A GOOD 'SCOUT' Bellevue Hospital Center's new high-tech probe helps surgeons

These days, to find a potentially cancerous breast tumor, surgeons at Bellevue Hospital Center simply "Scout" it out.

New high-tech equipment is in place in the breast surgery operating room at Bellevue that uses infrared rays to probe breasts for lesions that need to be surgically removed.

Dr. Kathie-Ann Joseph, Chief of Breast Surgery at Bellevue, explained that the new technology is called Savi Scout, and insisted its the wave of the future in breast cancer surgery.

"When the patient has a lesion, you can't always feel it," said Dr. Joseph. "The surgeon needs to find out where that lesion is; this new technology can do that."

She said that previously, breast cancer patients needing surgery would have to arrive at the hospital early in the morning on the day of the operation to undergo needle location, a procedure in which a radiologist inserts a needle attached to a guide wire into a breast to find the lesions.

"The issue with needle location is if the lesion is in a difficult location, the procedure can take a lot longer than expected, and the patient could spend more time in the operating room than they need to," Joseph said. "That's inefficient, and leads to delays in surgery for the doctors."

With Savi Scout, she said, a radiologist inserts a small chip, called a reflector, into the breast of a surgical patient. This can be done under local anesthesia at any time — a week before, or even a day before — an operation.

"We have a device that we use in the operating room that picks up a signal from the reflector to show the surgeon where [in the breast] the lesion is," Dr. Joseph said. "I like to say it tracks where lesions are much like a GPS system in your car tracks your destination."

"It's a procedure that's much more comfortable for the patient — they don't have that guide wire sticking out of their breast — and they don't have to come in hours earlier before surgery," she said. It also improves operating room efficiency, because surgeons can begin operating more quickly, and see more patients on any given day.

"The main thing we [surgeons] look at is what we call our 'first start' case, the first [surgical] case of the day," Dr. Joseph said. "if that [sur-





gery] doesn't start on time, the rest of the cases will be delayed and our efficiency goes down. That's been largely eliminated by Savi Scout. It's safe to say that we've knocked down the time it takes to do an average breast surgery procedure from an hour to half that time."

Dr. Joseph said that since Bellevue brought the new technology on

board, "65 percent of the cases that were previously handled with guide wires are now done with Savi Scout, and we expect that number to grow. It's state-ofthe-art were excited about it."

She said that so far, Bellevue is the only city Health + Hospitals facility to use Savi Scout, but she expressed hope that others would follow suit.

"It's going to become the standard of care," said Dr. Joseph, who is also an Associate Professor of Surgery and Population Health at NYU Langone Health. "The major [breast cancer] academic centers are moving toward this type of system.

> "Cancer patients are going through a stressful experience as it is," she said. "Anything we can do to make that experience less stressful is a good thing."

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The final curtain falls

Shore Theater will re-open as hotel and spa – not show venue

They're bringing down the curtain on the Shore Theater.

The developers who purchased Coney Island's landmarked Shore Theater for \$14 million in 2016 will abandon their original promise to restore the 90-yearold building to its former glory as a playhouse, instead converting it into a hotel and spa, with ground-floor retail, according to plans filed with the Department of Buildings.

The unofficial "Mayor of Coney Island" — who led the successful charge to landmark the building's exterior in 2010 — said that he wished the restored property would include a theater space, but he is nonetheless glad the long-derelict building will be revived.

"My attitude is, the building was falling apart, and I'm thrilled that they are there restoring a landmark building," said Dick Zigun, who is also the founder of the Coney Island Circus Sideshow. "I wish that they were restoring the theater as a theater, but there is no legal way to require them to do that."

The plans filed by Pye Properties show that the estimated \$60-million renovation to the seven-story property at Surf and Stillwell avenues will culminate in a hotel, spa, bathhouse, and retail space. The developers' director of operations, Eduard Yadgarov, told New York 1 that they plan to turn the space a 50-room boutique hotel, adding that they also envision adding a banquet space, rooftop restaurant and lounge, and ground-floor café — though none of those elements were listed in the plans filed with the city.

This paper previously reported that the developers were also floating the ideas of adding a rooftop pool; wooing the local Community Board 13 to move their offices there from the next block, where they currently sit above a strip club and next to the elevated train; and targeting national-level tenants, including Starbucks Coffee and clothing retailer TJ Maxx. But reps for the developer did not respond to repeated inquiries about current plans for the property by press time.

The developers expect the hotel will open in 2021, according to the New York 1 report.

The theater has a storied history. It was built in 1925 as the Loew's Coney Island, and hosted Vaudeville acts in its heyday. The Brandt Company took

it over in 1964, and the theater started showing X-rated movies in 1972 in a lastditch attempt to lure audiences. Kansas Fried Chicken mogul Horace Bullard purchased the property in 1978 hoping to convert it into a hotel and casino. but the state decided against allowing gambling in the People's Playground. The land baron then put the building up for sale and let it sit derelict for the next several decades, drawing criticism from Coney Island advocates as the structure deteriorated and became an encampment of homeless people. Bullard died in 2013, and a 2015 announcement that the city would scoop up other derelict Coney Island properties that passed to his family reignited calls to seize the property through eminent domain before it was

eventually sold to developers in 2016.

But Zigun said the revamped property bodes well for the amusement area's future, insisting that the hotel and retail space will help drive more tourism and business to the area — which could create enough foot traffic to justify eventually adding another theater to another part of the neighborhood, he said.

"Even though I'm a theater person and I wish the theater was put back as a theater, it doesn't matter — a prosperous Coney Island will build another theater," Zigun said. "In order to fill a theater yearround, you need tourists year-round, and we don't have that yet."

Reps from the city Landmarks Preservation Commission did not respond to an inquiry by press time.

Two in custody after brutal Marine Park home invasion

Police have arrested two people in connection to a violent home invasion that happened on Monday morning in Marine Park.

The man and the woman, both in their twenties, were charged with attempted murder, assault, burglary, grand larceny, and criminal possession of a weapon, according to police.

Police say those two individuals, plus an accomplice, broke into the Madison Place home of a retired police lieutenant at 5:30 am on Oct. 8, attacking the 72-year-old former cop and sexually assaulting his 71-year-old wife.

The brutes allegedly slashed the retired cop's face with a boxcutter and hit him in the head with a gun, according to the authorities.

They then allegedly stole the couple's Honda Civic and fled the scene, police said.

Later on Monday night, a man and woman were stopped in the stolen car at the Battery Tunnel and brought in for questioning, authorities said.

The retired couple were previously victims of a burglary last July, when the former cop's firearm was taken and has since not been recovered since, according to police.

The police department reps couldn't confirm the condition of the victims, but the New York Times reported that they were treated at a nearby hospital and the woman was recovering there at on Monday night.

Five developers indicted for asbestos-risk fraud

Five developers callously exposed workers to the carcinogenic fibers of asbestos at four buildings in Greenwood Heights in a bid to line their pockets, Kings County's top prosecutor said during an indictment on Wednesday.

The developers are accused of forging documents in 2015, including asbestos assessment reports, that were sent to the city's Department of Buildings in order to obtain permits needed to renovate four Fifth Avenue properties located between 33rd and 34th streets — without having to pay for a federally licensed asbestos abatement contractor.

"These defendants are accused of greedily taking dangerous shortcuts — bypassing safety measures that are put in place to protect the public from serious and unnecessary health risks — to maximize profits at any cost, including the well-being of employees and prospective tenants," said District Attorney Eric Gonzalez.

