which once held a now-defunct sludge pump that handled sewage overflow from the nearby waste treatment plant on Knapp Street.

But boating enthusiasts said the city could install a boat ramp in a small inlet adjacent of the park that feeds into the bay.

"That would be an ideal spot," said Tony Pignatello, who heads the Sebago Canoe Club, which rents parkland on the Paerde-

gat Basin inlet in Canarsie for its water recreational activities. "[Sheepshead Bay] needs a public boat launch site."

Department of Environmental Protection spokesman Michael Saucier said the agency is considering the proposal, but Brooklyn Parks Chief of Staff Marty Maher told members of the Sheepshead Bay-Plumb Beach Civic Association last week that the site won't include a boat ramp, though he said an unused city-owned pier across from the park will be open to the public.

A Parks Department spokeswoman confirmed Maher's statement that there would be no waterfront access, but wouldn't provide any further details on the city's decision.

Boaters who belong to the several yacht clubs that line Emmons Avenue — where members pay up to \$2,300 a year to have exclusive access to the waterfront, said a

public boat ramp would be dangerous if novice boaters aren't supervised.

"That type of launch area might be unsafe," said Irene Olson, the membership chair of the Miramar Yacht Club.

Last month, the Parks Department resurrected a 20-year-old plan to transform the lot into a park that residents had wanted there since the early 1990s.

The funds earmarked for the park will cover a bare-bones open space — not the 21st century oasis with high-tech equipment that planners had once envisioned for the lot.

The park also won't have a bathroom, though Parks officials said one could be built in the future at a cost of \$1.6 million.

Maher said the park is scheduled to open in 2016.



Stalled Belt Parkway rehab starts next month

Get ready to hit the brakes.

The city is moving ahead with its multi-million-dollar makeover of a flood and pothole-prone stretch of the Belt Parkway — half a year after the project was originally supposed to start guaranteeing that one's nightly commute around Southern Brooklyn is going to get a lot worse.

The city will spend \$6.5 million to restore the highway between Coney Island Avenue and Knapp Street, which officials say is peppered with potholes and backed-up catch basins that overflow during heavy rainstorms.

The city is resurfacing the roadway and adding more basins to improve drainage. New guardrails will also be installed, city officials say.

Work on the Manhattan and Queens-bound lanes of the parkway is set to begin on April 1, and is scheduled to be completed in December, said Department of Design and Construction spokesman Craig Chin.

The project was slated to start last fall. Back then, Chin said that the city would close one lane of traffic for 11 hours each day during weekdays, and block access to two lanes of traffic

for six hours on weekends

to facilitate the work.

But Chin said the rehab was delayed for months after it was announced in September while the agency sought permission from the Parks Department to remove trees along the highway to make room for the new sewer drains.


Now the construction will take place after the evening rush hour, said Chin, who didn't provide more details.

"All the work will be performed at night to try and have less impact on drivers," he said.

Motorists said that despite the nuisance they can't wait to see the highway get fixed.

"It still has to be done, there's no way around it." said motorist Cliff Bruckenstein. "The roadway is in terrible condition."

The work is part of the city's ongoing \$500-million effort to rebuild seven outdated bridges along the Belt Parkway in Sheepshead Bay that transport more than 150,000 cars a day through Brooklyn and Queens by

GRADY GRAPPLE

Parents, kids fight to keep their 'failing' school open

Grady High School should be taken off Mayor Bloomberg's school death list because the longstruggling school is now making the grade, said the school's students, parents, and teachers last week during a rally to save the soon-to-be closed institution.

In fact, the city has given the school an overall grade of "B" on it's most-recent report card, up from a "D" two years ago, and defenders of the school say that proves it is on the right path.

"It's a huge improvement," said Jane Marziliano, who led a rally in front of William E. Grady Career and Technical School where her son is a junior — last week, calling for the school to be spared. "The school is fantastic now. It's outrageous that the city wants to close it."

The Department of Education plans to shutter the Brighton Fourth Street school this summer and resurrect it as a "turnaround

school" with a new name and overhauled staff.

City officials claim that Grady has never been grade-A material: it received a D on its city-issued report card in 2010 — a less-thanstellar score that made it one of the state's "persistently low achieving" schools.

The city put Grady in a federally funded transformation program that would have brought up to \$2 million to the school over three years to improve its performance and tapped Principal Geraldine Maione — who parents credit for the school's improved scores — to oversee the transition, but the funding never materialized: the city and the United Federation of Teachers failed to agree on a teacher evaluation system, prompting Bloomberg to scrap the federal program in favor of the city's new turnaround school model.

