



## Mom sent it 45 years ago, she received it last week

Talk about special delivery!

A Marine Park woman got a surreal surprise when letters postmarked in 1969 finally arrived in the mail last week.

"I'm freaking out," said Susan Heifetz.

On April 3, Heifetz got a call from a man living in the Homecrest apartment where she was born and raised, and the man said that a letter had just been delivered for her that was dated June 26, 1969.

Suspicious, she asked him to describe the envelope, and what he told her made her jaw drop

"He said on the back there was a lipstick mark - and that's something my mother did with letters - seal it

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## INSIDE GOODBYE, LOU POWSNER Courier Life says farewell to its legendary 'Speak Out' columnist, 93

Lou Powsner, the dean of Courier Life's Core Four of columnists whose feisty prose and tell-it-like-it-is attitude delighted readers of these pages since the 1950s, died early Sunday morning at the age of 93.

Powsner was found in the bed of his Avenue P home by his son Farrel, who came to check on him after receiving a call early in the morning that his dad wasn't feeling well.

Lou's popular column "Speak Out," in which he took on politicians, special interests, and any bureaucrat that stood in his way, appeared in the pages of the Brooklyn Graphic for decades and online at BrooklynDaily.com for the past few years.

A haberdasher whose storefront on Mermaid Avenue in Coney Island lived through the tumultuous decades of the '60s through the '80s, Powsner fought successfully for brighter street lights to help halt nighttime crime, and battled the city over parking meters he said gave suburban shopping malls an unfair advantage over his beloved mom-and-pop and all those that peppered what was then Brooklyn's dying commercial streets.

His fights for the working man led him to become a member of Community Board 13 in Conev Island. a president of the Coney Island Board of Trade, a member of the Bensonhurst West End Community Council, and a president of the Joint Council of Kings Board of Trade.

Powsner's name was in the Rolodex of local reporters who counted on him

for insights into what was happening — and, more importantly, what had happened in the past — for decades, and his mind was considered the institutional memory of generations that could be counted on to help put any situation in perspective.

In recent years, his column took on a voice that could only be described as a combination between god's and Yoda's, featuring sage advice that proved over and over again that Lou's demands of yesteryear were as right then as they are now. In one of his last columns, he waxed poetic about then-mayor Michael Bloomberg's seeming disdain for the portions of Conev Island that didn't sit on the ocean.

"Ne'er do my old eyes see Bloomberg walking along our main shopping thoroughfares. If he decided to come down from his beloved midtown Manhattan, our billionaire mayor would see and trip over giant potholes, blatantly un-repaired to trap and strap our shoppers all across our fair city. especially in Brooklyn, on avenues such as Surf, Mermaid, and Brighton Beach.

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Each crossing is a hazard of disrepair," he wrote.

Louis W. Powsner was born on June 14, 1920 in Crandon, S.D. He was brought to Coney Island as a toddler, and grew up above his father's storefront on Mermaid Avenue, his bedroom facing Our Lady of Solace - then a large wooden church at the corner of W. 17th Street.

He attended Lincoln High School, and was a staff sergeant and member of "Kelly's Kobras," the 64th Bomb Squad Army Air Force during World War II from June 1942 to 1945.

He married the former Irene Hallote in April of 1946, and the two stayed together until her death in 2008.

He attended reunions with his Army pals yearly until two years ago, when the gatherings were canceled because, as Lou said. "there was no one else left."

But Powsner kept up his trailblazing ways until very recently, appearing on the front page of the Graphic in his successful fight to get potholes fixed on Avenue P in April of 2012, and was named one of the boroughs busiest Continued on page 34

## Old Brooklyn's old-boy network

25-year residency required to join this club

These folks are about as Old Brooklyn as it gets.

The Society of Old Brooklynites is a group that first formed to oppose the incorporation of their beloved city of Brooklyn into the City of Greater New York, which went through in 1898 despite their best efforts. Now, 134 years after its founding, the Society remains an active social club and some members still bristle at the mention of the accursed consolidation.

"It was a sell-out job," said Tony Ibelli, who has lived in Brooklyn for all of his 78 years and thinks our neighbors across the East River clearly got more out of the deal. "We were more successful than Manhattan. They didn't have any deep-water piers."

Since its crushing defeat at the hands of those bureaucrats across the water, the group has plodded along, redirecting its focus to extolling the virtues of old, independent Brooklyn, especially the borough's role in the Revolutionary War. "Promoting Brooklyn is what we really like to do," said Mike Spinner. who has been part of the club for 25 years and whose father Frank Spinner spent 16 years as president before passing away in 2005.

A life-long membership runs \$50 and the only criteria for joining is that a person must have lived or worked in Brooklyn for at least 25 consecutive years. That said, group gatekeepers do not exactly pore over old tax returns to verify that prospects are the genuine article.

"We kind of use the honor system," Spinner said.

Membership peaked in 1922 at around 12,000 and the group still claims around 5,000 members today, Spinner said.

Certified Old Brooklynites meet once a month to talk about the bygone days. The long bygone days.

About 25 stalwarts turned out for this month's meeting, which was held in Borough Hall. Robert Furman of the Brooklyn Preservation Council gave a talk about Fort Defiance in which sat on a small island off the coast of Red Hook.

A meandering conversation followed, some of which revolved around the naming of Brooklyn streets.

"There is a street named for every city in New York State," one member said.

"Williamsburg has streets named for the signers of the Declaration of Independence," another explained.

"But they spelled 'Keap' wrong," a third added, re-

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ferring to early planners' misreading of Thomas McKean's name on the document.

The remark was met with knowing laughter.

Furman explained that Red Hook gets its name from the shape of the land and the color of the soil there.

He added that Bay Ridge used to be called "Yellow Hook" until an outbreak of yellow fever prompted residents to rethink the moniker

So it went for hours. Each Old Brooklynite cares about particular aspects of borough history and, at meetings, members go around the room sharing factoids.

"My history revolves around the Village of Brooklyn," Ibelli said, referring to what is now Brooklyn Heights and Dumbo. "Because I live down there."



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## Bikes vs. bumpers Wheels collide at traffic town hall

People got all revved up at a Vision Zero town hall last week.

Cyclists and drivers squared off at Borough Hall on April 1, with bikers saying they need more protection from cars, and motorists complaining that they get too much blame for accidents - and shoulder more of the burden in traffic-safety efforts.

Auto advocates said that Mayor DeBlasio's drive to reduce traffic fatalities to zero leaves motorists feeling persecuted.

"I feel that Vision Zero punishes only one group — the motorists," said Tal Barzalai, who went on to say that pedestrians are a big factor in traffic crashes. "If they had more alertness, some of the accidents actually could have been avoided."

Cyclists countered that drivers act like they own the road — and that the city encourages the behavior.

"Everything about our streets says that car occupants are more important than non-car occupants," one man said. "It comes from a wrong philosophy."

Another resident called for more protected bike lanes and walkways.

"If we want Vision Zero, the best thing we can do is keep the cars away from the people and the bikes," said Ralph Yazzo.

Protected lanes come at a price to drivers — often requiring that the city narrow or eliminate lanes or ax parking spots but one bicycle booster said motorists must make concessions, because safety trumps all.

"This is a moral imperative," said Dave "Paco" Abraham, who was struck in a hitand-run in East New York five years ago.

### City to lower Atlantic Avenue speed

Brooklyn's Avenue of Death and Destruction is getting the go-slow treatment.

The city's transportation department announced on Wednesday that it would reduce the speed limit along the whole eight-mile length of Atlantic Avenue in Brooklyn to 25 miles per hour. Atlantic, the brutal and deadly nature of which The Brooklyn Paper examined in an in-depth report last week, will be the first of 25 major thoroughfares in the city to have their speed limits lowered ahead of additional car-slowing measures. Roads czar Polly Trottenberg said that the push to pinch drivers will save lives.