As a result of the alleged lies, workers tasked with demolition work inside the four properties unknowingly filled the air with the cancer-causing material, exposing themselves to a laundry list of harmful side effects, according to Department of Investigations Commissioner Mark Peters.

Asbestos was commonly used for indoors fireproofing and insulation work prior to the Environmental Protection Agency banning it under the Clean Air Act of 1973.

Locals call on Golden to support Child Victims Act

They want their voices heard. State Sen. Marty Golden (R-Bay Ridge) and his fellow Senate Republicans must pass the more-than-decadeold Child Victims Act extending the statute of limitations to allow survivors of child sex abuse to come forward with their claims as adults, demanded protesters and sexassaults survivors at a press conference organized by Golden's Democratic opponent, Andrew Gounardes, outside the incumbent's Fifth Avenue district office an Oct. 9.

Gounardes said that adult survivors of childhood sexual assault have a right to seek justice — especially now, with the #MeToo movement and following Dr. Christine Blasey Ford's allegations of sexual assault against newly named Supreme Court Associate Justice Brett Kavanaugh.

"It is more important than ever that we believe survivors, we hear their stories, and that we give them every opportunity under the law to seek justice," Gounardes said.

The state Assembly has passed the bill every year since 2006, while the Republican-controlled Senate has refused even to bring the bill to a vote.

Current law prevents sexabuse survivors from pursuing civil cases after they turn 23. and accusers in cases against public institutions have just 90 days to file a lawsuit. The Child Victims Act would extend the statute of limitations to age 50 in civil cases, and age 28 in criminal cases. New York is one of only four states — along with Alabama, Georgia, and Mississippi — with statutes of limitation that restrict childsex-abuse survivors from pursuing legal action.

At least one in five girls and one in twenty boys is a victim of childhood sexual abuse, according to the National Center for Victims of Crime, and less than 40 percent of children reveal sexual abuse to someone else — with nearly 40 percent of those disclosures revealed only to the children's friends, meaning that most assaults go unreported to the authorities, according to Darkness

to Light, an organization that works to prevent child sexual abuse.

A Quinnipiac poll from earlier this year shows that New York state voters overwhelmingly support passing the Child Victims Act by 90 percent, with only 6 percent opposed.

But Golden said that he didn't see an "impetus" to pass the bill in 2016, and recently threw his support behind a bill introduced by state Sen. Catharine Young (R–Upstate) that would create a Child Victims Fund using public funds to compensate victims seeking financial settlements.

But a Bensonhurst resident who spoke out at the press conference for the first time in public about a sexual assault she said she experienced 37 years ago said that publicly funded payouts would not give survivors the justice they deserve.

"[Golden] believes the Child Victims Fund is enough, and it's not. They want justice," said Toni Franco. "I wouldn't have wanted any [money]. The kids need to be heard. Their assaulters need justice."

Franco, a registered Republican, added that she has consistently voted for Golden for 31 years, but said she would be voting for Gounardes in the Nov. 6 general election, in part due to Golden's lack of support for the Child Victims Act. "I was a registered Republican for many years, and I always supported Marty Golden. I cannot support him anymore in good conscience," Franco said. "He is putting the assaulters' interests in front of the children's interests."

Another local at the press conference, Karen Tadross, has ties to both candidates: she lives across the street from Golden, and founded Bay Ridge Cares with Gounardes in 2012. Tadross said that her connections to both candidates made her feel uncomfortable protesting Golden. but she said she felt she had to be there on behalf of a family member who experienced childhood sexual assault, adding that she wanted the pol to do more than stroll the neighborhood and shake hands at events he sponsors.

"Marty Golden lives across the street from me. We're neighbors. And standing here outside of his office is extremely difficult. But I am past the point of keeping quiet for the sake of getting along," she said. "I am past the point of being impressed with summer concerts and parades. Any senator can do any of those things. There's been twelve years of inaction from our state Senate, and guess who has been there for all twelve years? Marty Golden."

Golden declined to comment through a spokesman.

Boardwalk walk against breast cancer

For a second year, they'll walk the Boardwalk toward a world without breast cancer.

Participants in the American Cancer Society's annual Making Strides Against Breast Cancer, Brooklyn Walk edition, will take to the iconic Riegelmann Boardwalk on Oct. 21, continuing a 16-year tradition of uniting supporters and survivors.

The event's return to the seaside venue is a testament to the community's care for the cause, according to an ACS spokeswoman.

"Making Strides Against Breast Cancer is an opportunity for thousands of people from all over Brooklyn to not only fight back against breast

cancer, but also form a massive community of support with one another," said Ashley Engelman. "Women who are newly diagnosed with breast cancer meet longtime survivors. Caregivers connect with other caregivers. Doctors walk alongside their patients. Everyone is uniting for a single, important cause: eradicating breast cancer."

The non-competitive event aims to raise awareness as well as funds for breast-cancer prevention, research, and patient services. Some 25,000 Brooklyn walkers raised nearly \$750,000 at last year's event, all of which went towards putting services in place for breast-cancer patients, Engelman said.

"The money raised from Making Strides Against Breast Cancer supports critical breast cancer research so that we can continue to find better treatments," she said.

That mission was endorsed by two breast-cancer survivors who walked the walk on the Boardwalk last year, one of whom said 2017 marked her dozenth appearance at the event.

"I have been walking with Making Strides Against Breast Cancer for 12 years. I started participating in the

walk because I felt they needed to find a cure," said Doris Taylor, a Brooklyn resident for 35 years. "The feeling of walking along with other survivors lets me know that I am blessed, and gives me a feeling of gratitude. I am a two-time survivor with double mastectomy and reconstruction."

Another two-time breast cancer survivor, Cynthia Jean, has been walking Making Strides walks for four years, and said she continues to do participate because she has personally benefitted from research advancements.

"Four years ago, they didn't have an effective medication for my type of cancer, HER2+," Jean said. "But today I'm on Perjeta, which I take once every three weeks and [which] targets those cancer cells. The day of the walk is a day of unity, strength, hope and courage."

Engelman said that everyone is welcome at the Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk, but encouraged people to register online in advance, and to make donations and fund-raise. She noted that the American Cancer Society "is the largest funder of cancer research outside of the federal government, and we've played a role in nearly every major breast cancer research breakthrough in modern history."

This year's walk will start on the Boardwalk under the Parachute Jump, and travel up to Coney Island Avenue and back down to the finish line at Stillwell Avenue. Bicycles, carts, scooters and other vehicles will not be allowed on the walk route; strollers and wheelchairs are welcome.

Breast cancer survival rates soar

Improved screenings, innovative treatments mean more patients are beating once-deadly diagnoses

can be a devastating blow. Upon receiving such a diagnosis, people may begin to ask questions about treatment and the impact cancer

may have on their personal lives. Many people who are diagnosed with cancer also begin to wonder about their mortality.

An estimated 266,120 new cases of invasive breast cancer and 63.960 new cases of non-invasive, or in situ,

breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed among women in the United States this year, according to Breastcancer.org. According to the latest statistics presented by the Canadian Breast Cancer foundation, 26,300 women and 230 men had been diagnosed with breast cancer in Canada in 2017.

The good news is that breast cancer incidence rates began decreasing in 2000 af-

breast cancer diagnosis ter increasing for the previous two decades. In addition, death rates from breast cancer have been decreasing steadily since 1989.

The National Cancer Institute says that the change in age-adjusted mortality rates are an indicator of the progress being made in the fight against breast cancer. The most recent SEER Cancer Statistics Review released in April 2018 indicates cancer death rates

among women decreased by 1.4 percent per year between the years of 2006 and 2015. The American Cancer Society says that decreasing death rates among major cancer types, including prostate, colorectal, lung, and breast cancers, are driving the overall shift in survival. The Society says breast cancer death rates among women declined by 39 percent from 1989 to 2015. That

progress is attributed to improvements in early detection and treatment protocols. For anyone doing the math, over the last 25 years or so, 322,000 lives have been saved from breast cancer.