Under the new model, federal dollars will still come to Grady,

but only after the school fires 50 percent of its staff. John Dewey High School and Sheepshead Bay High School are also among the 33 public schools that have been singled out for what some see as a cut-throat program.


But Maione said Grady, which was opened in 1958 as an all-boys school before going co-ed in the early 1990s, should be taken off the list because its performance has improved.

"We've met the benchmark to stay open," Maione said. "I don't think we should close."

Department of Education spokesman Frank Thomas insisted that schools like Grady and Dewey would benefit from the new turnaround model.

"This is an opportunity to assess and keep what is working, and also bring in a new wave of talent." he said.

The city's Panel for Education Policy will decide Grady's fate in April.



DA: Six-year-old should take stand against mom

Prosecutors want to put a 6-year-old boy on the stand to testify against his mother — the woman who they say allegedly killed his bed-ridden, 4-year-old sister in 2010.

Assistant District Attorney Jacqueline Kagan and attorneys for Carlotta Brett Pierce debated the ramifications of allowing Pierce's son to testify on March 9, even if he already told police that he witnessed his mom force pills down his sister's throat and beat her with a belt.

The discussion got heated when Brett Pierce demanded Kagan leave her son out of the trial.

"He needs to be left alone, just leave him alone," she said, interrupting the discussion, after Kagan called Brett Pierce's son "a key witness."

"This child offers information that no one else can offer," Kagan said, according to the Daily News. "This is the witness that shows the depravity and the reckless conduct in this indictment."

Brett Pierce's daughter Marchella, who was born with a medical condition that required her to use feeding and breathing tubes, died on Sept. 2, 2010, allegedly after days of torture at the hands of her mother.

Police say Brett Pierce tied her daughter to a bed inside their apartment and battered her with household items. She also allegedly deprived her of food and water.

When Marchella died, she weighed just 18 pounds, prosecutors said, and police found marks on her wrists and ankles, a sign that she had been bound by cords.

Carlotta Brett Pierce was charged with murder after an autopsy showed Marchella died of "child abuse syndrome."

Her mother, Loretta Brett, Marchella's grandmother, is facing manslaughter charges for not preventing the child's death.



Brooklyn DA Charles Hynes also charged two city Administration for Children's Services workers for allowing the alleged torture to continue by not bothering to follow up on Marchella's case, although the two case workers are being charged separately.

The trial against Brett Pierce will begin in April. Judge Patricia DiMango has yet to decide if her son will testify in open court or through a close-circuit camera.

Home invader is guilty

A man who was caught minutes after police say he and his partner raided a tony Mill Island home in 2010 was found guilty of the violent home invasion on March 2— and it only took the jury an hour to convict him.

After a four-day trial, a jury found 49-year-old Sami Waters guilty of robbery and assault — crimes that could land him life in prison when he's sentenced in June.

His partner, William Soler, was convicted last year and has not been sentenced.

Police say that the two men, who were sporting bulletproof vests, hid in the bushes outside of an E. 65th Street home near Mill Avenue until their 52-year-old victim came out for a smoke.

The two men pulled a gun on the homeowner and dragged him into the house, where they rounded up his wife and daughter and forced them to lay down on the kitchen floor.

"Who wants to die first?" the thugs asked, taunting their victims before cracking a pistol over the 51-year-old woman's head when she wouldn't move fast enough.

The duo are alleged to have swiped \$2,000 in cash that the victim had set aside for a contractor and an additional \$45,000 worth of jewelry before fleeing the scene in the daughter's 2009 Honda Accord.

The duo ditched the car at the corner of E. 64th Street and Avenue U and were walking out of the neighborhood when they were stopped by police, but not because of the robbery — at least at first.

Cops on patrol in Mill Island thought Soler and Waters — who were decked out in jeans and long-sleeved thermal shirts and lugging backpacks on a balmy 80-degree evening — appeared suspicious and stopped to question them.

As they did so, the 911 call about the home invasion came over the radio.

Soler and Waters ran off, but the officers grabbed them after a brief foot chase, recovering their guns and the stolen property.

Annual procession breaks with years of tradition

Norwegian Americans are hitching their parade float to Third Avenue's success — and are breaking with nearly 40 years of tradition of marching along Fifth Avenue in Bay Ridge.