"Crashes on these roads tend to be more deadly," Trottenberg said at a press conference to announce the plan in Lowry Triangle, a tree-lined plaza at the intersection of Underhill, Washington, and Atlantic avenues. "We're really going to work to make Atlantic Avenue safer."

Trottenberg, a resident of the Atlantic-bordering neighborhood Cobble Hill, said her department would also re-time the traffic lights, work with cops to step up enforcement, and explore potential changes to the road's design, including the expansion of medians to reduce crossing distances.

The move to revamp the arterial street all the way from the New York Harbor

to just beyond the Queens border is part of Mayor De-Blasio's Vision Zero plan to reduce traffic deaths to zero bv 2024.

Thomas Chan, the police department's transportation chief, said officers at local precincts have been trained to help crack down on speeding and other dangerous driving infractions. He also said that education will be a big part of making the streets safer, and that police will partner with the departments of education and aging to to teach people about pedestrian safety.

"Education is a longterm solution," Chan said. "But our officers will be doing enforcement out there now."

## **Cops collar Coney man** for Ridge bank heist

Talk about high vault-age. A Coney Island man has been arrested for allegedly going on a 10-day, \$22,000-plus bank-robbery spree - including a \$17,000 cash-out at a Third Avenue Bay Ridge lending institution on March 21, authorities announced on April 2.

Police say they picked up 30-year-old Michael Rodriguez at his W. 23rd Street home on March 26, shortly after a failed attempt to hold up a bank on 86th Street in Bensonhurst where the robber tried to pass a note the teller, who wouldn't accept it. Authorities say they found that note in Rodriguez's car.

According to cops, Rodriguez's fingerprints matched those on a note passed to a clerk at a Cobble Hill bank on Court Street on March 19 — where the accused reportedly cleared \$485. District Attorney Ken Thompson has also charged Rodriguez with a \$5,761 robbery of a Borough Park bank on March 16.

"We simply will not allow anyone

Avenue and Dahill Road.

The pill-happy perp made off with 120 Oxycodone pills, 90 Opana pills, and 115 Roxycodone pills, as well as \$680 in cash to rob our banks in broad daylight and terrorize bank tellers in the process. We will hold the defendant accountable for this bank robbery spree," Thompson vowed.

In each case, the robber reportedly entered wearing a hooded, full-length, black North Face jacket and slipped the bank employee a hand-written note each one allegedly written on the same type of paper, with the same pen, with the same wording, and with the same misspellings. Each note claimed the robber had a gun and demanded cash. The robber never spoke or displayed a weapon.

Rodriguez's attorney failed to respond to repeated requests for comment.

The People's Playground resident faces three counts of robbery, two counts of grand larceny, three counts of petty larceny, one count of attempted robbery, and one count of attempted petty larceny. Rodriguez faces a maximum sentence of 25 years in prison if his sentences are imposed consecutively.

Authorities say that security cameras at the last location, between 21st Avenue and Bay Parkway, captured the villain's face on tape at 7:31 pm on March 7.



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
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## *Itty-bitty bats prompt arborcide*

State axes G'point trees to spare endangered critters ahead of bridge overhaul

The state is looking bat to the future.

COURIER LIFE, APR. 11-17, 2014 **71** State workers cut down 53 trees on Monday to make way for the massive. \$1-billion rebuilding of the Kosciuszko Bridge - and to spare the northern longeared bats that might roost in the trees later in the year. The breed is an endangered species.

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"It is important to be environmentally responsible during all of our construction projects, especially when dealing with endan-gered species," state transportation department commissioner Joan McDonald said in a statement. "Removing the trees prior to nesting season will allow the bats to find safe, secure locations through the year while ensuring that the contractor selected for the Kosciuszko Bridge replacement project will not need to delay construction on this critical infrastructure


The northern long-eared bat is a tiny mammal adults grow to 3.7 inches max — with habitat on the East Coast from North Carolina to Maine. Colonies with young bats range in size from 30 to 60 bats. During the winter, the bats hi-

bernate in caves and mines and, when the weather warms, they set up camp in trees. Federal regulations require agencies within the bat's turf to cut down trees before April 1 to protect the winged creatures from being liquidated in the logging.

The felled trees stood on Cherry Street and Vandervoort Avenue near the bridge, and on Meeker Avenue between Kingsland Avenue and Varick Street. Crews also removed 93 trees on the Queens side of the bridge.

The state is supposed to start construction this fall on the bridge, which carries Brooklyn-Queens Expresswav commuters over Newtown Creek from Greenpoint to Queens. State engineers say that their plan to replace the entire bridge will take until 2018, meaning they have pushed it back a year since the summer of 2013. During construction, the Brooklyn side of the bridge, including Doughtery Park, is slated to become a way station for construction gear.

Roads officials promised to replant twice as many trees as they chopped down when the project is complete.

A lot of these serious issues can be avoided by making regular visits to a podiatrist. Feet need to be cared for on a regular basis, says the doctor, so diabetics can avoid the risk of developing corns, pre-ulcerative lesions and ingrown toe nails. There are also special shoes that can be prescribed to help protect feet from injury.

Whether you have a medical condition or not, one thing is certain: Pain in the feet impacts everything you do. When you're not comfortable walking, your entire lifestyle is curtailed.

Parents should bring children in for check-ups. Some kids have flat feet, ingrown toenails or conditions such as bowed legs, which can impacts the joints, including the ankles.

## Was Recchia behind curious trip tort?

### Ex-councilman's associates behind Lachman lawsuit, and Beep Eric Adams aims for Mayor DeBlasio's chair


alk about setting somebody up for a fall.

Former state Sen. Seymour Lachman says that a bizarre personal injury suit filed against him in 2010 may have been an act of retaliation by then-Coney Island Councilman and current Congressional contender **Domenic Rec**chia, whom Lachman once threatened to challenge for Council.

The suit was brought by octagenarian couple Jane and Leonard Beninson — the latter a paid consultant to Recchia's 2001 Council campaign — who hired Theodore Pavlounis as their attorney.

Until last year, Recchia and Pavlounis had their law offices in a building Recchia owns at the corner of Gravesend Neck Road and E. Second Street, which was also the headquarters for the excouncilman's campaigns. The two lawyers were not partners, but shared space and resources, according to Carmine Guiga, who was a legal intern under Recchia, but also did work for Pavlounis.

Pavlounis also worked on Recchia's campaigns for Council, and



was the treasurer for his failed 2008 bid for Congress.

The suit initially alleged that Mrs. Beninson had tripped and injured herself on the sidewalk outside Lachman's Bensonhurst home on Sept. 21, 2009 — but Pavlounis later submitted an amendment claiming that was a typo, and it was actually Mr. Beninson who had taken the spill. Lachman — who represented parts of Brooklyn and Staten Island from 1996 until 2004 — said he and his wife had long known the elderly Beninsons from Bensonhurst political circles, and were shocked that the couple had not approached him directly about the incident before calling in the lawyers.

"I was personally hurt by it that they didn't come in to tell us," the former pol said.

Lachman suspects Recchia was behind the lawsuit.

"It was very odd. Either they were old and forgetful of what was going on," he said, "or they were controlled and manipulated by the councilman at the time."

Lachman was served papers by Guiga — who was Recchia's legal intern at the time. Guiga was also a veteran of Recchia's 2001 and 2005 campaigns, and was still getting paychecks from Recchia's 2008 Congressional campaign in mid-2009 when the lawsuit was filed.