A similar scenario has unfolded in Canada. Breast cancer mortality rates in Canada recently decreased to 21.4 percent, down from 21.8 percent in 2011, states data from the Canadian Cancer Society. Currently, the five-year survival rate for breast cancer among Canadians is 87 percent, and the five-year net survival in the United States is 85 percent.

Increased knowledge about breast cancer, early detection through examinations and mammography, and improved treatments are helping to drive up the survival rates of breast cancer. Although this does not make diagnosis any less scary, it does offer hope to those recently diagnosed.

Imaging re-imagined at Coney Island Hospital

At Coney Island Hospital, ground zero in the battle against breast cancer is on the fifth floor, in the new Women's Health Imaging Center.

In this, Breast Cancer Awareness Month, doctors and administrators at the largest city Health + Hospitals facility in southern Brooklyn want local women to know that they are more ready than ever to provide state-ofthe-art breast health diagnostic and treatment services.

"As per the New York State Cancer Registry data regarding the number of new breast cancer cases detected in the different zip codes of Brooklvn, it was noted that the zip code 11235 — which is where Conev Island Hospital is located — had the highest number of breast cancer cases detected for period 2005-09," said Dr. Daniel Contractor, chairman of the hospital's Department of Radiology. "Patient survival outcomes are much improved if the breast cancer is detected in its early stage. It is therefore imperative that we provide the latest cutting edge technology to our patients to help in early breast cancer detection.'

Contractor said the new imaging center is equipped with two units that can perform both two-dimensional and three-dimensional mammography exams. He explained that 3D mammography "will help decrease the recall rates for patients with suspicious findings on 2D mammograms, improving patient satisfaction."

The new facility also has rooms dedicated for breast ultrasounds and ultrasound guided breast biopsies, Contractor said. He added that

all mammography imaging suites have an ambient atmosphere to make for a more-relaxed patient experience.

"Once inside the exam room, our state-of-the art video and surround sound system offers you a choice of soothing environments, such as the beach, a garden, or a rainforest to help you relax during your exam," Contractor said.

And once relaxed, he promised, patients will be treated by skilled medical staff.

"In Dr. Ami Shah and Dr. Inna Nutanson, we have two very experienced top-quality mammographers who are both board certified by the American College of Radiology and have done fellowships in women's imaging from prestigious institutions," Contractor said.

Dr. Tindalo Adaniel, Director of Breast Surgery at the hospital, said that since the Women's Health Imaging Center opened, "we're seeing quite a few more patients.

"The new imaging technology makes diagnosis and treatment a lot easier. On average, we probably are doing about 25 mammograms a day," said Adaniel. "And we could still do more."

And Dr. Toni Stern, chair of obstetrics and gynecology, added that in addition to mammograms, the new center is equipped with DEXA scanners that measure women's bone density to diagnose for osteoporosis.

"I'm enthusiastic about the multifaceted approach we have toward breast-cancer awareness," Stern said. "We truly partner with our patients to ensure that they receive the care they need."

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Brooklyn teacher shares a life-saving lesson

This Brooklyn teacher has an important lesson for women.

Keri Gioia began having an annual mammogram 11 years ago when she turned 40. The kindergarten teacher was single with no children, had no family history of breast cancer, and no symptoms.

But in 2012, doctors spotted a suspicious area on her mammogram that was later confirmed to be breast cancer. The tumor was at an early stage, and Gioia decided to have a lumpectomy and follow-up radiation treatment.

After a short period of recovery, she

returned to her usual routine with a positive attitude: teaching in a public school in Brooklyn and leading an active social life on Staten Island. where she lives. She remained diligent about her annual mammogram.

Then, in late 2017, during her annual screening before a visit with Dr. Janet Yeh, a breast surgeon at NYU Langone Hospital–Brooklvn, Gioia told the mammography techni-

cian about a lump she recently felt in her other breast. Her mammograms and a subsequent biopsy of the suspicious area confirmed a malignancy. Again, it was at an early stage. She underwent a mastectomy with two-stage breast reconstruction, performed in Brooklyn by plastic surgeon Dr. Alyssa Golas, whom she praised along with Yeh for the care

they provided. "Dr. Yeh and Dr. Golas are an incredible team and I am very pleased with the result,' Gioia said. "The care I received from them was simply the best and it's convenient

that they work together and can see patients at one site. They are terrific doctors!"

The American Cancer Society currently recommends women without any symptoms or family history of breast cancer start receiving annual screening mammograms at age 45. False-positives and over-diagnosis are two main reasons for waiting until later, according to Yeh.

"Some cancers grow slowly,

but some can be aggressive and reach an advanced stage more quickly. In Keri's case, her tumors were found and treated early, when the chance for a good outcome or a cure is much greater," the doctor said. "Self-examination and an annual mammogram can save many lives."

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SAFE AT HOME Feds drop deportation case against pizza delivery man detained at Fort Hamilton

The Feds dropped their case to deport undocumented immigrant and former pizza delivery man Pablo Villavicencio on Oct. 5, a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Southern District of New York confirmed.

A spokesman from the Legal Aid Society said its lawyers cheered the government's decision to drop its case against Villavicencio, whom they took on as a client after Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents detained him when he made a pizza delivery to Fort Hamilton Army Base in June. The spokesman added that the Legal Aid Society would continue to represent Villavicencio -along with lawyers from Debevoise and Plimpton LLP — in order to secure his legal right to stay in the U.S.

"We are glad that the federal government fully with-

drew their challenge to Mr. base claimed that Villavicen-Villavicencio's hard-won release from immigration detention and his opportunity to pursue lawful status," the Legal Aid spokesman said.

The U.S. Attorney's Office originally filed an Oct. 2 appeal challenging U.S. District Judge Paul Crotty's July decision releasing Villavicencio from detention and staying his deportation to his native Ecuador, according to the New York Law Journal. But just three days later, the Feds withdrew the appeal for unknown reasons.

Villavicencio's case received national media attention after Immigration and Customs Enforcement officers detained him while he was delivering food to Fort Hamilton Army Base on June 1, with critics charging that Villavicencio's detention was the result of ethnic profiling.

cio lacked the proper military identification to enter it, prompting a background check and the subsequent discovery of an active warrant from the federal immigration agency, which it issued after Villavicencio failed to leave the country by July 2010, as ordered by a judge.

After he was detained, Villavicencio - whose wife and two daughters are U.S. citizens - spent 53 days at the Hudson County Correctional Facility in New Jersey until Judge Crotty ordered his release on July 24.

Gov. Cuomo weighed in on Villavicencio's case on Oct. 5, saying that the government's change of heart proved the delivery man did not deserve to be detained, and that he was targeted due to his immigration status.

"By dropping its appeal of a A spokeswoman for the court order freeing Pablo Vil-

lavicencio, the federal government is admitting what we already knew — that there was absolutely no legitimate reason to lock him up and take him away from his family,"

Cuomo said. "ICE's arrest of Mr. Villavicencio while he was doing his job was an outrageous affront to our New York values and raised serious concerns of ethnic profiling."

Candidates spar over term limits at forum

Brooklyn's lone Republican state senator wants term limits on state pols — but not for him.

