Critics: New bus stop under creepy overpass will lead to rape

They want a bus transfer.

The city must move a Sheepshead Bay bus stop from under a dark and isolated train trestle before someone gets raped, straphangers are demanding. The city recently placed the bus stop there to improve safety, but totally missed the point, one frustrated B36 rider told transportation officials at a May 3 Plumb Beach Civic meeting.

"You will have robberies and rapes," said Sheepshead Bay resident Pam Glantzman. "There's no reason why a woman coming home from work should wait under a dark, unlit train trestle for a bus here in Brook-

lyn. That was a very poor choice. Why didn't you take a look at that before? No, you're up in your high buildings not giving a wit about the people whose lives you're changing, and you should be ashamed of yourselves."

The city transferred the B36 bus stop from outside the Sheepshead Bay Road subway station to Avenue Z and E. 15th Street two weeks ago - part of a larger, controversial traffic re-jiggering under the Mayor's Vision Zero traffic-safety plan — claiming the change will make area side streets more pedestrian-friendly. The B4 and B49 already have stops there. The Department of Transportation Continued on page 13

City suspends second Election clerk for Dem. Primary Day voter fiasco

She does not have their vote.

The city has suspended a top Brooklyn Democratic elections worker and opened an investigation into her role in a massive voter-roll purge that disenfranchised borough ballot casters in the recent presidential primary, officials announced on May 5.

The Board of Elections voted two days earlier to sideline Democratic chief clerk Betty Ann Canizio — and withhold her six-figure salary — while it determines whether she was culpable for her office crossing off 123,000 Democrats while clearing ineligible ones from the board's Kings County books. Officials are not sure how long the probe will take - nor have they determined whether the city or an outside group will conduct the inquiry — but the election board's head is

Calls for more Coney community centers as city passes on closed social service building

They say it's not the *People's* Playground anymore.

A Manhattan developer bought a block-sized Surf Avenue building for \$7.7 million at a bankruptcy auction on May 5, dashing the hopes of community activists and local pols who made a late push to get the mayor to purchase it and convert the dormant building into public space that the area sorely needs, according to a local advocate who credits his life to community centers.

"There's a real crisis down there with all these kids out in the street and not having a place to go," said Coney Island native Jose Gonzalez, a member of the Guardian Angels. "When I grew up, there was the community centers that saved me — with all the gangs that were going on, if I didn't have that center I would've been caught up and probably dead."

'Dream' deferred

Catsimatidis bought Coney property, will not use it to build 'Ocean Dreams' development

Billionaire supermarket mogul and developer John Catsimatidis is betting on the Coney Island waterfront.

The builder bought the Boardwalk-adjacent former Federation Employment and Guidance Service building on Surf Avenue and W. 35th Street in Coney Island — a full 20 blocks from the booming Amusement District — for a cool \$7.7 million last week, this paper has learned. Catsimatidis has no immediate designs for the newly purchased land, and buying it was no indication he will begin constructing the blocks-long Ocean Dreams development he's been planning nearby for years — but it is a sign that Coney's stock is rising, he said.

"It's a very speculative area," he said.

He blamed city policy for delaying development on his waterfront People's Play-

ground properties.

"We may build it, we may not, depending on how much cooperation we get from the city."

Catsimatidis would not elaborate further but may have been alluding to the

now-expired 421-a tax abatement program, which in part gave developers tax breaks for building on previously vacant lots, such as the two he scooped up next to the recently acquired social ser-

Options for L train closure: Bad and worse

What the L kind of choice is that?

The Metropolitan Transportation Authority presented subway surfers with two closure plans for fixing the Sandy-ravaged L train tunnel to Manhattan last Thursday — either sever the connection completely for 18 months, or drastically reduce service on the already overcrowded line for three years — but straphangers said it was pretty clear that the authority has already set its mind on option A.

"I don't think they're giving us a choice," said Williamsburger and lifelong Brooklynite Patricia Dobosz after seeing the authority's pitch to residents at the Marcy Avenue Armory. "They're making it look like a choice, but I don't think they really are."

Agency honchos touted the full closure as the "most efficient" option, while warning that dramatically diminished service — which would offer one train every 12 to 15 minutes while workers repair one track at a time — would still grind to a complete halt any time there was a construction problem, and that only one in five customers would actually be able to squeeze into the infrequent cars.

In both scenarios, the L would operate as a local line in Brooklyn, but with only one train around every eight minutes — twice as long as the wait now during the morning rush and two minutes longer than the evening rush — which an agency presentation described as "near normal service."