Lachman is a longtime friend and mentor to Recchia foe Assemblyman **Bill Colton** (D–Bensonhurst), though he endorsed Recchia during his rookie run for Council in 2001. But in 2008, in a rage over Recchia's support for extending term limits, Lachman told reporters he might challenge the councilman for his job. The ex-senator also encouraged thencouncilman **Michael McMahon** of Staten Island to seek the vacant Congressional seat that Recchia was pursuing, even though Recchia had the backing of the Brooklyn Democratic establishment.

Recchia dropped out of the 2008 Congressional contest, and Lachman decided against challenging him for Council. But Lachman said rumors persisted that he would campaign for Recchia's vacant seat in 2013, or even run for the Congressional seat now occupied by Rep. **Michael Grimm** (R– Bay Ridge), which the ex-councilman is aiming for. The retired pol suggested the Beninson lawsuit might have been a way to discourage him from running, or retaliation for a perceived wrong.

"There are people who said to me that Domenic was looking over his shoulder, afraid I might run for an office in the area in the future," Lachman said. "If he was vindictive, why was he vindictive? It might have been because I had encouraged Mike McMahon to run for Congress." Lachman, now a professor at

Wagner College on the Rock, said he has no intention of ever running for office again.

Both Recchia and Pavlounis declined to comment. Mrs. Beninson said her husband has since passed away, and would not discuss the lawsuit.

**Borough President Adams** has big plans for the future — the surprisingly near future — and they involve **Mayor DeBlasio**'s chair at City Hall.

"DeBlasio's just keeping the seat warm for me for eight years. Maybe four," the Beep told a recent gathering of borough religious leaders, according to several of the attendees.

But when invited to clarify his statement later, Adams graciously reaffirmed his open-ended support for hizzoner.

"I'm a DeBlasio guy, and I'm with him for as long as he wants to be mayor," he said.

## Stars come out in Midwood

### Murrow High School unveils renovated state-of-the-art planetarium

These kids have a view that's out of this world.

Students got a look at the newly renovated planetarium inside Edward R. Murrow High School in Midwood on April 1. A new interior and a stateof-the-art projector system will allow students to soar to new heights without leaving the school.


It is the only public-school planetarium in Brooklyn, and educators say it will give astronomy students a real leg up in their learning.

"This can show you things that you just can't visualize when you lay back and look at the night sky," said planetarium director and astronomy teacher Marc Horowitz.

New software and projectors can track satellites and near-earth asteroids, zoom out to a view of the entire Milky Way Galaxy, and take pupils on a three-dimensional tour of the surface of Mars - something students were particularly excited about.

"It feels like you're almost on it," said 12th-grade astronomy student Teresa Kugler.

The planetarium opened in 1979, according to the school's principal, Al-

len Barge. Former teacher Sam Storch bought a projector from Japan and wired the system himself. But after 35 years, the old system — which only projected an image of the night sky was getting worn out.

"When I came in, it was beyond antiquated," Horowitz said.

Now the planetarium uses the same system as the Hayden Planetarium at the American Museum of Natural History — the school can even stream live presentations directly from the Hayden.

"You could not do this in a traditional planetarium," said Dr. Carter Emmart, who works at the Hayden and helped Horowitz bring the system to Murrow.

Former councilman Domenic Recchia allocated city funds for the morethan-\$600,000 renovation, which replaced carpet, chairs, lighting, and the visualization system.

The latter actually required an international agreement between the Schools Construction Authority and the Swedish company that designed the visualization system, according to Recchia.

The school is making plans to invite the public to use the new digs, a school spokeswoman said.

Horowitz said he hopes the planetarium will impart a sense of scale on his students.

"The folks that go to space are profoundly changed," he said.

The planetarium does seem to have a humbling effect on students.


"It really shows how small we are," said 12th-grader Rashad Harris.

last 45 years?" she said. A post office spokeswoman said the letter could not have been floating around the postal system for 45 years, and that most likely someone had somehow acquired the letter years ago, and just recently put it back in the mail.

"What we typically find is that old letters and postcards — sometimes purchased at flea markets, antique shops and even online — are re-entered into our system," said post office spokeswoman Congetta Chirichello.

But Chirichello could not explain how the letter could have been postmarked in 1969 and then go missing.

Adding to the mystery, in the days since Heifetz received the first letter, two more missing missives have surfaced.

One is from a Sgt. Mark L. Wolf, whom Heifetz dated briefly in 1969, before he was shipped off to war. He sent the letter in October, 1969 while stationed in Vietnam. In a spooky twist, the letter starts with, "Don't remember me? Let me remind you."

The same good Samaritans who received her birthday card found Wolf's letter in their mailbox last Friday and passed it along to her.

The third late letter was hand-delivered on Saturday by the manager of the local Homecrest post office, Don Chen. It was another 1969 birthday card, from her brother.

Chen said the first two letters came to his office from a mostly automated postal sorting facility in East New York where they are pre-bundled for mail carriers. The third appeared in a bin for mail collected locally or which has been damaged and could have passed through the facility or come from the neighborhood, Chen said.

He said markings left from the sorting facility could reveal the general area they re-entered the mail stream, but tracing

> them back to their origin would be nearly impossible. The chances of one letter

> resurfacing after this long are one-in-a-trillion, according to Chen—let alone three. How the letters finally made it back into the mail stream

is a mystery, he said.

"There's millions of scenarios of what could have happened over the last 40-something years," Chen said.

Heifetz said she's just glad to have gotten the long-lost letters after all this time.

Receiving the birthday card from her parents right now held particular significance for her. She recently retired from her civilian job with the police department, and put her house up for sale. She has been preparing to move to Las Vegas to live near the rest of her family, but the prospect of leaving her East Coast roots was weighing on her emotionally.

"I kept thinking, 'who's going to visit our parents at the cemeterv?"" she said.

The timely arrival of her mother's 45-year-late birthday card has given her some peace of mind.

"With all that I've been going through, I take this as a sign that my parents will find me no matter where I am," she said. "This, to me, was the closure I needed."

"You have a lot of great restaurants here, but what's missing is really good coffee," said store co-owner Dora Wu.

Wu hails from the island of Macao, off the coast of China, but her husband and co-owner Don Lee grew up just a few blocks away from the new cafe on Sixth Avenue. The couple spent years living in Manhattan, working as an engineer and a pharmacist, respectively, but recently moved to Bay Ridge to start a family and to pursue their dream of running a hip caffeine depot.

Wu said Coffee Lab's brew will be more like the espressos popular in Australia and Europe than the average American joe meaning more beans and less milk per cup.

"In America, people tend to drink coffee with seven or 14 ounces of beans, and fill the rest up with 10

ounces of milk," said Wu. "In Europe and Australia, they use nine ounces or 18 ounces. It just doesn't taste the same."

For now, a latte at Coffee Lab will cost \$4, to remain competitive with the Starbucks at 75th Street and Third Avenue. But Wu said that the specialty ingredients might eventually force her prices higher.

"We're all about quality, not quantity," said Wu.

Filling out Coffee Lab's menu are \$2.50 macarons creamy French sandwich cookies — from quirky upscale Manhattan bakery Macaron Parlour. For now, the shop has stocked the sweets in lemon, raspberry, and green tea — but could order more offbeat flavors. such as candied bacon.

Wu hopes to catch a good part of the morning commuter rush, but also offers free wi-fi to appeal to those with time to linger. The cafe's interior is industrial chic, decorated with flasks and beakers recalling Wu and Lee's past careers.

"Hopefully, it'll work. It's what we really want to do," said Wu.

## Manhattan bakery to open outpost in Ridge

## New confectioner brings cakes and cannoli from Bleecker Street to Fourth Avenue

Bay Ridge has always had a smalltown flavor — now it's getting a taste of the Village.