State Sen. Marty Golden (R–Bay Ridge), who is running for his ninth term to represent parts of Bay Ridge, Dyker Heights, Marine Park, Gerritsen Beach, and Sheepshead Bay up in Albany, told a roomful of voters during a candidates forum on Oct. 3 that he'd support term limits for a Democratic legislator with more than three decades under his belt, but that he's still got years of public service ahead of him.

"I'd be in favor. We did term limits in the city Council. I'd be in favor of term limits in the state legislature — for offices paid in the state of New York," Golden said during the forum hosted by the Bay Ridge Interagency Council on Aging at the Fort Hamilton Senior Center. "One of the supporters is Peter Abbate, he's got 36 years, it's time to move on for him, not me, I'm only here 16."

A rep for Golden didn't respond to exactly how many years in office would suffice before the sitting pol was ready to step down, but said his boss does support putting a cap on the number of terms an elected official can serve, especially for leadership roles in Albany.

"Sen. Golden has always supported term limits, and still does," said Michael Tobman. "Within the framework of what the law currently is, however, he will not unilaterally limit his public service."

Golden's challenger for a second time, however, Bay Ridgite Andrew Gounardes said he'd only back term limits for executive positions such mayor and governor, and that giving constituents the opportunity to kick politicians out of office through elections is good enough.

"We have term limits already and they are called elections, and they happen every two years," said Gounardes, who was endorsed by Gov. Andrew Cuomo after besting his competitor Ross Barkan in last month's Democratic primary. "We need to make it easier for people to participate in the voting process so they can hold their elected officials more accountable on a two-year basis." The three-hour forum —

during which candidates for

the Bay Ridge Congressional race, and Bay Ridge and Coney Island Assembly races were also invited to speak nearly came to blows when Golden told constituent Mallory McMahon, who is a founding member of liberal political group Fight Back Bay Ridge, that he doesn't have time to meet with her because she is a "Democratic operative."

"I'm sorry, I'm too busy for you," Golden said to jeers from the crowd, after McMahon questioned why his office has given her the run-around as she has tried since February set up a meeting. "She agrees with me on nothing and I have a very busy office."

But Gounardes said he would welcome meetings with all constituents, even if they don't see eye to eye.

"That's just a no-brainer, even if someone doesn't agree with me, we're not all gonna agree on every single thing," said Gounardes to rounds of applause — and he later clarified that McMahon has never volunteered nor worked for his campaign after such accusations following the heated exchange with Golden. "But that's okay, that's the way the system is supposed to work, but what's not supposed to happen, we're not supposed to ignore those who disagree with us, we're not supposed to ignore those who make us feel uncomfortable."

During their closing arguments, Gounardes urged voters to cast their ballots for him on the Nov. 6 if they are unhappy with the status quo, while Golden told the room

the crowd, after McMahon that flipping the Senate from questioned why his office has red to blue would ruin lives.

"If we get the Democrats to take hold of the Senate it would be the worst thing to happen to us, and would be the worst thing to happen to our community," said Golden, who blasted Cuomo as corrupt on the heels of the governor backing Gounardes. "This is what you want in Albany? This is what you want?"

Meanwhile, incumbent Rep. Dan Donovan (R–Bay Ridge) facing a stiff challenge from Democrat Max Rose, who was recently endorsed by former Vice President Joe Biden failed to make an appearance because he was at an "important foreign affairs commitment in Washington," according to his campaign rep Jessica Proud, although social media shows he was on Staten Island for another event.

And the Democratic nominee for the vacant Coney Island Assembly seat, Mathylde Frontus, also had the floor to herself because her Republican opponent, Steve Saperstein, had just welcomed a baby girl the day before the forum.



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Brooklyn College students protest professor for defending sexual assault, Brett Kavanaugh

These students want to teach their professor a lesson.

Hundreds of Brooklyn College students demanded on Oct. 4 that school officials fire a faculty member over a recent blog post defending controversial Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh — or any man accused of sexual assault during his high-school years.

The students gathered on the college's East Quad and insisted that the school's administration fire Mitchell Langbert, an associate professor at the college's business school, who wrote that committing sexual assault in high school is part of being a man.

"If someone did not commit sexual assault in high school, then he is not a member of the male sex," Langbert said in the post on Sept. 27.

In the same post, he said that sexual assault should be a requirement for future political and judicial appointees, and that Kavanaugh's hearings were made a travesty by the Democrats, whom he referred to as the "sissy party."

"In the future, having committed sexual assault in high school ought to be a prerequisite for all appointments, judicial and political. Those who did not play spin-the-bottle when they were 15 should not be in public life," he said.

Several students voiced their disgust at Langbert's online comments, saying that it made them feel unsafe on campus.

"My main concerns are the risk and the danger that the female students in front of him are in," said Sumaya Javaid, a junior at the college, adding that Langbert's beliefs could make him judge his female students unfairly. "It gives an unfair advantage where he doesn't respect women, so I don't think he would be fair to a female student as much as he would be to a male student," she said.

Another student agreed that Langbert should be fired.

"I don't think he should keep his job. He's obviously a danger to the environment, and if you're going to be learning with a professor like that, you're not going to feel safe and feel like you can actually learn anything," said Naimah Munim, also a junior.

The organizer of the protest condemned Langbert's statements as sexist and dangerous.

"We unequivocally condemn Mr. Langbert's sexism, glorification and promotion of sexual assault, and his calls for violence, as well as all legitimate threats of violence from any member of the campus community," said Corrinne Greene of the student group Young Progressives of America.

Greene read out the group's de-

mands, which, along with him being fired, included an investigation into Langbert's conduct during his tenure. They also demanded that the college should formally condemn the message and introduce mandatory anti-sexualassault classes for all college faculty and administrators.

College provost Anne Lopes issued a statement on Oct. 3 saying that, while Langbert's statements were offensive, the Constitution protects his right to make them.

"I view the post as offensive, obviously abhorrent, and contravening the fundamental values and practices of our community," she said in the statement. "However, the First Amendment to the United States Constitution protects even speech that many experience as offensive, such as the faculty member's post."

One sophomore agreed that while Langberts comments were offensive, firing him would be a last resort, and that a dialogue would be more constructive.

"I think terminating him should be the last thing. The staff and students should sit down with the professor and have a conversation first," said Naim Nuvel.

After the protest, college president Michelle Anderson released a statement in support of the protesting students.

"I want to add my personal voice to the chorus of condemnation of the faculty member's blog post," she wrote. "I find his words repugnant to our values as an institution of higher education. His remarks contravene our commitments to diversity, equality, and intellectual respect," Michelle Anderson said in a statement.

Anderson did not say whether Langbert would be let go, but said that she met with student representatives to see what steps the administration would take.

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Beware of 'rocky' raccoons

City warns that Prospect Park critters tested positive for distemper

A virus that caused dozens of raccoons to exhibit zombielike symptoms in Central Park spread to Brooklyn's Backyard, where as many as four of the woodland critters may have been infected with distemper, a disease that's also lethal to common pets including dogs.

Department of Parks and Recreation officials are warning pup owners to leash their tail-waggers at all times while in Prospect Park, after raccoons found at the Long Meadow and on the eastern side of the park tested positive for the distemper virus on Oct. 3, according to spokeswoman Crystal Howard.

Two other masked bandits that officials suspect may have fallen prey to the deadly illness were collected near the Long Meadow and sent out for testing on Oct. 2 and 4, according to Howard, who said results of those tests are pending.

Early symptoms of distemper in raccoons include runny eyes and nose, along with vomiting and diarrhea, but brain damage that occurs during late stages of the illness can cause the animal to wander about aimlessly and even become aggressive.