Officials stressed the need to act quickly — although work to repair the damage from the 2012 take too long to design Superstorm won't begin until 2019, and the public Prendergast claimed.

Residents largely agreed that the faster plan was the best of the two options on offer — though they were told that alternative suggestions of only closing nights and weekends, or building a new tunnel entirely, were out of the question.

Repairs would kick up toxic dust that takes time to clean — so opening and closing the tunnels every day would be impossible — and a new tunnel would take too long to design and build, agency czar Tom

But many said the plan they really want to see

out a dedicated bus lane across the Williamsburg Bridge to ferry passengers from the Bedford Avenue station.

Riders may also be able to transfer between some lines for free, including from the Broadway G stop to the Lorimer Street J and M stop, they said.

But one local entrepreneur said the agency really needs to offer shuttle service from every affected L stop — busing to and from the nearest alternate trains to keep as many visitors coming to the nabe as possible.

"If that went frequently enough, you wouldn't sacrifice as much of the local traffic," said Jen Durbin, who owns a business near the Jefferson Street stop.

The meeting itself went far smoother than some of the transit body's previous interactions with locals over the proposed closure, including a February town hall where crowd members practically ran a rep out the door for refusing to answer their questions.

Officials only answered pre-written questions, and came armed with a slick video and a display of damaged hardware from the tube to make their

building at the corner of W. 35th Street closed before Superstorm Sandy, but the damage it sustained in the storm — and the social-services agency's bankruptcy last year — sealed its fate.

He's Jamaican it!

A Canarsie chef who was once told he might never walk again is not only cruising around the kitchen again, he just achieved his dream of opening his own eatery in Fort Greene last week.

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Cyclists

· Bicyclists must follow the same traffic rules as automobile drivers. Stop for red lights and stop signs, signal lane changes or turns, and

drive on the correct side of the road.

- Watch out for parked cars. Oftentimes, drivers exit their vehicles and do not check for oncoming traffic or cyclists. You can be hit by a swinging car door.
- · Make yourself as noticeable as possible. This could include using a light or horn on the bike to signal your presence to drivers.
- · Always wear a helmet and other applicable safety equipment.

- · Maintain your bike so that it is safe to ride.
- Do not carry others on your bike (such as a friend or a child) if it is not designed to do so. Riding on the handlebars or behind the cyclist can be dangerous.
- · Avoid the use of ear buds or headphones while cycling. You want all of your senses to be available to avoid accidents.
- · Cycle out of the way of drivers' blind spots so you'll be more visible.

• Do not ride your bike on the sidewalk where you could injure pedestrians.

Pedestrians

- · Always use sidewalks and crosswalks when available. If no sidewalk is present, be sure to walk against the direction of traffic.
- Use traffic signals as your guide. However, make sure all traffic has stopped before crossing the road or stepping off of the sidewalk.
- Keep control of pets when

walking on a leash, so you're not pulled out into traffic.

- Use caution at bus stops. Many injuries occur from pedestrians running to catch a bus or stepping out into traffic after exiting a bus. Remember, there will be another bus behind the one you're chasing and safety is more important.
- · Wear brightly colored or reflective clothing if walking at night.
- · Do not cross highways or interstates on foot.

promising it will be exhaustive.

"There is a lot of information to go through post election with respect to all of the details that led up to the voters that were purged, and we want to make sure that when we take full and final action — that it's done based on all the facts and done appropriately," said executive director Michael Ryan.

Meanwhile, Canizio is allowed to continue her bid for Bay Ridge's 64th Assembly District Democratic committeewoman — a low-level, unpaid elected position primarily responsible for staffing polling sites on election day. She faces incumbent Joane Seminara in a June primary.

But she won't be able to fulfill her role if she wins the while still under investigation, Ryan said.

"She had already been instructed, by me, to refrain from any work associated with the 64th," he said.

Canizio is the second staffer to come under fire - the board suspended Republican deputy chief clerk Diane Haslett-Rudiano just two days after the primary.

Ryan declined to say whether the city would investigate Brooklyn commissioners Simon Shamoun (R) and

and Metropolitan Transportation Authority collaborated on the move, and lowering walker injuries is the department's highest goal, a spokesman said.

"Safety is DOT's No. 1 priority," he said, citing a B36 bus that hit and killed a woman on E. 17th Street last year.

The new stop may reduce walkerdriver friction, but it introduces a more sinister danger, another rider said.