Pasticceria Rocco — a 40-year institution in Manhattan's West Village famed for its cakes, cookies, and cannoli — is due to open a second location on Fourth Avenue between 94th and 95th streets next month.

The bakery's owners have run a kitchen for wholesale orders in a space behind the storefront for the past two years, and when the front area opened up, they decided to whip up a whole new store.

The shop represents a homecoming for the owners, who have lived in Bay Ridge for two generations.

"That's probably the most important reason we're opening the store here," said Rocco's spokesman Ralph Aloe.

Aloe's wife Patricia Generoso-Aloe and his brother-in-law Rocco Generoso, Jr., took over the West Village bakery from their founding father, Rocco Generoso, Sr., three years ago — and with business cooking in the city, they decided to see if

they could make the same dough in Bay Ridge.

"Now is a good time to start expanding, and come back to their hometown, where their roots are," Aloe said.

The owners plan to try some new, less sugary recipes at the Bay Ridge store, including paninis and focaccia, when it opens in May. But they promise to keep their old-fashioned methods of preparing their culinary delights.

"It's what we do. We're not a corporate facility. We make everything by hand," said Aloe. "The whole brand is based around the idea of family, and making things the right way."

The Generosos are not the first Manhattan Italian delicacy-makers to set up shop in the area. Joe Monaco — a veteran of the East Village's Veniero's Pasticceria and Cafe — opened his own eponymous store on Third Avenue in 2011. And Pasticceria Rocco's Bleecker Street neighbors, Faicco's, have maintained a second salumeria on 11th Avenue in Dyker Heights for more than 70 years.

## Oh yes, he's Hall that! Brooklyn Jazz Hall of Fame honors Bill Lee, Herbie Mann

The beat goes on in gentrified Brooklyn.

The Brooklyn Jazz Hall of Fame inducted Bill Lee, the legendary bassist and dad to firebrand filmmaker Spike Lee, whose recent remarks about the changed face of Fort Greene made headlines, along with famous flautist Herbie Mann during a ceremony on April 1. Lee, who still lives in Fort Greene and has battled with new neighbors over the alleged noise of his jam sessions, was on hand to accept the vindicating award, while musician Romero Lombardo accepted the honor for Mann, who grew up in Brighton Beach and died in 2003. Mann's widow, Janeal Arison, also delivered a recorded speech.

"It was in his home in Brooklyn that he began banging on pots and pans," Arison said about Mann.

"Then his mom got him a clarinet to keep the neighbors happy — and the rest was history."

A crowd of 172 people attended the event at the Brooklyn Historical Society in Brooklyn Heights. Between awards ceremonies, the nomadic Hall of Fame is housed primarily in the minds of its organizers and inductees, but the event doubled as a fund-raiser for securing it a physical home one day. The crowd went silent when the message from Arison played, followed by a rendition of the Sammy Cahn tune "Time After Time."

Mann was Russian American but made his name adapting Brazilian, Afro-Cuban, and funk and soul music into his flutedriven jazz groove. He crossed over to disco in the 1970s and had a hit with the song "Hi-Jack."

Lee, a session bassist, has played on more than 245 projects, including albums jazz titans the likes of Bedford-Stuyvesant's Max Roach, folk giants such as Bob Dylan, Odetta, and Woody Guthrie, and blues legends including John Lee Hooker. He also scored his son Spike's first four movies and had a hand in a number of Disney soundtracks, including the one for "101 Dalmatians."

More recently, he pro-

duced Destiny's Child's breakout album "Survivor."

The Brooklyn Jazz Hall of Fame also awarded 15-year-old saxophonist Rodney James its Young Lion award. The hallowed hall was

started by the Central Brooklyn Jazz Consortium in 2000 to preserve the borough's singular jazz heritage, according to the group.

"Brooklyn's rich jazz history and tradition has not been chronicled before this," said consortium communications director Bob Myers. "When people think about jazz, they think about Harlem or the Village, but no one thinks about Brooklyn."

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

"Mommy, the boys next door are fighting again. Why can't they learn to play nice?"

"They're Europeans, Timmy. They don't know how to play nice."

The European continent is, and always has been, a bubbling cauldron of 'tribal' conflict (WWI, WWII, Balkan Wars, Chechan Wars, Napoleonic Wars, Slovak Wars...), no different from tribes in any other part of the world except that European tribesmen wear ties. The latest bubble this time is Ukraine and the world, as usual, has turned to the United States to assume its customary role as policeman and haberdasher,

"You have to. You signed the <u>Buda-</u> <u>pest Memorandum</u> in 1994. It says you have to protect Ukrainian sovereignty."

No! Wrong! Not correct! Nyet, nyet! The <u>Budapest Memorandum</u>, which was signed by the U.S., U.K., Ukraine, and Russia, says that, in return for Ukraine's giving up its nuclear weapons, the signatories agree to 'respect' the integrity of Ukraine. It doesn't say anything about 'protecting' that integrity. And, besides, it was never submitted to the United States Senate for ratification, i.e. not legally binding. Russia may have breached the agreement but, unfortunately for Ukraine, there is no enforcement mechanism. (Before buying a used car or giving up your nuclear weapons, it's probably a good idea to read what you're about to sign.)

And under similar circumstances, by the way, would we behave any differently from the way the Russians behaved?

Suppose the United States were leasing a naval base from Mexico to protect the security of the Panama Canal (as the Russian Black Sea fleet based in Crimea is leasing its base from Ukraine). And suppose the Mexican gov't were overthrown by one less likely to allow us to continue to use that base (ditto Ukraine).

Does anyone doubt that the Marines would be crossing the border before you could say, 'Remember the Alamo?' As they say in the Russian Tea Room, 'One man's taco is another man's pirogi.'

## SCHOOLHOUSE BLOCKED!

### Residents: Parents clog E. First Street

Scofflaw parents at Gravesend's PS 216 have E. First Street on a crash course, neighbors say.

"Mark my words somebody is gonna get killed!" warns 50-year resident Linda Wiater of the traffic chaos that unfolds when school lets out.

Wiater and her neighbors say that moms and dads descend on the block between Avenues X and Y en masse every weekday shortly before 3 pm — the time Wiater gets off work. She said the parents routinely doubleand triple-park along the street, completely blocking traffic.

"Usually a car, a bus, not anything can get through," Wiater said.

After parking on the road, the parents jaywalk to the schoolyard, according to Wiater, where they sometimes stand and chat for half an hour or more, with their vehicles preventing people from reaching their homes.

Other residents of E. First Street echo Wiater's complaints, saying the problem is causing a significant decline in quality of life on the block.

"It's just one big traffic jam, with horns beeping and trucks not being able to

get through," complained an elderly resident who didn't want to give her name.

The senior said that the daily debacle makes her a prisoner in her own home, because the Access-A-Ride vehicles she depends on for transport cannot get through.

"You can't get in or out while they're here," the woman said.

The parents show little respect for the street's residents, often blocking — or even parking in — their private driveways, and sometimes preventing people on the block from going to pick up their own kids from other schools.

"They block my driveway, they pull into my driveway — they don't consider that I too have to pick

up a child from school," said Amy Heffez, a lifelong resident of the block, who needs to collect her 3-year-old from pre-school at 3 pm.

Heffez said that the police who patrol the street have done nothing to curb the PS 216 parents' poor parking habits in the three years since it became a problem, and that efforts to speak to the parents themselves have proved futile due to language barriers.

"Most of them are immigrants, so they don't really speak English well," said Heffez. "I asked one of them who was parked in front of my driveway to move his car and he just told me 'don't worry, don't worry' and walked away."

Calls to PS 216 were not returned.