The Norwegian-American 17th of May Committee of Greater New York, which holds the Norwegian Constitution Day Parade each year to celebrate the nation's freedom from Sweden, says last year's turnout on Fifth Avenue was so disappointing that it decided to move to more popular pastures.

"We didn't get enough people," says Kenneth Johnson, a committee co-chairman and lodge president of the local chapter of the Sons of Norway.

Some Fifth Avenue leaders understood the move because the Scandinavian population in Brooklyn has steadily dwindled for decades, and attendance of the parade — which will be held on May 20 to mark its 60th anniversary — has shrunk along with it, they noted.

"They wanted a change of pace in an attempt to revitalize the parade," said Jim Clark, president of the Fifth Avenue Business Improvement District. "Obviously there aren't many Norwegian or Swedish people left in Bay Ridge anymore."

But other Fifth Avenue diehards worried for their peers along the rival strip.

"I'm sure a lot of them are upset that they're losing it — I would be," said Chip Cafiero, a board member of Third Avenue Merchants. "But Third Avenue is hot right now."

Fifth Avenue has been hit with a spreading plague of empty storefronts that has claimed some 30 local businesses in recent years, and the committee cited financial logistics for its change of pace because it allowed Third Avenue businesses to make donations and take out advertisements.

"We thought the Third Avenue board merchants would be more responsive toward our move," noted Johnson.

The move wasn't about

instigating a battle of the boulevards, insisted Committee Chairwoman Arlene Rutuelo, who owns Nordic Delicacies on Third Avenue, the last such business in the area, but said that didn't influence her committee's decision to reroute the merry march.

"We're trying to build Bay Ridge as a whole," she said. "Fifth Avenue [Business Improvement District] has been a great sponsor, and they're continuing to sponsor our pa-

Rutuelo pointed out that this was the third time the celebration was relocated to follow the money trail: The cavalcade originally went down Sunset Park's Eighth Avenue, named "Lapskaus Boulevard" after a North European stew, but now home to mostly Asian Americans. In the 1970s, it followed the Scandinavian population to Fifth Avenue.

"Every time it's moved. it's been for financial reasons," Rutuelo said. "It's about finding the best route for the parade."


The most coveted job in Brooklyn baseball is again in the hands of a veteran big leaguer.

of another alternative: moving the concrete lane to the Surf Avenue side of the Boardwalk so visitors to Coney Island can be closer to the beach. The Public Design Commission also requested that the city look into the possibility of replacing a small section of the Boardwalk with new wood.

But city officials say they've studied other alternatives — such as using sturdy Black Locust lumber, which is favored by preservationists for the Boardwalk — and found that concrete and recycled plastic lumber were still the best and cheapest options.

"We would greatly prefer to use wood," Alex Hart, a top Parks designer, said. "But there's nothing out there that will work."

Critics say the Public Design Commission's recommendations are meaningless, since the city isn't required to conduct these tests.

"It's a done deal even though we don't want con-

crete," said Todd Dobrin, the head of Friends of the Boardwalk.

More than 40 people testified against the city's plan during a raucous four-hour hearing.

Councilman Domenic Recchia (D-Coney Island) was one of just four people who came out in favor of the concrete overhaul.

"We have to move forward," said Recchia. "This plan is a compromise."

In 2010, the Parks Department proposed replacing the entire Boardwalk with concrete and plastic lumber — except for a four-block section in the historic amusement district between W. 15th and

W. 10th streets — as part of its \$30-million renovation of the 2.7-mile span, which opened in 1923.

The agency tested the materials on two sections of the walkway in 2011, arguing that the concrete is sturdier and — at \$90 per square foot — roughly \$40 per square foot cheaper than real wood.

But last spring Community Board 13 rejected the city's proposal to pave over the Brighton Beach portion of the Boardwalk — and in October the design commission ordered another review of the project after residents testified that the test slabs of concrete were cracking up.

Blackfish

Charter boat captains say blackfish — which are also known as tautog and oyster fish and taste like cod or flounder — are a winter staple for fishermen trolling borough waters. Now that the blackfish season has been cut short in New York, their business has been cut by nearly 60 percent as recreational anglers go to New Jersey, they say.

"In a time of economic hardship why we'd want to send business out of state is beyond me," said Greg Nardiello, captain of the recreational vessel Ocean Eagle, which used to troll for the ugly, but tasty, water breathers nicknamed "the poor man's lobster." "Blackfish is really the big ticket fish in the winter season. Now people are heading to New Jersey for it."