"I come home late at night," said Ellyn Rothstein, who takes the bus from the subway to her Sheepshead Bay home. "And now I stand under nervous. There are no lights under the trestle, it's just totally dark. It's isolating."

Lights would help, but Rothstein would prefer the bus bay shifted somewhere safer, she said.

"Either put it back or maybe put some lights there," she said. "They need to find something to make it safer. Or just put it back.'

The changes are set in stone, but the city is considering additional lighting, the transportation department spokesman said.



The lifequard's qualifications should be based on work experience and the type of certification needed for the particular duties to be performed. No person shall be employed as a lifeguard unless he or she holds the proper, current lifeguard and CPR certificates as described below.

Surf-Lifeguard:

Supervision Level 1 Surf Lifeguard(s) are required at all ocean surf beaches. The minimum qualification requirements are as follows:

- The lifeguard must be at least 17 years old.
 Candidates must possess a current American Red Cross Basic life Support for the professional rescuer Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Certificates or American Heart Association Course "C" CPR certificate, or an equivalent certificate approved by the New York State Department of Health Certification period must not
- 3. Candidates must possess a current Municipal Lifeguard Certification, or accepted equivalent certificates having successfully completed a minimum 20-hour surf lifeguard training courses acceptable to the New York State Department of Health. The certification period must not exceed three years. (The municipal course complies with specifications listed in New York City Health Code Article 167.19).

Surf-Lifequard, Supervisor:

A minimum of one Supervising Lifeguard is required to direct ocean surf beaches that require three (3) or more lifeguards. The minimum qualification requirements are as follow:

- Candidates must have the qualifications specified in the above section, Surf-Lifeguard. Must be at least two (2) seasons of adequate lifeguarding experience.
- Candidates must possess a current American Red Cross Community—Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) Certificate, or equivalent approved by the New York State department of Health. Certification period shall not exceed one year, and candidates must be competent to:
- Understand and apply the Rules and Regulations of this part and implement the Safety Plan, and
- Evaluate Environmental Hazards; and
- Use lifesaving equipment and facility; and
- Undertake bath/Crowd control

Mill Basin Holocaust remembrance keeps memories alive

The story must survive.

Hundreds of people — young and old — filled Temple Sholom in Mill Basin to honor those killed during the Holocaust with a candle-lighting ceremony on Yom HaShoah, the Holocaust day of remembrance.

And a survivor, whose family escaped the Shoah, spoke to the multi-generational room to ensure that what happened more than 70 years ago will never be forgotten, said Rabbi Eliseo Rozenwasser.

"Our main goal is to preserve the memories of those who died during the Holocaust and make sure that new generations are aware of what happened and turn that tragedy into a positive message," he said. "And making sure that we can recreate — through acts of kindness — the lives that were lost."

The temple reverberated with song from local Hebrew school students, who performed the Israeli national anthem and

other tunes — and in turn, the youngsters were able to learn about the tragedy that afflicted their ancestors, said Audrey Durst, chairperson of the temple's Holocaust committee.

"We used to have many survivors in our temple, we only have about six or seven

left and it's very sad," she said.
"And it's very important that
the children are taught so
they can carry on and it's not
forgotten."

The Islamic Society of Bay Ridge is the neighborhood's only mosque and was founded in the mid-1980s.

BAY IMPROVEMENT GROUP: Who Are We?

WHO WE ARE

The Bay Improvement Group (B.I.G.) is a broad coalition of people, businesses, groups, and leaders that for over 25 years has been dedicated to the future preservation, revitalization, and comprehensive planning of Sheepshead Bay and its main



streets. Founded in 1992 and incorporated in 1993, **B.I.G.** is a non-profit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization with over 500 members.

Since the 1980s,

the founders of **B.I.G.** have actively warned of overdevelopment in Sheepshead Bay. We have consistently talked about overdevelopment and congestion, and recommended tightened zoning regulations. That message and work have been carried forward and presented repeatedly and publicly by **B.I.G.** in zoning reports, specific guidelines to protect the neighborhood's character, public meetings, parking plans, and development comments. We continue to see a great need, through equitable enforcement of our laws, for our community to come together and prevent destruction of our unique Sheepshead Bay.

UNIQUE SHEEPSHEAD BAY

Sheepshead Bay: the only place in New York City with the special flavor of a party boat fishing fleet, restaurants, and maritime recreational activities, all in one harbor. We must preserve what's left of this treasure from runaway and uncomplimentary development, especially as developers continue



to eye properties damaged by Superstorm Sandy. Our limited public space, such as the pier area, must remain uncluttered and well thought out, so that it enhances and respects rather than detracts from our bay. And we must rebuild from the disaster in safe, smart ways.