Humans are thankfully im-

mune to the illness, but dogs are susceptible, and anyone who fears Fido may be sick with the disease should seek immediate treatment. The good news is that man's best friend can get a vaccine to prevent distemper and other diseases including adenovirus and parvovirus, an allin-one shot recommended by borough vets, some of whom claimed to face resistance to such inoculations from a contingent of local anti-vaxxers who fear they'll cause canine autism — a condition not recognized by medical professionals.

The Brooklyn outbreak follows a surge of infections that plagued raccoons in Central Park, leading the city to test a whopping 176 animals, with the most recently infected critter being collected on Sept. 19, according to Parks Department spokeswoman Maeri Ferguson.

The Manhattan distemper flare up seems to have abated since then, however, as infection rates took a steep decline in the final weeks of summer, Ferguson said.



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Regrowing and caring for hair after chemotherapy

the entire body. As a result, as chemotherapy kills fast-growing cancer cells, it also kills or slows the growth of healthy cells, including hair cells, that divide and grow quickly, explains the National Cancer Institute.

When chemotherapy treatment is com-

pleted, the body is typically capable of regenerating new hair, but that can take some time. Women who consider their hair a large part of their identity may have strong concerns and fears regarding hair loss and what their hair may look like when it begins to regrow. Understanding what to expect and what they can do to

 hemotherapy and radiation are common treatwhat lies ahead.

> New hair typically begins to grow within one to two months of the last chemo treatment. Breastcancer.org says people who have undergone chemotherapy may no-

tice soft fuzz forming on their head roughly two to three weeks after the end of chemo. This will be followed by real hair growing at its normal rate one month afterward. Two months after the last treatment, an

inch of hair can be expected. How hair grows back elsewhere on the body, such as the eyelashes, eyebrows and pubic area, varies from person to person. Experts at the Robert H. Lurie Comprehensive Cancer Center's Dermatologic Care Center at Northwestern University in Chicago recommend speaking with a doctor if hair is not regrowing quickly,

which can be the result of low levels of iron or zinc or even thyroid problems.

To help the process along, some doctors suggest the use of supplements like biotin. The National Institutes of Health says biotin is a B vitamin found in many foods that helps turn carbohydrates, fats, and proteins into energy. There is some evidence that taking biotin can help thicken and speed up the growth of hair and nails, but more research is needed. Rogaine, the baldness treatment, also may be advised, as it's been shown to speed hair regrowth in breast cancer patients who have lost their hair, advises Health magazine.

It is not uncommon for hair grown after chemotherapy to look and feel different from hair prior to treatment. Someone who once had straight hair may develop a wavy mane afterwards. While drastic changes are not common, blonde hair may darken.

As hair grows in, certain areas on the head may grow faster than others. Working with an experienced stylist can help a person achieve a look that is evened out and stylish at any length. Rosette la Vedette, a headwear retailer and cancer resource, suggests making a first trip back to the salon a special experience with a glass of champagne.

Cutting hair won't make it grow faster, but it can help a woman return to a sense of normalcy.

It can be nerve-wracking to wait for hair to regrow after chemotherapy. But patience and understanding the road ahead can assuage any fears breast cancer patients may have about regrowing their hair.

ancer survival rates are on the rise, and that rise can be credited to a host of factors. Advancements in cancer research and treatment have played a big role in rising survival rates, as have the efforts of various organizations to promote cancer prevention and raise awareness about the disease.

The World Health Organization notes that between 30

and 50 percent of cancers can currently be prevented by avoiding certain risk factors and implementing evidence-based prevention strategies. However, people can be vulnerable to cancer if they do not pay attention to their bodies or make an effort to

protect themselves against certain risk factors for cancer. In such instances, cancer may already have spread to other parts of their bodies, or metas-

tasized, before they are even diagnosed, greatly reducing their likelihood of surviving the disease. When doctors diagnose metastatic cancer, they will refer to it with the same name as the primary cancer

and is often referred to as "stage IV cancer." According to the National Cancer Institute, when observed under a microscope, metastatic cancer cells feature

traits like that of the primary cancer and do not mimic the cells

in the part of the body where the cancer is found. That is how doctors can tell that the cancer is metastatic cancer and has spread from another part of the body.

When doctors diagnose refer to it with the same name as the primary cancer regardless of where the metastatic cancer was discovered. For example, the Institute notes that breast cancer that has spread to the lungs will not be referred to as lung cancer, but metastatic breast cancer. In addition, when treating the disease in this example, doctors will treat the cancer as stage IV breast cancer, not as lung cancer.

Understanding metastatic cancer can help recently diagnosed men and women better comprehend their disease and their prognosis.

ship from student government, as well as student protest organizers, to discuss their concerns and to consider constructive responses we could take together," she said.

Langbert amended his post ahead of the protest, saying that it was meant as satire, along the lines of 18th-century Irish writer Jonathan Swift, who argued satirically that the Irish should sell their children as food to the British to get out of poverty.

"I wrote the following short blog in light of the defamation that Judge Kavanaugh has suffered at the hands of his political opponents. It is intended to be taken in the same light as Swift's claim that Irish children should be eaten. I was surprised to learn that some readers took me literally, claiming that I advocate rape," he said in the amended post.

But students and faculty did not buy his explanation, saying that even if he was sincere about it being satire, it was still not appropriate for him to joke about sexual assault, given the current national climate, according to one staff member.

"I don't think as a straight male he gets to make satire about sexual assault. I don't think it is his place," said Hasan Ozcan, an acting director at the college's Preparatory Center.

Ozcan doubted the honesty of Langbert's explanation in light of other

posts on his blog, which argue a range of conservative ideas and rail against Democrats.

"Clearly much of his blog has similar sentiments so I neither think that he is sincere in his comment that it was satire, nor do I think it's his place to make jokes about someone else's pain, that people endure their entire lives," Ozcan said.

The college president announced that the college will host two public forums next week, which will allow for students and faculty to reflect and learn from each other, according to a spokesman for the college.

Langert did not respond to repeated requests for comment by press time.

A woman told police she was raped. Cops, citing grainy video, disagreed.

A woman told police that a man raped her on a Williamsburg street in the early morning on Oct. 4, but cops aren't taking her word for it, and instead cited dark and grainy surveillance footage as evidence that she was a victim of attempted rape, according to officers and the public report they circulated following the incident.

The 27-year-old victim told authorities that she was walking on Richardson Street between Humbolt and N. Henry streets when the creep crossed the street, pushed her to the ground, removed her underwear, and entered her vagina with his penis without permission, Police Department spokeswoman Cdt. Taylor Cannon said, repeating language used by the victim in the police report she filed about an hour after cameras captured the act around 2:15 am.

"That's what the actual report says," Cannon said. "It's a rape, not attempted."

But authorities' Oct. 5 public notice about the incident, which included an edited clip of the surveillance video, described it as an attempted rape, al-

leging the perv knocked the victim down and penetrated her with his fingers when she tried to fight him off after he approached her from behind on Richardson Street near Kingsland Avenue, pushed her against the wall of a building, and tore off her underwear.

When asked to explain cops' description of the incident as an attempted rape when the victim told them she was raped, Cannon initially said it was a mistake.

"It's an error," she said.

But when pushed about the discrepancy and why police would publicly describe the incident as an attempted rape despite the victim's own statement to the contrary, Cannon put this reporter on hold, then said the blurry footage officers obtained provided a more accurate account of the incident than the woman did when reporting it an hour after it happened.

"The victim doesn't always have an accurate recollection of what happened. No penis to vagina contact," said Cannon, before transferring the call to her supervisor, Sgt. Lee Jones.

Jones also insisted the full video — which authorities did not publicly share — doesn't actually show the perv's penis enter the victim's vagina, but only him molesting her.