But it didn't have to be

this way, fishing experts claim. The statistics released by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, which encouraged the state to cut the blackfish season short after determining that the blackfish population needed to be replenished, were wildly inaccurate, they said.

Even the Fisheries Commission admitted that its numbers were off base: in a statement released on March 7, the agency admitted that its determination to reduce blackfish fishing by 53 percent was an overestimation and only a 37 percent reduction was necessary — meaning that the blackfish season could have extended.

A state Department of Environmental Conservation spokesman said the agency didn't intend to hurt Sheepshead Bay's fishing fleet, but was required to set new recreational and commercial fishing rules for blackfish casting after the Fisheries Commission said it was necessary to rebuild the blackfish population.

State officials will hold a meeting later this month to discuss changes in the Fisheries Commission's policy, but area fishermen fear that the damage has already been done, and that, while the blackfish population may recover, the Sheepshead Bay party boat business, which was New York's port of call for blackfish anglers, will never return to its former glory.

"At one time there used to be 50 boats out in Sheepshead Bay, but the fleet has shrunk to where there's only three boats out there,' said Steve Cannizzo, a retired marine law enforcement detective and owner of www.fishingunited.com, an online forum for fishermen. "People used to come from Northern New Jersey and Staten Island, because the captains were great guys who could really fill up your pale, but the regulations are so stiff now that it's just not worth it."

Print your own tome!

The BPL's book machine makes self-publishing easy

The publishing industry has just been replaced by a glorified copy machine.

The Brooklyn Public Library is embracing a new technology that would make Johannes Gutenberg proud — a device that can create a book in less time than it takes to find one on a store shelf and allows budding writers to see their work in print.

Stick a thumb drive with a copy of your novel into the Brooklyn Public Library's new Espresso Book Machine and you can go from no-luck author to published novelist — at least technically — in minutes by print-

ing out a bound copy of your book as well as more than 8-million titles from more established wordsmiths.

Brooklyn Public Library President Linda Johnson said the new machine would be a boon to both writers and book lovers.

"We've been thinking about how to reflect and support the community we serve," said Johnson, who unveiled the Espresso Book Machine at the Brooklyn Public Library's main branch at Grand Army Plaza earlier this month. "This gives all the emerging writers in Brooklyn an opportunity to publish."

It'll cost you around \$150 — spare change compared to the cost of an agent — to have your work published, but you may be able to get some of your investment back — the machine will actually help you sell your tome, Johnson explained, adding that if one wants to print out an extra copy of his work, the library will stock it on its shelves.

Printing out pre-published novels — some of which may be out of print — will cost about the same as ordering a book on Amazon, she said.

The machine, which takes about five minutes to work its literary magic, is a regression of sorts in the relationship between technology and book publishing.

The iPad, Kindle, and other digital readers are pushing the once robust publishing industry toward e-books, but this machine wants to bring back the printed word.

"We truly are a digital to analog product," said Dane Neller, the CEO of On Demand books that makes the machine, in a video shot by the Daily News. "We bridge the gap between the hard product and the digital product."

If the Espresso Book Machine looks a bit like a giant copier from the 1960s, it may not be a coincidence: Johnson said that the means to self-publish may be new, but the practice is quite old.

"Walt Whitman self-published 'Leaves of Grass' 150 years ago," said Johnson, who noted that new copies of the Brooklyn bard's treasured poetry collection have been flying out of the new machine. "I think he would be pleased to see that what he started long ago has become more commonplace."

Police arrested three men who they say sexually assaulted a 60-year-old Orthodox woman during a March 6 file-stealing spree at a Nostrand Avenue autoleasing business — yet cops say they don't know why the thieves were after the company's paperwork.

Detectives arrested the two thieves allegedly responsible for the attack inside First Class Auto Leasing between Burnett Street and Madison Place—as well as the team's ringleader, who didn't participate in the theft—on March 8, charging them with rape, robbery, sex abuse and burglary.

The woman said she had just opened for the day when two of the three men came to the door at 9:30 am, claiming that her boss had left some documents for them.

One of the thugs grabbed the woman as soon as she let them inside, police said. The other began searching for files and removed three

boxes of documents to an awaiting car.

The woman was then taken to a back bathroom, where the rape occurred, an NYPD spokesman said.

Investigators used surveillance camera images taken at the time of the attack to track down the thieves' getaway vehicle, which in turn led them to their suspects.