We at **B.I.G.** care about the quality of life in our community. We believe in elevating the values of our main streets and in maintaining and rebuilding our unique waterfront for marine-related uses, as required by the Special Use District zoning law of Sheepshead Bay. We seek to maintain the character and scale of the fishing boats, restaurants, historic structures, tourism, and recreation available. We see our main shopping street, Sheepshead Bay Road, our supporting secondary main streets such as Nostrand Avenue and Avenue U, and the commercial strips around them as key to our community's economic growth, stability and health. As the value of these important business strips increases, so does the value of our community, homes, individual businesses, and ultimately, our quality of life.

Sheepshead Bay offers everything from boating, scuba diving, swimming, windsurfing, sailing lessons at yacht clubs, and of course, fishing. Which leads to what many consider to be what we in Sheepshead Bay do best: eat! Whether it's fresh fish right off a boat; a fabulous meal at OPera Cafe, Liman's Restaurant, or IL Fornetto on the bay; or casual savories from Jimmy's Famous Heros, Randazzo's Clam Bar, or any of our fine new eateries and restaurants, Sheepshead Bay is the place to be. You can also walk across the historic 1880 wooden footbridge for a wonderful view of the bay, stroll down Emmons Avenue, or hop on a fishing boat or sunset cruise at one of our many local marinas, boat clubs, and yacht clubs. There's so much to do, but if all you want is a bay breeze, we have that, too!

We also neighbor on Jamaica Bay, Gateway National Recreation Area, Manhattan, Gerritsen, Brighton and Coney Island Beaches.

WHAT WE DO

B.I.G.'s volunteer work is evident everywhere in Sheepshead Bay. The Arts for Transit public mural at the Sheepshead Bay subway station; three Adopt-A-Highway garden sites; community events, like our annual B.I.G. Celebrity Caroling & Toy Drive; our B.I.G. Oscar Awards, which recognize outstanding community service; and of course our main event, BayFest, are all only the tip of the iceberg. As a member of the committee to rehabilitate the Sheepshead Bay subway station, B.I.G. has seen the \$10 million rehabilitation and opening of our subway station. We have also been active in Preserve Our Waterfront (POW), a south Brooklyn coalition organized to stop out-of-control waterfront developers.





What's New In Cataract Surgery? A Lot!!

For years patients have asked me, "do you use laser in cataract surgery?" The answer has always been "no" until now! Our modern-day cataract surgery utilizes phacoemulsification or ultrasound to break up the cataract through an incision so small that no stitches are required. But now, I can say to patients that "yes, we can utilize a laser to do cataract surgery."

We can now use a laser to make many of the steps in cataract surgery more precise. In very advanced cataracts the laser can be used to soften the cataract so that less energy is needed to remove it. Since this new technology is in the early stages of use, it is not yet known how much better it will make our results, already very good. In the future, I am sure that we will be utilizing the laser more often and that we will be getting closer to giving patients better and quicker glasses-free vision. Right now, the technology is still expensive and for most patients doing cataract surgery without the laser will yield excellent results. And, oh yes, we still have to make an incision into the eye and utilize phacoemulsification to get rid of the cataract.

When the cataract is removed, which is the natural lens of the eye, it has to be replaced by a new lens or an implant. These implants remain in the eye for the lifetime of the patient and allow the patient to focus.

There are new implants now that correct astigmatism and some that allow patients to see far and near without glasses. Astigmatism has to do

with the curvature of the cornea, the clear window in front of the eye. The astigmatic lenses work very well and now allow patients with large amounts of astigmatism to walk around without glasses. However, glasses for reading are still necessary. The multifocal lenses allow eligible patients to do mostly everything without glasses. However, in certain situations they still require a prescription for glasses. These lenses are new technology and thus are an out-of- pocket cost to patients. For those who find it difficult to pay for these lenses, I assure patients that after cataract surgery their vision will still improve as our techniques for cataract surgery are excellent. This is a great time in ophthalmology to have cataract surgery as our results are so good and usually the recovery of good sight is so quick. When Sandy hit in October 2012, we were first responders, began a "No Neighbor Left Behind" advocacy program, and in the coming months will support the community's revitalization through our new program, "Bringing Back the Bay."