"The video doesn't show that she was raped. Not every criminal sex act is rape," he said. "She made a statement, we saw the video."

And the nature of the crime wasn't the only point of confusion in the reps' accounts of the incident, which occurred roughly two days before 50 United States senators decided multiple women's allegations of sexual assault against Justice Brett Kavanaugh were not substantiated enough to deprive him of a lifetime appointment on the Supreme Court. Each police rep provided a different timeline in describing the victim's actions following the attack.

Cannon said the victim took an Uber from Kingsland Avenue to the 90th Precinct station house, where paramedics met her and took her to Woodhull Hospital for a rape kit.

But Jones said the victim first went back to her apartment, and then with her roommate came to the station house before paramedics took her to the hospital from there.

Authorities are still hunting for the slimeball, who fled in a dark-colored sedan towards Morgan Avenue following the attack, Jones said.

And should police arrest the man and charge him with attempted rape, prosecutors can always change the charge based on their own investigation, according to a rep for the district attorney's office.

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It's time to fix New York City's street-vendor problem

wo weeks ago, legislation was introduced that would increase the number of street vendors in our communities. Former Council Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito failed to pass a similar law in the waning days of her term in December 2017. This renewed effort should also be dead on arrival because allowing more vendors on our sidewalks without reforming our city's street vending flaws would be bad for many neighborhood's brickand mortar businesses.

The current proposed legislation (Intro 1116-2018), sponsored by Councilwoman Margaret Chin of Manhat-"would gradually extan. pand the number of permits to vend foods on the streets and sidewalks of New York City." Specifically, 400 new licenses would be issued every year beginning in 2019 until 2028. Currently, there is a cap of about 5,000 street vending licenses, but Sean Basinski, Director of the Street Vendor Project at the Urban Justice Center, estimates there are actually between 10,000 and 12,000 food vendors when accounting for those operating without a license.

In addition to dealing with the thousands of street vendors operating illegally and the inherent unfair competition that brick-and-mortar businesses face from these vendors, there are also many other problems with our system for regulating this industry that must be addressed before we entertain lifting the current cap.

Ironically, many of the same members of the Council that are pushing to increase the number of vendors are the same

ones that voted to place a moratorium on the number of Uber and Lyft vehicles on our streets until the city can evaluate how the increase of for-hire vehicles is impacting traffic and the taxi industry. The same logic should prevail here.

There are many reasons why street vendors, particularly those that sell food, place brick-and-mortar businesses at a competitive disadvantage. For example, street vendors don't pay rent or insurance premiums and do not face the constant barrage of city, state, and federal regulations with inspectors itching to dole out hefty fines for violations. As a result, street vendors, who are too often just a stone's throw from a business, can sell similar products for much less.

The mom-and-pop shops we all grew up with are also facing extraordinary increases in the minimum wage, with it soon going up to \$15 per hour. They also are dealing with the continued growth of internet home delivery services like Fresh Direct and Amazon. Allowing more street vendors could be a death knell for some

unsanitary conditions must also be addressed before expansion. Think about it: When was the last time you saw a sink at your local produce or food cart? Our neighborhood restaurants must follow strict health and safety regulations to protect customers and employees. Street food vendors face no such scrutiny or fines.

Neighborhoods face quality-of-life issues relating to more street vendors on their blocks. Our commercial areas are tight enough, and having street carts also on the sidewalks increases both traffic and litter. Last year, Manhattan Community Board 8's Street Vendor Committee noted the additional litter and sidewalk congestion associated with these unregulated vendors in their opposition to increasing the number of licenses. Additionally, several years ago Brooklyn Community Board 10 and the 86th Street Business Improvement District in Bay Ridge requested including food carts in the street's vendor-free zone because of these same issues.

During last year's debate about expanding the permits, New York City Business Improvement District Association President Robert Benfatto summed the core issue up best when he said, "merely lifting the cap to garner more opportunities for street vendors — a worthy goal — without addressing the concerns of public space and the dire economic straits of brick-andmortar retail helps no one."

In addition to expanding the number of street vendors, the bill also includes creating an office of street vendor enforcement.

This is sorely needed, as no one seems to take responsibility for dealing with street vendors in city government. Creating and enforcing logical rules like ensuring a produce cart doesn't set up shop right outside a supermarket is the first step to real reform. There are plenty of communities where there is a shortage of establishments that sell food where street vendors would make sense and be welcomed with open arms and not jeopardize established businesses.

Three potential side effects of breast cancer treatments

ancer is a painful, potentially life-threatening disease. Though discomfort might be the first warning sign that compels people to visit their physicians on the road to receiving a cancer diagnosis, cancer treatments can produce a host of side effects, including pain, as well.

According to the Sidney Kimmel Cancer Center, breast cancer treatments can create both long-term side effects and late side effects. Long-term side effects are those that begin during treatment and continue after all treatments have stopped, while late side effects refers to symptoms that can appear weeks, months, or even years after treatments have ended.

The list of potential side effects of breast cancer treatments is lengthy, but may include the following conditions or issues:

1. Fatigue

The nonprofit organization Breastcancer.org notes that fatigue is the most common side

Some breast cancer patients may experience fatigue after treatment and find it's worsening because they are eating less and not getting enough nutrients. In such instances, the initial fatigue may make people too tired to cook, ultimately contributing to more fatigue when they are not eating or eating convenient yet potentially unhealthy foods. Cooking healthy foods in bulk when fatigue is not overwhelming and accepting others' offers to cook is a great way for cancer patients to ensure their diets are helping them combat fatigue and not making fatigue worse.

2. Lymphedema

Johns Hopkins School of Medicine notes that, following breast cancer treatment, some patients may suffer from lymphedema, a condition characterized by the accumulation of lymphatic fluid in the tissues. Lymphedema most often occurs in the arms, but can contribute to swelling in other

parts of the body as well. Why some people suffer from lymphedema after treatment and others don't is a mystery, though surgeons at Johns Hop-

kins Breast Center have noticed a low occurrence of lymphedema in patients

who have undergone sentinel node biopsies or axillary node dissection.

Breast cancer patients are at risk of lymphedema for the rest of their lives after treatment, and while there's no way to prevent it, patients should avoid getting needle sticks or blood pressure tests in arms where lymph nodes were removed. In addition, any injuries or cuts in arms where lymph nodes were removed should be treated with vigilance.

3. Infertility

Many women will stop menstruating while undergoing chemotherapy or after chemo treatments, and that cessation is often temporary. These irregularities may be traced to hormonal therapies that make the ovaries stop producing eggs. However, in some instances, even premenopausal women may have trouble getting pregnant after hormonal therapy.

Breastcancer.org notes that women whose periods do not return after treatment may still be fertile, but also notes that women who are close to menopause when beginning chemo may become permanently infertile. Women who have been diagnosed with breast cancer who are concerned about post-treatment infertility should speak with their physicians immediately about their prospects of getting pregnant after treatment, including fertility treatments and the potential safety risks of getting pregnant after being diagnosed with breast cancer.

Breast cancer treatments save lives every day. When discussing treatments with their physicians, breast cancer patients should ask questions about potential shortand long-term side effects.



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Breast self-exam guidelines

n addition to scheduling nosed breast cancers are first clinical screenings and mammograms, women should routinely examine and massage their breasts to detect any abnormalities. These breast self-exams can be an important part of early breast cancer detection.

Although many women are aware that they should become familiar with their bodies, many are unsure about just how frequently they should conduct breast exami-

nations. Experts at Johns Hopkins Medical center advise adult women of all ages to perform self-examinations at least once a month. That's because 40 percent of diag-

detected by women who feel a lump. Establishing a regular breast self-exam schedule is very important.