The new speed limit will go into effect by the end of the month, Trottenberg said. The city is also exploring the installation of speed cameras to boost enforcement even further, but their hands are tied by state rules that limit placement of the cameras, she said.

"We'd like to have local control over the number of speed cameras and where they go," she said. "We think they're a very important enforcement tool." Road safety activists are thrilled to see their years of warning about the dangers of the road, which in 2012 and 2013 saw 843 crashes between the water and Flatbush Avenue alone, bearing fruit.

"There's no place more appropriate for an arterial slow zone," said Eric Mc-Clure, a member of the Park Slope Street Safety Partnership. "This shows that the administration is committed to making the streets safer."

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

Our neighbor, a doctor responding to a late night call, bled to death in the street, after he was knifed in his car. No one called for help around the giant housing complex. His wife suffered a nervous breakdown and the family, like so many others, ran.

Health and safety is number one for us all. Our local public library is also shut. I see no uniformed police on a beat. I see no emergency units that you used to be able to pull, if witnessing a crime. No pay phones either. ## Twit Council speaker tweets for terrorist<sup>2</sup>

ouncil Speaker MelissaMark-Viverito's crush on unrepentant Puerto Rican terrorist Oscar Lopez-Rivera is getting worse by the torrid tweet.

Gotham's second most

was a first-time mom looking for part-time work in November of 1997 when I took a job as a typist at Courier Life, where I tapped away at a Smith-Corona during school hours every week day.

I was expected to type the press releases that came into the office, along with the four columnists that sent in their copy by mail — Stanley Gershbein, Carmine Santa Maria, Sol Polish, and Lou Powsner.

Out of the four, Lou Powsner always wrote his in long-hand on unlined paper. There were times when I would see his column and think, "Oh no, not the hand-written struggle again." It would, over the years, be a standing line between us.

"Lou, exactly what did you mean in this line? I couldn't decipher it. Could you please type it out for me next week?"

He would agree, but next week would come and the column would be, as before, handwritten.

As in everything else in life, the more you do it, the easier it becomes, and, in time, I was able to unravel his handwriting with ease.

For the next 16 years I got to know Lou as a friend and mentor — I discovered that his family and mine had a strong connection, as both were from Coney Island, living within a

block or two of each other. He was a classmate of my Aunt Mary, knew my Uncle Phil the mechanic, and shared many of the same friends.

For the last couple of years, he would send his column to daughter Bonnie Snow and she would, with the patience of a saint, type it up and e-mail it in.

His columns came in less and less frequently in the past year, and after several weeks without one, I would call him up and check in on him. He would always answer his phone, "Lou Powsner here." No matter what was going on in his life, Lou never failed to ask how my family was nor inquire how my daughter Bri was doing — always remembering her as the little girl he would see when he visited us at the office. When I began writing my own column, he never failed in his encouragement and would often call to discuss a recent column that piqued his interest, especially if it was about our favorite topic, Mayor Bloomberg.

When I spoke to Lou several weeks ago, little did I know that it would be the last time I would ask him, "So Lou are you sending in any columns?"

Thinking back on it, his voice was a bit frailer than usual, but there was no hint that it would be our last conversation. He said he would try writing one and then closed with his usual, "Keep on writing, and give my regards to all in the office."

This past Sunday, the voice of "Speak Out" was silenced when Lou passed away in his sleep at the age of 93.

I will miss those handwritten columns, I will miss his encouragement, but most of all I will miss those walks down memory lane that he was always so generous to share with me. Not for Nuthin'<sup>TM</sup> but rest in pages

Not for Nuthin'™, but rest in peace Lou Powsner.

## Leveling the campaign fund-raising field

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The Supreme Court recently upheld the right of large donors to be able to pour even more money into political campaigns. The opinion by the highest court equated the right to donate with the right to free speech.

Yes, our country does guarantee free speech as a fundamental right. But, some say, by not capping political contributions more, wealthy donors actually have more free speech than others.

If you ask elected leaders and those who have run for political office, perhaps the most difficult challenge in mounting a credible campaign is the ability to raise enough money to be taken seriously.

With a citizenry that largely ignores most political campaigns, it is crucial to be able to cost-effectively convey your message to the 10–20 percent of people who actually show up to

vote. That can be costly, especially in a large and sprawling metropolis like New York City, but it is expensive in urban and rural areas as well.

In an ideal world, those who want to run for office would be required to get a

minimum threshold of signatures or small donations that would qualify them for the same amount of broadcast television time and free mailings to voters. All candidates would then get the same starting point to disseminate their message, and would be able to use the same medium to get their policy ideas and experience out to the public. But, of course, we don't live in an ideal world, and there is an ever proliferating way of reaching potential voters.

Interestingly, the internet and social media will probably bring down the cost of campaigning significantly in the future and disrupt politics, as it has disrupted many other industries in the past decade such as music, media, and television. But in the near future, at least, we'll still see lots of television commercials and find many direct mail pieces in our mailboxes, the standard way of running campaigns in the past.

The relatively new New York City Campaign Finance system, which has a 6-to-1 match of donations up to \$175 (if the candidate meets certain minimum thresholds) has leveled the playing field. The past mayoral election exhibited that with a number of candidates spending roughly the same amount, whose message is most consistent and resonates with voters will win the day. Bill DeBlasio had a clear, consistent message.

It is important for voters to understand how the campaign finance system works, because it means that small donors can have a much larger impact with the leverage of the matching funds. It also means that candidates must try to get in front of a lot of people during the campaign and get lots of relatively small donations so they can eventually receive the maximum in matching funds.

The only glitch in this system is when a self-funded candidate "opts out of campaign finance" and then spends their own money to run. This, of course, gives a decided advantage to wealthy candidates, but there are numerous examples in recent memory of wealthy candidates still losing in the election, including Tom Golisano and Carl Paladino in their New York gubernatorial races. Linda McMahon in Connecticut's senate race, and Meg Whitman's Senate race in California.

Now, there is a contentious battle in Albany to extend campaign finance laws to state elections. A lot of good-government groups are not happy that a comprehensive reform was not included in the recently passed budget. In fact, there was a very limited experiment attempted with the state comptroller's race this year, subjecting it to a new campaign-finance program. But this will actually be even more watered down as an experiment because the current comptroller, Tom DiNapoli, has opted out of this program. DiNapoli, to his credit, claims it is too late in the process (the election is in just six months), and that if he took part, he would have to refund almost \$2 million to previous donors.

But it is important that good-government groups continue to push for campaign finance laws in New York so that we can level the playing field and encourage more citizens to take a stab at running for office.

# Fort Hamilton remembers vets

Fort Hamilton honored Vietnam veterans during its annual Vietnam Veterans Appreciation Day ceremony on March 27 at the Post Theater.

"It is indeed an honor and privilege for me to be here today to pay tribute to the courageous services of the veterans here today who fought in Vietnam," said Col. Eluyn Gines, U.S. Army Garrison Fort Hamilton commander in his opening remarks. "Today is an important day because it is about recognizing their strength, courage and dedication. They not only put their lives on the line for us, but also shaped the world into a better place."

Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day was made official last year when Congress voted on March 30 as the date to annually honor the veteran, according to the Library of Congress. More than 58,000 Americans gave their lives in the war and many were wounded.

Fire Department of New York City commissioner and Vietnam veteran Salvatore Cassano was this year's featured speaker. Cassano has been the commissioner since Jan. 1, 2010. He served in Manhattan and Brooklyn, and has been honored five times during his career for bravery. He received commendations for meritorious acts between 1979 and 1983 for rescuing five people from burning apartments.