B.I.G. has presented historic talks, slide shows, and archaeological exhibitions; lobbied successfully for historic lampposts on Emmons Avenue and Sheepshead Bay

Road; and advocated successfully for the Brooklyn District Attorney's Office to open up branch offices (the first being in Sheepshead Bay). With the help of the NYC Department of Probation's Community Service Division and others, **B.I.G.** has painted over graffiti on more than 4,900 storefronts; removed graffiti over fifteen times from over 575 mailboxes (some with help from Gerritsen Beach Cares and the Coney Island-Gravesend Graffiti Task Force); painted over 500 fire hydrants; and given a fresh coat to the underpasses of the Belt Parkway and the subway line from Sheepshead Bay to Gravesend.

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








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Board-balk! City 'sabotages' landmarking

Growing up in New York, I had a view of the world similar to the famous old New Yorker cover by Saul Steinberg: after Ninth Avenue came the Hudson, then a brief stretch of America with Japan, China and Russia in the distant horizon.

It is easy to be a myopic New Yorker and think that the world revolves around the issues that concern us.

So to get far away from the city, as I did last week, is refreshing.

Last Thursday I took an overnight flight to Munich, Germany, a beautiful city that is home to my 93-year-old uncle and a place where I spent a momentous 18 months of my childhood; I had not been back there since 1975 and, not surprisingly, much has changed.

I was struck by how much nicer the Munich airport is than rundown JFK; arriving to a new, clean facility drove home the fact that our crumbling infrastructure is a bigger problem that we acknowledge. When we talk about losing our edge in the global economic race, our subpar transportation grid is one reason.

The Lufthansa airplane that I took to Munich provided the most efficient aviation experience I've ever had. The interior was vast and the coach seats were comfortable. Bathrooms were located on a lower level and there was plenty of room to move around. With the winds at our back, the entire flight was a mere seven hours, and with an impressive menu of newly released films in my private screen, the time flew by — literally.

Munich is truly a bicyclist's paradise—the lanes for cycling are as wide as many car lanes in Manhattan, and in some places the riders outnumbered the drivers. Munich is the city we should emulate for its bike-friendly grid.

The people of Munich are incredibly helpfulandfriendly. The street traffic seemed orderly, the locals and tourists mixed gracefully and the city exuded a sense of calm. Maybe it was the perfect 75-degree sunny weather, but I suspect that the dog-eat-dog nature of New York is in short supply in Germany's large cities.

My cousin was my guide, bringing to the new hot spots in Munich as well as my old haunts from the mid-'70s. The outdoor dining was delectable and the omnipresent "conditoreis" — dessert stores — dotted the streets, giving the city a festive feel.

The biggest surprise for me was how much changed around the American military base on the outskirts of town; in the 1970s, thousands of American military personnel were stationed all around Germany, and now there are but a

few. In Munich, I attended the American military school in a place called Perlacher Forest. Today, there aren't any Americans there, and my old school has been converted to a German kindergarten. The housing for military personnel is now affordable units for the German middle class.

A big topic of discussion in Germany is the flooding in of Syrian and African refugees and the controversial opendoor policy of Prime Minister Angela Merkel. The million refugees that are being acclimated are an expensive government project, and German citizens are concerned whether the economy and tax base can absorb this influx of needy citizens.

It is quite an ironic situation that the country responsible for much of the destruction and misery in the 20th century has become a paragon of enlightenment in the early 21st century. Germany has become the national embodiment of our Statue of Liberty's hopeful message. America has taken in fewer than 20,000 refugees (50 times fewer than Germany), and Donald Trump


is talking about deporting more than 10 million immigrants and banning an entire religion from our shores.

I never thought I'd be living in a world where America could take lessons in compassion and humanity from our Teutonic allies. When I discussed the horrors of the Holocaust with my 93-year-old uncle, a survivor of Hitler's death camps, I was overcome by the enormous burden our generation bears for trying to repair the world and ensuring that this century's history is one of hope and healing rather than war and genocide.

It was almost exactly a century ago that our European ancestors began a bloody, epochal-changing world war that set in motion the tragic events on the next four decades.

Munich may be a world away — but a quick hop over the Atlantic opened up a wide, wide world to me last week.



Strong BANDS — which stands for Strong Balance, Activity, Nutrition, Determination and Strength - promotes garrison fitness and wellness programs available to soldiers, families, retirees and civilians. This year's theme is "Trained. Willing. Able," which highlights how the five campaign components enhance an individual's readiness.

Launched in 2011, the events and programs encourage service members, families, retirees, and civilians worldwide to start and maintain a healthier lifestyle. Last year, more than 75,000 individuals were involved in more than 400 fitness and health activities.