The man police claim raped the 60-year-old has an extensive criminal re-


cord and had been arrested five other times on charges ranging from assault to burglary, a source from the 63rd Precinct said.

But investigators still do not know why the thieves needed the documents — or what they contained.

Police suspect that the files held personal information of customers, including names, addresses and credit card numbers — information needed to steal one's identity.

This is supplemented by bonuses, generous health plans, subsidized housing and retirement packages equivalent or greater than the president, governor, mayor, any public official, many private sector corporate executives, or ordinary citizens.

In many cases, these institutions pay excessive funds to public relation firms and lobbyists hired to go after grants from city, state and federal governments. Others attempt convincing



Prospect Park joggers could get their own 'lane'

Runners would get their own "lane" beside Prospect Park's busy — and hard-on-the-knees — roadway under a new plan the city is considering.

The literally and figuratively groundbreaking design calls for adding a jogging path on the interior of the historic loop, where cyclists, walkers and motorists are expected to get separate, but equal-sized lanes this spring.

The new running artery would formalize a makeshift path currently trod by some trail runners, replacing the thin, muddy jogging route with a permanent, yet-to-be determined material that's softer on the joints than asphalt, like track turf, dirt or bark dust.

The proposal has prompted cheers from the borough's Asics-sporting set, who are calling it the best idea since the invention of the treadmill.

"It creates a space that's more safe and less crowded," said runner Lee Silverman, who owns JackRabbit Sports and sits on a panel of park advocates that conceived the plan. "I'd love to see a softer surface for running."

Other park-goers said the jogger's paradise would help prevent collisions with cyclists on the road and pesky ankle-twists on the bridle trail.

"It would be great," said the Prospect Park Track Club's Michael Ring, who hurt himself after tripping on a rock on the horse path, which runs along the roadway on the Windsor Terrace side of the park.

"[The bridle trail] is full of rocks — and the horses destroy it."

The plan comes amidst a proposal for a revolutionary Prospect Park roadway redesign — unveiled last month by a road safety task force — that calls for removing a lane of car traffic and giving the space to walkers and cyclists. It also follows several near-fatal crashes between bikers and foot travelers on the street.

The jogging path is being considered as part of the design's "second phase," said park spokesman Paul Nelson, who noted that details for the trail have not been hammered out yet.

Prospect Park Administrator Emily Lloyd, who also heads the Prospect Park Alliance, said last week that "a jogging lane on park landscape" is potentially feasible — although it might not run the complete 3.35-mile loop because of a few natural obstacles.

Preservationists acknowledge the plan will affect the park's look and character to some extent, but not too dramatically.

It's the kind of proposal that might have won the backing of running legends like Fred Lebow, but what about genius Prospect Park designers Frederick Law Olmstead and Calvert Vaux?

"I would say they would go for it," said Brooklyn historian John Manbeck.

"They intended the parks to be for the people."



March 18 lands on a Sunday this year promising a veritable perfect storm of alcohol poisoning, explained Wicked Monk bartender Maria Mangiameli.


"People are going to be miserable," Mangiameli explained.



Condimental sandwiches spreads the love

ondiments this fancy haven't been made in factories this hip since the days of Andy Warhol.

Toppings are on top of the food chain in Brooklyn with a fleet of local producers selling — and squeezing — new types of mustard, mayonnaise, ketchup, relish and the like onto the borough's plates. And one of the main motivations behind the spread of the spreads is economic, some sauce-makers say.

"With the economy being low, people are looking for simple ways to dress up a simple meal," said Elizabeth Valleau, who is about a month away from opening Empire Mayo, a tony mayonnaise shop in Prospect Heights that will sell varieties of egg yolk spread like smoked paprika, lime pickle, and black garlic. "A fancy condiment is a good way to make people excited about the every-day foods they're eating."

Brooklynites can now choose from an astounding selection of borough-made toppings to dress up their food, like mustard from the Navy Yard by the spice sellers Tin, Mexican chip toppings from Bushwick's Brooklyn Salsa, and jam from the preservationists at Anarchy

in a Jar.

The borough's foodies are relishing all this, well, relish, because the stuff that's getting made in Brooklyn tops Heinz and Hellman's best offerings, according to Matt Burns, whose Brooklyn Salsa Company makes preservative-free dip from heirloom tomatoes.