Begin by looking at the breasts in a mirror. Note the

size and appearance of the breasts, and pay attention to any changes that are normal parts of hormonal changes associated with menstruation. Breasts should be evenly shaped without distortion or swelling.

Changes that should cause concern include dimpling, puckering, or bulging of the skin. Inverted nipples or nipples that have changed position, as well as any rash or redness, should

be noted. In addition, the same examination should be done with arms raised over the head.

The breasts should be felt while both lying down and standing up. Use the right hand to manipulate the left breast and vice versa. Use a firm touch with the first few fingers of the hand. Cover the entire breast in circular motions. The pattern taken doesn't matter so long as it covers the en-

tire breast. All tissue, from the front to the back of the breast, should be felt.

The same pattern and procedure should be conducted while standing up. Many women find this easiest to do while in the shower.

It is important not to panic if something is detected. Not every lump is breast cancer. And bumps may actually be normal parts of the breast, as certain areas can feel different than others. But bring any concerns to the attention of your doctor.

Breast self-exams are a healthy habit to adopt. When used in conjunction with regular medical care and mammography, self-exams can be yet another tool in helping to detect breast abnormalities. Doctors and nurses will use similar breast examination techniques during routine examinations.

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Understanding family cancer syndromes

• ew, if any, families have a family are strongly linked not been affected by cancer. No individual or family is immune to cancer, but some families may be more at risk of developing certain types of cancer than others.

In many instances, cancers that run in families can be linked to behaviors that families share. For example, families that smoke tobacco may be more vulnerable to cancer than those that don't, as the smoke from tobacco is known to contain dozens of carcinogens. Cancer can affect multiple generations, even in families in which only one person smokes, as exposure to secondhand smoke also increases cancer risk.

But poor behaviors or the effects of those behaviors are not the only cancer risk factors that can be passed down from generation to generation. According to the American Cancer Society, between five and 10 percent of all cancers result directly from gene mutations inherited from a parent. When cancers within

to such mutations, this is known as family cancer syndrome.

Cancer is not necessarily caused by a family cancer syndrome, even if gene mutations are inherited. But the following factors may make it more likely that cancers in a family are caused by a family cancer syndrome:

•Many cases of the same type of cancer, especially if the cancer is considered uncommon or rare.

•Cancers that occur at an abnormally young age within a family compared to the median age such cancers are typically

diagnosed among the general population.

 More than one type of cancer in a single person.

•Cancers that occur in both of a pair of organs, such as in both kidneys, both breasts, or both eves.

•More than one childhood cancer in siblings.

•Cancer that occurs in a sex that is not usually affected by that type of cancer, such as

a man being diagnosed with breast cancer.

Before discussing the potential of a family cancer syndrome with their physicians, men and women can survey their family histories with the disease. Adults can make a list of the people in their families who have been diagnosed with cancer, noting their relationship to each individual and which side of the family each

person is on. List the type of cancers each person was diagnosed with, placing an asterisk or note next to types that are considered rare or unusual. In addition, list the age of diagnosis for each family member and whether or not they developed more than one type of cancer. This may be difficult to determine, but try to learn if each relative diagnosed with cancer made any lifestyle choices

that might have contributed to their diagnosis. Such choices include smoking, alcohol consumption, diet, and activity level.

Family cancer syndromes are rare, but understanding them can still help families make the right lifestyle choices. More information about family cancer syndromes is available at www. cancer.org.

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Mammographies and more at Kings County

The oncologists and radiologists at NYC Health+Hospitals-Kings County — Central Brooklyn's largest municipal health facility — perform 9,000 mammograms a year, tactics work in the war against breast cancer.

"Over the last five years, we've seen 150 to 180 breast cancer patients a year; 70 percent come in with Stage 1 or Stage 2 cancer, 30 percent come in with Stages 3 or 4," says Dr. Michelle Follen, Direc-

tor of Services for Gynecologic Oncology and chair of the Cancer Committee for Obstetrics, Gynecology and Women's Health at Kings County.

Performing 9,000 mammographies is just the first step, Follen said; "the next level is getting those patients who need it in quickly

for biopsies and from there that patients need to do their into our cancer center on the fourth floor, where we can see them and do chemotherapy and other treatment."

She said the hospital's raand know only too well what diologists and pathologists attend weekly imaging

conferences, in which they go over "all the mammograms that appear abnormal," looking for clues that will enhance their breast cancer diagnosis and treatment knowledge. "Now, radiolo-

gists train for a couple of years just on breast ultrasound and breast MRI equipment," Follen said. "The idea is to get to a point where we can catch [possible cancer] at its earliest stages." She noted, however, that the quest for an early breast cancer diagnosis is a two-pronged effort, and

part.

"Currently, we're recommending that women ages 50 to 74 get a mammogram every two years, and that women 40 to 49 should get a mammogram after discussing their personal risks with their doctor," she said. "It's not mandatory, but if a woman has had masses of cysts in her breast, we suggest that they get screened."

The advice doesn't stop there; the doctors routinely warn that a smoking, poor eating habits or a family history of certain diseases, can increase a woman's risk of contracting breast cancer.

But Follen said that along with the straight talk about breast cancer, the oncologists NYC Health+Hospitalat Kings County takes care to give their patients hope. That's why a contingent of NYC Health+Hospitals-Kings County staffers will partici-

pate in the American Cancer Society's Breast Cancer Walk on the Coney Island Board on Sunday, Oct. 21.

"I think what's important for your [SCNG] readers to realize is that we now have a greater ability to prolong

[a cancer patient's] life," she said. "They should know that cancer is no longer the bad omen it was in the past. Once its gets diagnosed and appropriately staged, we have so many treatments to offer breast cancer patients.'

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Local blog bites dust

PLG blogger signs off after neighborhood activist accuses him of racism

A Prospect-Lefferts Gardens blogger swore to never again cover the neighborhood he wrote about for nearly a decade, or any surrounding areas, after a firebrand local anti-gentrification activist threatened to publicly denounce him as a racist for posting defamatory allegations about her on the website.

Citizen journalist Tim Thomas abruptly called it quits in an Oct. 5 post on his "Q at Parkside" blog, which has since been taken down. The blogger declared he would abandon the operation he started in May 2010 two days before activist Alicia Boyd planned to disrupt an Oct. 7 event hosted by his employer with a rally condemning him, and apologized to Boyd whom he just weeks ago compared to President Trump and accused of illegal electioneering on behalf of a Crown Heights state senator in stories on the website.

"I apologize to the black community, its residents, leaders, and especially Alicia Boyd for the comments and behavior I have exhibited via this blog," Thomas wrote in his final post. "I will shut down the Q at Parkside permanently."

Prior to abandoning Q at Parkside, Thomas published several recent stories criticizing Boyd. An Aug. 24 post, for instance, accused her of using her tax-exempt communityservice organization, New Directions in Healing, to illegally solicit funds from followers of her anti-gentrification group Movement to Protect the People, which sent out emails encouraging recipients to donate funds via New Directions to state Sen. Jesse Hamilton (D-Crown Heights) during his unsuccessful primary-election race against attorney Zellnor Myrie, according to the blogger.

"Alicia raises money through MTOPP, which she says is a non-profit, though it's actually using her other non-profit New Directions in Healing as its shell, accepting tax-deductible donations," he wrote. "And in case you were unaware, [that's] illegal."