He has held every rank in the department during his career beginning as a firefighter in 1969, and was instrumental in rebuilding the department after 343 firefighters died as a result of the Sept. 11 attacks, after which he was named chief of operations. He was appointed chief, the highest uniformed position in the department, in 2006.

"Throughout American history brave men and women have answered the call of duty to protect and defend our country and our democracy." Gines said.

## **World War II vets honored** Washington hosted members of all branches of military

As the brass band played and American flags fluttered in the breeze, World War II veterans received a hero's welcome as they visited the memorial for the war in which they fought seven decades ago.

A column of well-wishers waved flags. Some were dressed in red, white, and blue. Members of the military were also on hand to greet the veterans of the "Greatest Generation," on April 5 at the World War II Memorial.

For many of the veterans arriving on "honor flights" this breezy, sunny morning, it was their first visit to their memorial. U.S. Army Air Corps veteran Dick Tobin was among those in attendance.

"I'm having a wonderful day," said Tobin, who traveled with an honor flight from Syracuse, N.Y. He was accompanied by his daughter, Cheryl Tobin, an Air Force and Navy veteran.

The Honor Flight Network brings veterans to Washington free of charge for them to see the memorials for the wars they fought in decades ago, with priority given to the most senior and terminally ill veterans.

Veterans and their escorts said they were touched by the outpouring of support from members of the public and the military. It was an emotional experience as well to finally visit the memorial, they said.

"I never in a million years expected this. It's wonderful," Tobin said. "There are no words to describe this. It's just wonderful and long overdue."

As the veterans made their way around the memorial, they were greeted with handshakes and expressions of gratitude. "Thank you for your service," and "Can I take your photo?" were often-heard phrases.

Surrounded by a contingent of family members, Army veteran Hugh Phelps held a decades-old picture of his brother Patrick, an Army veteran, on his lap atop a folded American flag.

"I was in the last part of the war with Patrick," said Phelps, who was in the 26th Infantry Division. He arrived at the memorial as part of a tour sponsored by Honor Flight Capital Region, which serves veterans in the Washington, D.C., area.

It's a "very good" and "wonderful day," said Phelps, as his family members smiled proudly and snapped photographs of their war hero.

Navy Chief Warrant Officer Andrew Levy and two members of his detachment — Petty Officers Jordan Holtschulte and Brian MacMurchy — drove three hours from Fort Pickett in Blackstone, Va., to greet the veterans.

"It's our way to pay respects to them. They led the way and enabled us to be who we are and what we can do today," Levy said.

Driving a few hours to Washington to greet the veterans is the very least they could do for the service members who did so much for the nation, said Holtschulte.

Crowds were on hand to cheer and greet the World War II veterans arriving on honor flights from Ohio and upstate New York, and an honor flight bus tour out of the national capital region.

Navy WAVES veteran Eileen Howell from, Columbus, Ohio, said she was having a wonderful day visiting the memorial. She served in the Navy from 1944 to 1946.

"It's far beyond what I ever expected," she said. "It was wonderful. I have never been greeted so much in my life. I couldn't believe it. It was just unimaginable."

Army Lt. Col. Darryl Stephens, who is stationed at the Pentagon, volunteered to accompany the veterans to see the memorial and other important sites.

The veterans are amazing inspirations, he said.

"As a service member, as a soldier, I respect these guys, words can't describe it," said Stephens. "When I read and listen to their stories, it just humbles me." В

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## **Big changes are in store**

Not even a full day after the official publication of Army Regulation 670-1, Sgt. Maj. of the Army Raymond Chandler took the stage at Fort Gordon in Georgia to elaborate on expected changes across the Army and to address soldiers' questions during a tour of the U.S. Army Cyber Center of Excellence. "How we wear our uni-

form and how we present ourselves, not only to each other but to the American people we serve, is important," said Chandler. "We've taken a hard look for almost three years to determine what's feasible, affordable, and reasonable to support our profession and to ensure the trust of the American people."

Chandler was able to specifically address concerns about portions of the publications that have been reported in the media.

"There was a lot of research leading to the actual publication of AR 670-1," said Chandler at one of his town hall meetings.

In response to a question about tattoos, Chandler said he and his board of directors, comprised of senior non-commissioned officers from across the Army, collected data and discussed proposed changes over the past three years. They also listened to the opinions of soldiers and leaders across the Army while they deliberated on their collective policy recommendations to the Secretary of the Army.

"I think what's important about Army Regulation 670-1 is that it is a part of an overall strategy called the Army profession, and it is focused on persons of character, commitment and competence," said Chandler. "First, understand your professional responsibility. As a professional your appearance is a part of that responsibility."

Chandler's visit also focused on his priority to encourage soldiers and leaders to "stand strong" in the face of many challenges the Army faces, including the ongoing drawdown and fiscal restrictions. He said these challenges test the commitment and character of soldiers and can help build their leadership skills.

"T'll tell you that the most dangerous person in our Army today is a person who is highly competent but lacks character or commitment because they make decisions that are not in line with the policy, the spirit, or the intent of what we are as an Army," said Chandler to students and staff of the Non-commissioned Officer Academy.

It's with the help of that enforcement of character, commitment and engaged leadership that Chandler hopes to also reduce sexual assault and harassment, hazing, suicides, and criminal acts within the Army.

"The number one thing is trust, trust between soldiers. That if I come forward to you, whether it's sexual assault or anything else that you're not going to chastise me or ridicule me or put me down, but that you're here to help me get better as a soldier," Chandler told the NCOs about what they could do to assist in the reduction of sexual assault and harassment. He told the audience he knows the Army is making progress here, but he reminded them that there can be no bystanders in these efforts.

The revamping of the NCO education system was another topic of discussion as Chandler and other senior leaders drive on with NCO 2020, including assessing backlogs and establishing a more beneficial system of developing future Army leaders.

A part of developing an enhanced education system is promoting science, technology, engineering and math programs, all of which the U.S. Army Cyber Center of Excellence intends to do.

"I've seen nothing but positive things since I've been at Fort Gordon," said Chandler. "I'm very impressed with the senior leadership and what they are trying to achieve. And to come here to see some young soldiers doing training and be able to talk to some of them and see their motivation — I don't think I could ask for much more."

## Downtown business area penetrated by 'Fallas'

Conway's new moniker raises eyebrows on Fulton Mall

This Fulton Mall department store's new handle really sticks out.

The Conway discount clothing store between Jay Street and Red Hook Lane changed its name last week after more than 20 years — to Fallas. We figured we would give the new handlers the benefit of a doubt and ask if the fresh label is not pronounced the Spanish way — "fah-yah-s."

"No. It's fa-luss," an employee, who asked not to be named, explained.

A California company National Stores called bought the Conway chain in January and re-christened the stores. Their official full name is Fallas Paredes, which translates to "failure walls" in Spanish. National Stores runs more than 200 Fallas outlets around the country, including 14 in New York now that the Conway deal has gone through. A worker at the Fulton Street location said the company is keeping all of the Conway staff.

The store's racks have been switched out, but its



employees and clothing stock remain much the same and, so far, many longtime customers have not noticed much change.

"The styles are a little different, but it's pretty similar," said Francesca Rodriguez, an East New York resident who has been shopping at the retailer for a dozen years and was browsing at the re-branded Fallas with her daughter.

rent storefront in 2010 from a smaller location up the block. The clothier lured people in with low prices on threads for kids and adults.

"If I need to find a cute outfit, I know I can come down here and get it," said Rodriguez. "It's affordable."

The store conversion will be complete in the next couple of weeks, according a staffer.

In the meantime, the provocative new moniker will take some getting used to.

"Conway was a fixture for Downtown Brooklyn," said Gordon Glover, who walked to the store from his home in Cobble Hill.