"It's pretty obvious that what everyone is doing is better than what exists," said Matt Burns, whose company dubs itself the "leaders of condimovement." "People are tired of what's out there. The system is corrupt and the ingredients

that are being used in condiments make them kind of like vegetable junk food — there's a much more pure way to do it."

Even restaurants are catching onto the condiment craze, with eateries like Ox Cart Tavern in Ditmas Park drawing regulars with its homemade ketchup. And in some cases these simple spreads are even becoming main courses, like the "horseradish sandwich" at the new Prospect Heights restaurant 606 R&D.

It might sound Spartan, but the \$6 meal — which features just horseradish, sourdough bread, butter and onion — is perfect as is, according to its maker.

"The sandwich needs not a single more thing — no one has really asked for anything else added to it," said Ilene Rosen, the chef and co-owner of 606 R&D. "I very much enjoy creating something for nothing."

(The eatery will serve topped with bacon for an additional \$2).

Condiments are ubiquitous in fridges across the country and immortalized in the work of pop artists like Warhol, but these utilitarian sauces and seasonings are not a distinctly American phenomenon — in

truth, they extend far back into the reaches of history.

One of the world's first condiments was a sauce made from fermented fish innards that was a staple of nearly every Roman dinner table, says Tom Nealon, a food historian who wrote a twelve-part series on the spreads for the website HiLoBrow.com and argues that one can divine the prevailing ethos of a culture through its condiments — or lack thereof.

"Condiments represent and encourage the democratic power of the individual to decide how to eat," said Nealon.

In fact, toppings have long been a food of the people, he told this publication.

"If you look at the history of cookery, 'bourgeois cookery' was full of condiments while 'royal cookery' has none."

Perhaps the borough's highend condiment craze isn't as luxurious as it sounds, but the fact that Brooklynites are going out of their way for fancy toppings says something about our tastes — and ourselves.

"People intuit condiments as the basis of choice in food and control over their diets," Nealon said. "People have a yearning to control their food destiny."





Jefferson beats Wings, now heading to Garden

Thomas Jefferson High School capped off an astounding regular season with a thrilling Public School Athletic League Class AA semifinal victory on Saturday, as the Orange Wave crashed down on the Wings Academy, 72–68.

Jefferson High's Jaquan "Son Son" Lynch and Thaddeus Hall were responsible for the 4 point victory, Jefferson coach Lawrence "Bud" Pollard explained, claiming that Hall started the game and Lynch finished it, scoring the game's final five points in a dizzying final 7.7 seconds to lift No. 1 Jefferson past the No. 4 Wings at St. John's.

"They were Batman and Robin today and a lot of other guys chipped in," Pollard explained. "You can't win [championships] and big games without big-time closers."

The duo closed like champions and now Jefferson (25–6) is one win away from its first city title since 1954. It goes for the crown next Saturday at Madison Square Garden at noon against No. 2 Boys and Girls, a 72–63 winner against third-seeded Lincoln.

With the large Carnesecca Arena crowd on its feet and his high school career hanging in the balance, Hall (22 points) sliced through the heart of Wings' defense and scored with a right-handed scoop to put Jefferson ahead with 7.7 seconds left. He made the free throw to create a two-point lead. Jenkins, one of the city's top uncommitted

seniors who scored a gamehigh 23 points, received the inbounds and as he looked to dart up-court, Lynch stripped him, the ball went to Hall, and he threw down an emphatic left-handed jam.

"Once the ball went into the hoop and I dunked it, I looked up at my family," said the senior, who spent two years living in a homeless shelter and has bounced around from borough to borough. "I felt like

I deserved this after everything I've been through."

The dunk set off a wild celebration at mid-court, Pollard and his assistant coaches embracing their players.

"It felt like we just won the Big East Tournament," Lynch said. "I've never seen a smile on Coach Pollard's face like that in my life."

Such a scene seemed unlikely earlier in the match: after getting off to a slow start, Wings Academy (25–

4) was every bit as good as Jefferson — they were tough finishing off drives inside, as determined on the glass and as quick in transition. With Jenkins leading the way, scoring 19 first-half points, creating for himself and his teammates, the Wings were up 38–34 at halftime.

The lead grew to eight early in the third quarter before Lynch found his stroke. In a 12–2 run to end

Naz hoopsters save best for last

Nazareth High School found a silver lining in the school's looming dark cloud.

It has been a nightmarish two months for the East Flatbush school, from the death of girls basketball coach Apache Paschall to the announcement that Nazareth is on the verge of closing.