But Thomas, who in another blog story insinuated

that Hamilton gave Boyd money to pay off a mortgage in exchange for her campaign services, recanted that claim and his allegation she illegally electioneered on the pol's behalf in his apology post, writing that he had "no firm evidence" to support the accusations.

The blogger's sudden resignation, which also included a pledge not to write about Flatbush, Ditmas Park, and Crown Heights, came in exchange for Boyd's promise to cancel the protest she planned at a bash hosted by performing-arts

organization Bang on a Can, where Thomas works as a development director, which the activist upheld - but not before releasing statement that bashed Thomas as a racist and pawn for developers after he posted his mea culpa.

"ItappearsthatMr.Thomas and the community have come to an agreement," Boyd's statement read. "We were aware that he was a mouthpiece for developers and corrupt politicians who fed him information and encouraged his racist antics ... we are no longer willing to tolerate negative, comments from white men in a predominantly black community.'

Boyd claimed Thomas referred to local black leaders as "assoholics, frauds, lunatics, fools, and embarrassments' in 2014 and 2015 blog posts that she referenced in e-mails sent ahead of her planned protest, but could not provide more recent examples of his alleged racism.

And in a Sept. 21 post, the blogger admitted to using that language, but explained his remarks pertained to Boyd specifically, not black people in general, before going on to compare the activist to the current commander-in-chief.

"The fact is I don't hate blacks and women. I strongly dislike one black woman. But I also strongly dislike one white man, and he happens to be my president," Thomas wrote.

Boyd resorting to racist smears to defame an adversary is nothing new, however, according to an African-American woman who formerly lived in Prospect-Lefferts Gardens and came in contact with the activist during community-led demonstrations against a controversial Flatbush Avenue development in 2014.

"Whenever Alicia Boyd enters the public square, she's likely to employ a variety of

abusive, sexist, and racist intimidating and obstructive tactics in order to shut down all opposing voices," said Celeste Lacy Davis. "I'm especially disgusted by the way a fake race card has been played in this instance."

> The latest showdown between Thomas and Boyd followed years of the two butting heads, often over his advocacy for new developments with market-rate and affordable housing that she generally opposed out of fear such complexes would force longtime neighborhood residents from their homes.

> In 2016, the activist organized a campaign that led civic gurus on Community Board 9 to boot the blogger from his volunteer post on the panel after she made similar accusations of racism to board members and Borough President Adams.

> "We complained to Borough President Adams, and petitioned the community board for his removal," Boyd told this newspaper. "And again we felt his removal from the community board would put his behavior to rest."

But not all locals are cheering the blogger's demise a Facebook post lamenting Thomas's departure from the website drew such comments as "Thank you, Tim" and "Alicia Boyd s----."

Bruns, however, pleadednot guilty at a May arraignment.

Play focuses on a new life after prison

e's opened up about being locked

A play about a man adjusting to life after prison, opening next week at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, draws on the real experience of its star, who spent 33 years behind bars. The story of "Jack &," which starts its four-night run on Oct. 17, is fictional, but the emotions and experiences it portrays are true to the realities of incarceration and re-entering society, said the show's writer.

"We've created a fictional character together, based on his actual experience as he chooses to share them in the work, so the first monologue begins with him talking about him being in the community room while serving time and the kinds of conver-

sations that bubble up in that," said Kaneza kind of time-travel musical score that complexities of re-entry back into society, Schaal, who lives in Bedford-Stuyvesant.

The show's lead actor, Cornell Alston, was behind bars for more than three decades. Schaal saw him perform in a prison production of "Ma Rainey's Black Bottom," and immediately knew she wanted to work with him.

Photo exhibit shows soft side of pit bulls

he's throwing a pit-y party! A new art exhibition will celebrate the beauty of pit bulls! "Pit Bull Flower Power," by photographer and animal advocate Sophie Gamand, features portraits of the much maligned doggies, each adorned with a hand-crafted crown of flowers. Gamand hopes that her exhibit at the Invisible Dog Art Center, and a book collecting the images, launching at the gallery on Oct. 20, will change negative perceptions of the dogs - and reveal something about the breeders who created them.

"The fate of the pit bull is so emblematic of how messed up humans are. We created these dogs, we made them strong, and then we decided we don't like this anymore, let's just destroy, euthanize you and hate on you and have all these legends around you," said the Brooklyn Heights photographer.

Gamand, who has volunteered with animal rescue groups for the last eight years, said that shelters all over the country are full of unwanted pit bulls.

"The first thing a lot of people say when they come to a shelter is

'I want a dog, but anything but a pit bull.' I can't tell you how often I've heard that," she said.

Gamand herself was wary of pit bulls because of a bad experience with a big dog as a child — even though the canine that attacked her was a different breed. When she noticed her prejudice against the dogs, she decided to challenge herself through her art.

"I realized I was not giving them my best and that it was unfair and prejudiced towards the dogs. So I wanted to do a project that would force me to interact with them and get to know them. I thought there might be an opportunity there to shift our perception a bit," she said.

Rather than portray the dogs as vicious, growling brutes, she put the rescued pit bulls in elegant poses and made bespoke flower crowns for them. The project quickly became an online sensation, and over the last four years her work has found hundreds of thousands of followers on social media. She gets messages every day from pit bull fans and converts, including one cute story of a girl who saw Gamand's photos and began referring to pit bulls as "flower dogs."

Gamand's exhibition and book also aims to draw attention to the more sobering side of animal rescue and shelters, with images of used collars and a virtual reality experience showing how confining shelters are for dogs, according to Gamand.

"It's beautiful that we're saving all of these animals, but shelters are not a fun place for an animal, it's like solitary confinement in many ways," she said.

Gamand hopes that her work will raise awareness for the plight of pit bulls, which she calls "the invisible dogs of animal shelters," in the same

way her online work has already the converted skeptics.

"Many pit bull fans told me that 'Finally the dogs are being seen the way that we see them," she said. "So even though the work is mine and it's my baby, it has gone beyond me and spread this message of having an open mind and an open heart."

The Bric Jazz Festival will kick off its fourth edition with a free outdoor concert from beloved local Afrobeat band Antibalas on Oct. 13. The 12-piece Williamsburg band, which is heavily inspired by the late Nigerian musician Fela Kuti and classical African music, will launch the annual week-long extravaganza of jazz with a set of tunes old, new, and never-heardbefore, said the group's founder.

"We have a new record that came out last year, and we're going to perform that entire record and a selection of older tunes, and we might break out some stuff that we've been recording if we have time," said Martin Perna.

The band has collaborated often with the Fort Greene arts organization, said Perna, and is thrilled to partner with them once again.

"We were actually supposed to do the festival last year, and we've done stuff with Bric a lot over the years — we've been fans of theirs and they've been fans of ours," he said. "This lineup looks incredible, and we're super excited to be part of this festival."

Perna describes his band's musical sound as a mixture of jazz and African tunes, with lyrics that have a jazzy influence.

"It's a lot of jazz elements, and not every song we do is explicitly political but it's in the themes and songs we talk about," he said.

The Antibalas concert will be the first of five nights of free, jazz-related entertainment, followed by a three-night ticketed musical marathon. The on-thehouse events approach the music

genre from several different directions, including film, poetry, and dance.

Closing out the non-musical portion of the festival on Oct. 17 will be a panel discussion led by Nate Chinen, the author of "Playing Changes: Jazz for the New Century," about the evolution of the music genre and its relevance in modern times.

All of these events are free with prior RVSP.

The jazz festival will conclude with a marathon of music on Oct. 18-20, with multiple performances taking place on three different stages of the Bric House. Artists on the lineup include Meshell Ndegeocello, Cyrus Chestnut, the Jazz Passengers, and a dozen more.