"Fallas ... Fallas ... Fallas ..." he said, trying the new name on for size. "It'll grow on you, I guess."


Father Mitchell served in various positions within the Brooklyn Diocese for the better part of six decades.

Father Mucci became acquainted with Father Mitchell through the various times he met him at Gargiulo's Restaurant in Coney Island, where he was a frequent patron.

"I would see lines of people always stopping by his table to say hello," he said. "He was always generous with his spirituality he was a remarkable, giving and caring man."

Since his retirement in 2006, Father Mitchell ministered at St. Joachim and Anne Nursing and Rehabilitation Home in Coney Island. Before taking a spill several months ago, that left him

with a neck brace and in a wheelchair, Father Mitchell was fond of walking his King Charles Spaniel past Gargiulo's restaurant every day.

Longtime friend and Gargiulo's owner Nino Russo met Father Mitchell in 1980 when he was a student at Xaverian High School, where Father Mitchell taught ninth-grade religion, remembered Mitchell as a scholarly genius type who looked to help as many people as he could. He said he helped the priest find an apartment

### near his restaurant.

"Father Mitchell would eat with us four or five times a week as well as walk his dog every morning," Russo said. "My family and I were very blessed to have known him and learned from his wisdom, grace, and kindness."


Russo hosted a luncheon in Father Mitchell's honor following the burial on April 3.

After receiving ordination from the Immaculate Conception Seminary on June 3, 1961, Father Mitchell ministered at St. Agnes and St. Barbara, Holy Family and St. Peter and Paul. He was Dean and moderator at the Catholic Youth Organization South Eastern Kings, and chaplain at the Brooklyn House of Detention in 1977.

After studying abroad in the North American College in Rome Father Mitchell returned to the United States where he taught at Cathedral College until 1977.

Father Mitchell frequently held Easter Vigil masses at the Brooklyn House of Detention as well as St. Joachim nursing home as a visiting chaplain, and where he resided for the past several months.

A mass was held at St. Mark's Church on April 3. He was buried at St. John Cemetery in Queens.

helly Reuben's writing career began with a burning curiosity.

Over 30 years ago, the Bay Ridge author became enthralled by a newspaper article about two boys in Manhattan who were being celebrated because they had saved a number of people from fires started by arsonists.

"I was so intrigued by the two boys and the follow-up, which I thought would make a great book," said the Bay Ridge local.

Reuben's inquisitiveness would ultimately shape her life and career. She contacted the fire marshals investigating the blazes and began doing research with the New York Fire Department, where she met her late husband.

Rueben became certified as both a fire investigator and private investigator, and eventually began her own private arson investigation business with her husband. And in 1998, she released the first of many mystery novels inspired by her work.

Now, more than three decades after article that started everything, Reuben has finally written a novel inspired by those two boys.

"The Boys of Sabbath Street", which Reuben will introduce and sign at Bay Ridge's BookMark Shoppe on April 19, is the author's ninth book. The novel centers around a reluctant arson detective, who is the assistant to a semi-retired magician and the mayor of the town of Calendar, where the novel takes place. The story follows the duo around as they work with the local fire marshal to investigate how and why the small town seems to be burning down.

Reuben said she wanted to incorporate her life experiences into the story without making it too much of a focus.

"The hardest thing was keeping a light touch so that my readers are learning a whole lot about fire investigation and they won't even notice they're learning it," she said.

The book is also inspired by one specific fire that Reuben and her late husband worked on over 12 years ago in Hoboken, she said.

"I took photographs of the local fire department and the city hall and I put them in the file with my book 'The Boys of Sabbath Street," she said. "The fire investigation I did in Hoboken completely created the entire town of Calendar where all of the action takes place in the book."

### Tuvan groovin': Throat singing at the library

lash Ensemble is more than just a pretty voice. The musical group, which hails

from Tuva — a tiny republic in East Siberia that is part of the Russian Federation might be known for its traditional throat singing style, but its manager wants the world to know that it is much more than that.

"The singing is just one part of the musical whole," said Sean Quirk, the band's manager and interpreter. "It's a deep and varied musical experience, not just vocal technique."

In addition to being experts in the multinote throat singing that was developed by nomadic herdsman in their home region, the three members all also play a variety of instruments, including the doshpuluur (a lute), the shoor (a type of flute), and the kengirge (a goat-skin drum).

The members of the trio started playing and singing together when they were in college in the Tuvan capital of Kyzyl. All of them studied under throat singing legend Kongar-ol Ondar, and have since gained plenty of fame on their own, touring to the United States 16 times since the mid-aughts.

In past passes through Brooklyn, the trio played at Barbes in Park Slope and the now-defunct Zebulon in Williamsburg. This time, it will play at the Central Library, in a free concert on April 17.

Some of the songs Alash plays are traditional dirges that have been passed down through generations. But others are pieces the band members have written themselves, often influenced by the American musicians they have toured with, such as the Sun Ra Arkestra and Bela Fleck and the Flecktones.

"Tradition is a thing that is alive and not static," said Quirk. "The music is an organic, natural result of these three young men who are rooted in their traditions and being exposed to all this incredible world music."

### Sing-a-long Seeger: Fest plays tribute to folk legend

There is hope for the world — and you can find it at this Pete Seeger tribute. This year's Brooklyn Folk Festival

will host a salute to Pete Seeger, the New York City troubadour who died at the age of 94 earlier this year.

"Pete was such an important figure — we just wanted to pay homage," said Stephanie Jenkins of the Jenkins Family Band, which will play Seeger's tunes during the April 20 concert at the Bell House in Gowanus.

In the ultimate homage to Seeger, Jenkins is encouraging all concert-goers to sing along.


"That was his bread and butter — getting people to sing," said Jenkins, who first saw Seeger live in 2004 and learned the banjo from his book "How to Play the Five-String Banjo."

Indeed, Seeger was known for his live performances, where he got thousands of people to sing tunes with him.

"People would go to see him just to have a reason to sing together," said Eli Smith, who is organizing the festival along with the nearby Jalopy Theatre.

More than an entertainer, Seeger was a social activist and is credited with rescuing American music from oblivion at the dawning of the pop music era.

In the 1920s and '30s, with the advent of the radio, many amateur musicians the country

over put down their dobros and started listening to pop radio — the phenomenon threatened the largely aural American music tradition, Smith said.

"Around the mid-20th century, highways and the radio obliterated local music," he said.

Seeger travelled the South, learning the American canon and re-tooling it for pop audiences, effectively inventing the "folk music" genre, Smith said. For modern musicians learning the old-time catalog, Seeger is a standard-bearer and an inspiration, Smith said.

"He was the first person like us," he said, referring to the bevy of Brooklyintes picking up banjos in search of a bygone era.

As with many of today's washboard-scraping, fiddle-playing folk musicians, Seeger was a college-educated urbanite who sought out the American folk tradition rather than being born into it, he added.

This year's folk fest, which will take place from April 18–20, will also highlight other old-time bands. Performances will include East River String Band with R. Crumb and Jalopy house band the Whiskey Spitters. There will also be square dancing and the festival's annual "banjo toss."

At the Seeger tribute on the festival's closing night, the Jenkins Family will play popular Seeger hits such as "If I Had A Hammer," "This Land Is Your Land," and "We Shall Overcome," so come ready to wail, Jenkins said.

"I don't think anything else would be appropriate," she said.

To that end, "Ample Hills Creamery"







# Caravan of carnage: W'burg play offers bloody, trippy take on the Donner Party

By Danielle Furfaro his play will stick to your ribs. Beginning April 12, a theater company known for its brutal plays will present "The Tower" at Williamsburg's Standard ToyKraft, offering a surrealist look at the travails of the Donner Party. And the play won't just be about cannibalism, the writer promised.