The campaign features U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program soldiers Cpt. Leigh Jaynes-Provisor, wrestler; Sgt. Nathan Schrimsher, modern pentathlete; and Sgt. 1st Class Keith Sanderson, three-time Olympic pistol shooter. The soldiers were selected to be campaign am-

bassadors because the theme resonates with the physical and mental demands of their training.

"Readiness is that thing you're always chasing right before a competition," said Sanderson. "It's not just about being ready. It's about training to be ready and perform no matter what."

Sanderson, along with Schrimsher and Staff Sgt. Nunn, three-time Olympic race walker, will represent Team USA in this year's Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, from Aug. 5 to 21.

The campaign is held during National Sports and Fitness Month. Participating garrisons will plan a variety of fitness and health-related events throughout the month. In previous years, events ranged from traditional sports and fitness programming and health fairs to Youth Library StoryWalks and Run to Honor races.

Partnering with the Human Performance Resource Center and the Army Public Health Command, the campaign will have both print and online educational materials and videos available to participants at no cost. On-

Lending them a hand

Philippines, US armed forces practice preparedness

Balikatan means shoulderto-shoulder in the Philippines. That is the goal, the theme, and the point of a series of annual exercises held during April in the Philippines. Balikatan is a series of preparedness exercises that are staged through-out the country, incorporating the Armed Forces of the Philippines, U.S. Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, and the National Guard.

Hawaii National Guard Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Enhanced Response Force Package (CERF-P) team noncommissioned officer in charge, Sgt. 1st Class, Jason Kaaiakamanu stated, "Our role here is to show them (the AFP) our techniques, and procedures as far as what we do for search and extraction. Along those lines we know that they have a lot more natural disasters where they can use those techniques more then we do in Hawaii."

The Hawaii National Guard CERF-P's search and rescue team has been participating in Balikatan every

National Guard supports Balikatan through the National Guard State Partnership Program with the aim of building capability across the disaster response forces of both countries. This year, the armed Forces of the Philippines and the Hawaii National Guard are conducting an urban search and rescue interoperability exercise during Balikatan at Camp Capinpin, Tanay, and Rizal.

During the events at Camp Capinpin, the search and rescue soldiers from the Hawaii Army National Guard will be reviewing life-saving techniques that will include rope rescue, shoring of walls and structures, confined space, breaching and lifting of concrete, patient packaging, and decontamination principles. The event will culminate in an interoperability exercise, which will test the techniques rehearsed during the

"Everything we demonstrate can be used in a natural disaster, depending on the scenario. If they have to go in to villages, or do rescues of mountain sides, it can all be year since 2011. The Hawaii incorporated in to what they

have to do here on a yearly bases," said Kaaiakamanu. "It is good for us to come but we also have members of the AFP returning every year to refresh their skills and to help instruct the new students. It is about building relationships with the AFP.

One of the focuses of Balikatan is to build a coalition of rescue operations experts and journeymen who are versed in each others' standard operating practices so that in the event of a natural or man-made disaster there will be less confusion in the initial and follow on responses.

"Balikatan 2016 Urban Search and Rescue Field Training Exercise, gives more knowledge and experience to the organic personnel of the Philippine Army." said Philippine Army Major Ricardo Villaruel, 2016 Balikatan Field Training Exercise Liaison Officer "The Philippine Army also has a disaster response team in every unit they are here participating in the exercise. The capabilities brought by the Hawaii National Guard is very important."

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Remembering the Holocaust victims

As Army units fanned out across Western Europe in 1945 toward the end of World War II, they encountered something they were not prepared for, something horrific, said Michael Rugel.

Rugel, program and content coordinator of the National Museum of American Jewish Military History, spoke at a Pentagon Holocaust Remembrance Day observance on May 5, at the Pentagon Memorial Chapel.

United States soldiers, who did not have specific orders to liberate concentration camps, nonetheless came across them, often by accident, during their drive to Berlin, he said.

During the earliest camp liberations, there were few survivors, Rugel said, just piles of bodies. The camps were essentially abandoned by the guards, who killed as many as they could before fleeing.

There were two essential things that soldiers did as they liberated these camps, Rugel said.

First, they took a lot of photographs, he said. Those photographs then went to the outside world, informing people of the extent of the horrors the Nazis had inflicted on the Jews and others in their so-called final solution.

"This created tremendous awareness that had not been there before."