But Sunday was a respite from these dark times for students and parents alike.

At Fordham University, the Nazareth boys basketball team won the Catholic High School Athletic Association Class B state championship, coming back to stun St. Mary's of Lancaster. Later that night, at Christ the King, the Lady Kingsmen won its second straight Catholic High School Athletic Association Class AA state title, routing Moore Catholic.

In two weeks, both teams will be representing the embattled school

— and the Catholic High School Athletic Association — in the New York State Federation tournament in Albany.

"It's spectacular," Nazareth girls co-coach Lauren Best said. "If that's not a sign to keep our school open, I don't know what is"

Nazareth scared everyone last month by announcing that it was going to shut its doors in June, but that might not be the case anymore: school principal Providencia Quiles said if Naz reaches its target enrollment of 80 students, there's a "very good chance" that it will not close.

Nazareth is 75 percent there and only a week into its open registration. Both teams winning can only be a boon to the institution.

"This is what drives enrollment, seeing our students thrive athletically and also academically," Quiles said. "Nazareth is



Boys High beats Lincoln

Another battle was waged in the ongoing blood feud between Bedford Stuyvesant Boys and Girls High School and Coney Island's Lincoln High School on Saturday at St. John's University's Carnesecca Arena, and like many of the previous matches between the two scrappy squads, the Boys and Girls' Kangaroos prevailed.

For the third time in four meetings this season, No. 2 Boys and Girls got the best of third-seeded Lincoln Railsplitters, 72–63, to earn a fifth trip to Madison Square Garden in six years for the Public School Athletic League's Class AA final

"After Lance [Stephenson] left, Lincoln lost it," Boys High senior Leroy "Truck" Fludd said, referring to the Indiana Pacers guard who won four city titles. "We're the better team now."

Unlike the last meeting, Lincoln star Isaiah Whitehead was in action this time, but only for a handful of minutes in the first half due to foul trouble.

Whitehead picked up two fouls within two minutes of the opening tip. When Lincoln coach Dwayne "Tiny" Morton took a gamble and reinserted him early in the second quarter, he was called for a charge — his third foul with less than six minutes left in the first half.

"That was part of the game plan—to step in and take charges," Boys High coach Ruth Lovelace said.

Even with Whitehead (13 points) on the floor in the third quarter, Boys and Girls (23–6) continued to decimate the Railsplitters (19–10). Suffocating them on the defensive end, getting out in transition and patiently finding the best shot, they held a 19-point lead entering the final quarter, a shocking bulge considering the nature of the rivalry.

"We came out of the locker room ready to dominate," junior guard Wesley Myers said. "It's our fourth time playing them, we were familiar with them."

Lincoln made its run, pressing with a guard-heavy lineup and getting to within six with less than three minutes left. But Tyliek Kimbrough sank a runner in the lane, Trevonn Morton missed a jumper, and Fludd followed with a tip-in. The Railsplitters never truly threatened Boys and Girls again.

Fludd scored 20 points and grabbed 12 rebounds, but he wasn't the most lethal Kangaroo on Saturday. That title belonged to Myers, the junior guard. He scored 21 points, grabbed five rebounds, and added four assists. Rashad Andrews added 10 points. Rakim

Lesane led Lincoln with 14 points and Ethan Telfair had 10.

It was the latest brilliant performance from Myers, a 6-foot-1 guard who started the season off slow. When Kimbrough, the Bishop Loughlin transfer, was lost for a month for unspecified reasons, Myers began to emerge. Poised, patient and understated, he buried Lincoln with a slew of jump shots and strong drives to the hoop.

"Myers is one of the best guards out there, he's been stepping up the second half of the year, he's been great," Lovelace said. "He's answered the call."

Boys High is now headed back to the Garden, looking for a third straight city title.

Saturday's win was sweet, Myers said, because it put to bed any doubts about who had the superior team. Before the contest, Lovelace

told her players she felt they were the deeper and more talented team — they just had to prove it.

The Kangaroos certainly demonstrated that. Over the last three years, they have taken control of this rivalry, beating Lincoln at the Garden last year for their second straight crown, winning in Coney Island for the first time this winter and prevailing against Saturday, ending Lincoln's season for the second straight March.

Lovelace simply smiled when it was suggested the tide had turned in the rivalry. Each year is different, she said, adding that she was just pleased to be headed back to the Garden.