"The whole play is not about eating people in gory ways," said playwright Adam Scott Mazer of the AntiMatter Collective, which has previously staged a zombie Western and a post-apocalyptic horror story about robots. "It is more about the things that are going on in people's minds and the building tension and desperation that causes people to act this way. I thought it would be good fodder for drama."

The play depicts the doomed

voyage of a group of American pioneers who left their homes in 1846 with the intention of settling in California. The party, traveling in a caravan of wagons, encountered harsh conditions along the way and eventually resorted to eating members of the group to stay alive.

In the process of putting the production together,

director Mazer, Philip Gates, and co-creator Maya Rook spent months researching the history of the Donner Party - even traveling to the Donner Pass and Donner Lake in California to talk with historians.

Each section of the Photo by Jonathan Shawplay is designed after

a different tarot card, explained Gates. The play's title is named for the tower card, which represents chaos, because that is the overall theme of the piece.

"Everything needs to come down so that something new can take place," he said.

The play has a decidedly psychedelic bent, with time moving both backwards and forwards, and some scenes representing fantastical events happening in the characters' minds.

"I knew it should not be a completely realistic play," said Mazer. "Watching people slowly freeze to death is not very compelling."

But one element that will be realistic in the play will be the plethora of cannibalism, Gates said. To make those scenes appropriately gruesome, the production brought in Stephanie Cox-Williams, who is well known in the film and theater worlds for creating top-notch gore.

"We wanted to make it as realistic as possible," said Gates. "There are prosthetics and blood capsules and, of course, food."

The game was called because of heavy rain with two outs after the Knights scored five runs in the top of the seventh.


Gerone is drawing strength from her new responsibilities.

# Blackbirds fly straight after coaching change

The Long Island University baseball team has proven it can handle a curve.

The sudden resignation of Blackbirds' six-year head coach Don Maines in early March was a shock to the players, according to LIU Athletic Director and interim coach John Suarez, but the veteran team soon banded together.

The players snapped out of it quick after Suarez proved he was capable of helping them win games.

"This team has stuck together throughout it," said senior shortstop John Ziznewski. "This team is strong."

The Blackbirds, who were picked by the coaches to finish fourth in the Northeast Conference, are 14–11–1 overall and 11–5–1 since Suarez took over. Long Island University won just 21 games last season.

Suarez, who played college baseball at Farleigh Dickson and interim assistant coach Dan Iglesias, a former pitcher at the school, have eased the transition. But the coaches give plenty of credit to veterans like Ziznewski, Pete Leonello and graduate student Matt McCormick for keeping things together.

"I think this would have been more of a disaster if I didn't have those five or six seniors who were able to understand how you get through this and work with me to get the team through it," said Suarez, who declined to give details on Maines's departure beyond saying it was because of an "incident on the coaching staff."

Long Island University headed into this week riding on arguably its best performance this season — an 11–1 win over Wagner last Sunday — to even the team's weekend series at two games a piece. Freshman Bobby Maxwell allowed just four hits over 8.3 scoreless innings of work. The duo of Leonello and Ziznewski collected a combined six hits and seven runs batted in.


The Xaverian baseball team is off to a great start this season, despite losing 17 seniors from last year's Brooklyn-Queens division championship team.

Gray, who also plays centerfield and bats cleanup, may be the rotation's leader, but Roventini describes Calabrese, the team's No. 2 hitter, as the team's heart and soul. He bats second in a deep order behind star shortstop Anthony Prato. The sophomore's speed and smarts give him a chance to mature into one of the city's best lead-off hitters.

"He was the engine that started us last year," Roventini said. "Now that he is a better player on top of that, to me, if we get him on base, we are going to score a boatload of runs."

Prato is part of a strong lineup that Roventini believes opposing pitchers will have trouble keeping quiet for a whole game. Freshman right fielder Pat De-Marco, junior first baseman Christian Pelligrino and left fielder Matt Zapata already look more comfortable at the plate, according to Roventini. No. 3 hitter Daniel Bakst is expected to provide steady production and Isaiah Russell brings speed to the bottom of the order.

"I think by the third and the fourth inning we are really jumping on people and it's really exciting to see," Ehrenberg said.

Calabrese, Gray and their teammates hope to be jumping on each other in a pile celebration in their final game again this season. Their passion to complete the quest for a fourth-straight state title is noticeable.

"Ithink they are driven," Roventini said. "You can sit on your laurels and say you have beaten a few people, but I think this year, because it's that special number four, I think it's driving them more."

# Home court, health key to Nets' success

he Brooklyn Nets summer gamble has paid off.

Sure, it took some time, some tweaks, and the shedding of head coach Jason Kidd's tie, but the Nets are right around where owner Mikhail Prokhorov and general manager Billy King hoped the team would be when they brought in Paul Pierce, Kevin Garnett, and others in the offseason. Brooklyn is in fifth place in the Eastern Conference, just two-and-a-half games behind the Toronto Raptors for first place in the Atlantic Division with six games to play coming into this week. It is the same distance behind the Chicago Bulls for fourth place in the Eastern Conference and a home court advantage in the first round of the playoffs.

So the Nets can't take their foot off the pedal in the season's final week, despite the understandable urge to rest veterans like Pierce, Joe Johnson and Deron Williams. Any home court advantage the team can get is huge.

Brooklyn compiled a 15-game home winning streak heading into this week and are 21–2 at the Barclays Center since the turnaround began on Jan. 1. The arena has truly become their home court in the team's second season there. The Nets are just 11–11 away from the friendly confines of Kings County in that same time frame, and is 15–23 for the entire season.

The team received a not-so-gentle reminder of that last week at Madison Square Garden when the crosstown rival Knicks carved up Brooklyn 110– 81. Brooklyn's lone win over the Chicago Bulls, the team's likely playoff

opponent, came at Barclays in February.

I got on Jason Kidd early for looking overmatched, and for jettisoning assistant coach Lawrence Frank in December. A month later, the Nets began winning at a clip better than any team in the league. Since then, Kidd has became the coach everyone believed he could be when he was hired.

Help is on the way as well. Star forward Kevin Garnett missed 19 games due to back spasms, and forward Andre Kirilenko was out for six because of sprained left ankle. Their returns are pivotal to the Nets' playoff success. Major minutes from Mirza Teletovic, Shaun Livingston and Marcus Thorton in the post season doesn't scream world title contender. If the Nets get out of the first round, the team can give the Bulls and Heat a stiff test in the conference semifinals.

To do so, the Nets will have to get healthy, and get as many games at the Barclays Center as possible. The two things may be at odds with each other with so little time left, but will go along way if accomplished.

The South Carolina-bound point guard carried the Lady Kingsmen with her scoring, and was a better leader on and off the court this year. Cuevas was the most valuable player of the Blue Division bracket at the Nike Tournament of champions. She will always

be remembered for her electrifying 50-point performance in a Catholic High School Athletic Association state semifinal win over rival Christ the King.

**Girls**' All-Brooklyn Basketball Coach of the Year: Mike Moore, Midwood

The Hornets team has been a constant in the Public School Athletic League quarterfinals for more than a decade, but Moore was able to take the program a step further in his fourth season since taking over for his mentor Artie LaGreca. Moore guided a veteran team to a 16-6 record and the program's first semifinals appearance since 2003 in a loss to South Shore.

All-Brooklyn First Team:

Guard Emmeri Archer, South Shore

Archer was a driving force behind the Vikings' success this season. The Texas A&M-Corpus Christi-bound guard provided fearless drives, clutch shots, and plenty of defense along South Shore's road back to the Public School Athletic League title game. Her leadership will be missed.