The second thing soldiers accomplished — soldiers of Jewish heritage in particular — was to re-establish the Jewish community in

Europe, beginning with the survivors of these camps, he said

Almost immediately upon entering the camps, these soldiers, many of whom spoke Yiddish, said the Kadesh prayer with the survivors, even as they took care of their immediate medical and other needs, he said.

Looking back at the Holocaust, Rugel summed up: "The National Socialists took Jewish property and lives, while America gave its Jewish soldiers weapons to fight the injustice."

America values life, human dignity, and freedom, he added.

The attendees then sang "God Bless America." Later, there was a candle lighting to memorialize those who never made it out of the concentration camps.

Six candles were lit, each candle representing approximately one million men, women, and children who lost their lives. Ruger and Jewish chaplains in attendance lit the first four and the last two candles were lit by two attendees who had lost immediate family members in the Holocaust.

Maj. Donald Ehrke, Pentagon Family Life chaplain, who introduced Rugel, said it's human nature to want to look back at good times and not want to remember something as terrible as the Holocaust.

"But this is necessary for our preservation as a people," he said. "We say 'never again,' yet we look around and see so much evil in the world today."

Injuries won't stop her from aiming high

Former Army specialist wins it all in Texas

Former Army Spc. Chasity Kuczer set records at the 2015 Department of Defense Warrior Games, as the first-ever female gold medalist in archery and the highest individual scorer ever in the coed competition.

She helped her Army team earn gold in the team competition as well. She also earned gold medals in the women's seated discus throw and discus in track and field, and gold medals in team swimming and a silver medal for the backstroke. Kuczer hopes to continue her streak in archery for Team America at the 2016 Invictus Games at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Fla.

Kuczer said she has had several surgeries since Warrior Games last year, but she's been working up her strength and shooting.

"I've been shooting considerably higher scores than last year," she said. "I want to get gold; I've been training for gold. We'll have to see how the cards fall."

More than 500 wounded, ill, and injured service members from 15 nations competed in 10 sporting events from May 8 to 12, as they were cheered on by

thousands of family members, friends, and spectators.

Growing up in Seymour, Wis., Kuczer said she practically grew up with a bow in one hand and a shotgun in the other. The locomotive mechanic said she's been shooting archery since she was 4 and grew up shooting shotguns, rifle, and skeet.

"I did archery competitions; I went to nationals in 2010 for trap skeet and sporting clays," she said. "I also went to nationals for archery in 2008. I was the top four in the state and then the top 25 percent at nationals."

For shooting competitions, she said she used 22s. She loved to shoot skeet, but now it's difficult for her because of her injury.

Kuczer works on the electric, maintenance, generators, and engines on trains for the Army.

"I know how to operate a train as well," she said with a smile

Because of her work on the trains, lifting heavy objects and going up and down heavy steps, she obtained a bilateral labral tear and had to have surgeries to her hips.

"I have problems with my something bad. I hips, sciatica, nerve damage, and problems with my lower my little sisters."

back," she said. The hardest part for Kuczer as she recovered from her surgeries was not being outdoors, skeet shooting.

"The surgeries kind of put me back, but adaptive sports at the [Warrior Transition Battalion] made me realize I can do other events. I can still be very active and partake in other sports," she said. "I just needed to stay strong and positive"

Kuczer said she's honored to represent the Army and America and is confident in her chances.

"At the end of the day, I want to know I did my best," she said. "I've been training extremely hard. I've been practicing shooting, along with shooting in competitions, and when I don't shoot, I weight train."

She said her dad, step-mom, and two little sisters will be at the Invictus Games to watch her compete.

"They are really proud of how I've been shooting and for what I've accomplished," Kuczer said. "They said it's great to see me smile again like I used to, to see something good coming out of something bad. It's nice seeing how I'm an inspiration to my little sisters"



Once upon a crime

Wine bar uncorks Bay Ridge's bloody history

e is pouring over crime history! Bay Ridge was not always the peaceful neighborhood it is today. A local history sleuth will spill open the truth about some of the neighborhood's grisliest, most ghastly moments in "True Crime Bay Ridge" at the Owl's Head wine bar on May 18. The stories are sure to have your hair standing on end while you make your cautious way home, he said.