"I don't think it really sunk in yet, but it's definitely a great feeling," Lovelace. "There are only two teams to go and to be blessed, to be one of them feels really amazing."





A's playoff hopes die in Danbury

Brooklyn's not-so-stellar season comes to a chilly end during heated overtime bout

Talk about a heartbreaker!

The beleaguered Brooklyn Aviators were knocked out of the hunt for the coveted Federal Hockey League's Commissioner's Cup on Sunday after losing the final match of their intense three-game series against the Danbury Whalers — and the team's "overtime curse" may have been to blame.

The A's fell to the Whalers 5–4 at the Hangar on Friday, losing their first playoff game in an overtime round, which has been the team's Achilles heel all season.

The Aviators have a strange habit of stumbling in the extra round, triumphing in only one of their five overtime matches they played during the regular season. Their playoff matches were no exception.

Friday's competition was both tragic and riveting for A's fans, who watched Brooklyn's Boys of Winter outplay and outshoot the Whalers — then lose the team's only home game in

the best of three series.

The A's lost game one, but Saturday's match gave Aviator fans reason to hope: Brooklyn forced a winner-take-all game against the Whalers after beaching the Connecticut blow holes 5–2 at the Danbury Ice Arena.

But Sunday brought nothing but another overtime round and some more bad luck for Brooklyn's Boys of Winter as the Aviators fell to Danbury — on a fluke play no less!

The A's were able to hold onto a one-point lead until eight minutes into the third frame, when Danbury's Sean O'Malley scored on what anyone would call a freak accident: a puck slapped toward A's net minder Jo St. Pierre — one that he could have easily blocked - ricocheted off of an Aviators' skate and landed squarely in the A's goal, sending the A's onto thin ice — another overtime session.

It was all downhill after that — Danbury scored in the first minute of the extra session, giving them

the game and the spot in the semi-finals.

But Aviators coach Rob Miller says the bad luck didn't stem from the skate slap into the net, or the team's overtime curse: it stems back from numerous injuries the A's suffered this season and affected three of his top players going into the playoffs.

"We've been playing with a short bench throughout the playoffs because of injuries, and they got the bounce on us in both overtimes, that's all," said Miller. "I thought we were the better team overall, but that's how hockey goes sometimes."

Yet longtime fans agreed that the Aviators did their best this season, even though they finished in fourth place — a far cry from the 21-game winning streak the team celebrated a year earlier.

"Between this season and the last, their level of play is about the same," said A's fan Adam Ocharsky. "It used to be that they would win every time, but the other teams have really improved."

How to survive in an uncertain job market

Frustrations in your job, industry, or life may make you feel like jumping ship some days. swimming toward whatever job seems the most promising at the moment. Not so fast. If you want to improve your situation long term, you need to step back, take a breath, and approach a career change thoughtfully and deliberately.

"Switching careers takes some effort," said Dr. Mary Hawkins, president of Bellevue University, "You need to figure out what experience and skills you need and the level of education required to enter and excel in a new field."

Determine where the jobs are

Hawkins suggests starting with a website that provides data about expanding and contracting industries. The Monster Employment Index is another good resource that provides a monthly gauge of U.S. job demand.

Earn a relevant degree

According to Education Dynamics, 60 percent of U.S. jobs will require much more than a college degree by 2018.

"If you want to qualify for the jobs of tomorrow, completing a bachelor's degree is a wise move,' Hawkins said.

Instead of enrolling in a degree program because you find it interesting, Hawkins recommends choosing a field of study that will translate into a job in a growth industry. She shared the following tips:

- · Check job sites to see how many jobs are available in specific industries.
- · Use listed educational and skills requirements for these positions as guidelines for researching degree programs.
- Figure out what you will actually be learning in individual courses and how you can apply this.
- · Call schools directly and ask directors of the programs you've identified if you'll be engaged in hands-on experience while you learn.

"If you are one of the 38 million Americans with some college credit, finding a school with generous transfer policies may significantly decrease the time required to complete your degree," she continued.

Specialize to stand out

As bachelor's degrees become more the norm, job seekers will need more specialized expertise to stand out. For example, adding a concentration in logistics management or marketing will take you much further than a general business degree sans concentration.

"Employers are looking for people who have relevant skills that are specifically tailored for the job," said Hawkins. "Job seekers must find the degree and learning environment that enables them to develop the specialized skills they will need to get that job."

The workplace is changing and by starting now, vou'll have achieved the education vou'll need to succeed in the next decade.