"The only thing that makes a murder story more interesting is when it's set on streets you know," said Henry Stewart. "I think people will be as fascinated as people reading the Brooklyn Eagle were

Stewart sifted through hundreds of edi-

tions of that defunct newspaper — which has no relationship to the current publication of the same name — to discover clippings of crimes that could come out of a mid-century pulp fiction novel. One deadly Prohibition-era shootout took place at a bar with an eerily similar name to the one where Stewart will discuss the deadly

According to the Bay Ridge historian, two seedy groups of rival bootleggers were negotiating at the Owl's Head Tavern, which once stood on the corner of 69th Street and Third Avenue. When the deal went sour, shots rang out through the watering hole's windows. The noise attracted a plainclothes cop who charged in, his own gun blazing. When the dust

settled, said Stewart, the policeman discovered that he had shot another officer - a corrupt cop involved in the bootlegging biz!

Another bloody story occurred a decade later, when a harmless old woman rumored to be wealthy beyond imagining was murdered in her decrepit Shore Road

"She even told the Eagle that something could happen to her because of these rumors," said Stewart. "A couple years later, just before Christmas, they found her body in the cellar, her head smashed in with an axe. It was never solved."

Stewart will show off newspaper clippings, photos from the scenes of the crimes, and other historical evidence in a

slide show during the talk.

Stewart regularly hosts events at the wine bar, including telling stories for the R train's 100th anniversary, discussing the kidnapping of Charley Ross in the 19th century, and hosting regular readings from the Bay Ridge Poets Society. But his latest endeavor looks to be the most popular yet, according to the response on Facebook.

If the bar reaches capacity, as social media suggests it might, Stewart plans to repeat his terrifying tales of Old Bay Ridge in a few weeks.

Rooftop film series launches with Danger-ous doc

The Rooftop Films series kicks off its 20th season of outdoor films in Industry City on May 18 with a sneak peek at the upcoming documentary "Weiner," about the former congressman Anthony Weiner's 2013 mayoral campaign, and the sexting scandal that brought it crashing down. Organizers of the summer film series say this year will be its biggest yet. They made the dangerous choice to select "Weiner" to start because it speaks to the impact of politics which anyone can relate to during a presidential election year.

"People often see these twists and turns from the outsides, and they don't see the impact that these scandals have not only on the working lives of the candidates, but of their aides and the people around them," said Dan Nuxoll, program director of the series. "This film really puts a human face on the candidates and their campaigns and what they go through personally when the scandal erupts."

The rooftop venue is key to making sure that message hits, he said.

"We're presenting movies in such a way that they're not merely just screenings," Nuxoll said. "It'll be hopefully more impactful than just going to a movie theater."

The opening night will be fol-



Cabaret show uncovers the scandals of the '20s

The cabaret show "Runnin' Wild," at Kingsborough College on May 21, is a sizzling musical journey through the Roaring '20s. The show's creator and star says that it was inspired by his desire to show young people that their antics cannot live up to the scandals of their elders.

"I am at that stage in my life where young people look at me as if my past wasn't as dangerous as the mischief they're getting into now," said Mark Nadler. "They have no idea the kind of trouble I used to get into! And then I started wondering how it was for my grandmother's generation. What kind of trouble did they get into?"

The veteran cabaret performer, who says that he is afflicted with "Google-itus," searched the Internet to unearth all manners of goodies about the decadent lives our recent ancestors were living. He put together a show about drugs, drag queens, kidnappings, and opium dens — all of it expressed through music.

"All the songs are from the age of Prohibition, and each of them is either about booze, sex, or drugs," said Nadler.

The show has toured the world, with long stints in London and in Australia, but his upcoming show in Brooklyn makes him feel like a homecoming king.

"It is my first time performing in Brooklyn," said Nadler. "I moved to New York City when I was 17, and my first apartment was in Park Slope!"

Nadler's show also includes the scandalous story of Charlie Chaplin marrying his 16-year-old cousin, quotes of Mae West's salacious ad-libs ("She was a Brooklynite too," he points out), and a vital bit of education — the recipe for making a perfect dry gin martini.



The politically-minded pooch passed away shortly after Hitler was elected, said Koudounaris.

"The Nazis were not initially consolidated enough in power, and they had many other pressing things on their agenda aside from talking dogs, so nothing happened to Kurwenal,"





Giants officials were so impressed that they extended him a three-year contract, which he signed on May 9.

"Dreams really do come true, and hard work pays off," Williams posted on his Instagram account on Saturday. "I'm thankful that the Giants organization believed in me and can't wait to show them they made a great decision."

Anyone who knows Williams and his game already knows that to be the case. O'Connor could sense a familiar hunger in Williams, one the lineman displayed before the junior season that catapulted him up the recruiting board. Williams didn't want to be remembered as a failure after four tough years at Notre Dame that never saw him live up to his promise. The last
